# **GIVES WARNING** ON TEACHER SHORTAGE

Terming the public schools and public supported institutions of learning, the vital concern and number one interest of the people · of this country, particularly Texas, C. H. Spence of the equaliza-tion department of Texas State Department of Education, told the Ranger Rotary Club at noon today that school rooms in Texas are faced with being closed unless something is done about the teacher shortage.

Spence, here to assist in work ing out a teacher pay program for the Ranger schools, stated that the situation is alarming and blamed the teacher shortage on the your pay, the fact that the profession belittled generally and the fact that we do not have sufficient and efficient teacher training schools.

"Today," he said, "a large percentage of the teachers in Texas are teaching on emergency certificates which are good for four months and which have been issued only because of the emergencies of the past few years. These teachers cannot be paid when the




