SAYS ENROLLMENT IN VOCATIONAL SCHOOL UP

Enrollment in the Eastland County Vocational School are increasing as reported by C. B. Edwards, director.

Offices for the county-wide set-up are in the Prairie Building, Eastland. There are three departments in the school, distributive education with Harry Kelsey in charge, Vocational Agriculture with Jack Gray in charge and Trade and Industry with Elmer Frede heading this department. Mrs. Hazel Hickman is Home Counselor.

The Trades and Industry department has 11 classes in operation in the different towns of the county. Due to the increase in enrollment, two additional classes will be started soon. Trade classes include—automobile mechanics, carpentry, woodworking, electricity, plumbing, sheet metal and both electric and acetylene welding. Over 170 men are now enrolled in this department alone.

Arrangements for shop buildings have recently been made in the towns of Cisco, Rising Star, Ranger, and Gorman. To date, no suitable building has been found in Eastland.

Some idea as to the extent of the activities of the trade department can be secured when it is realized that shop and class room facilities are required, machinery, equipment and tools are needed to properly teach these trades. Instructors must be employed who are not only good in their line of work, but must also be able to impart their trade skill and knowledge to others. Recent equipment received includes numerous small hand tools, air compressors, welding torches, shapers and planer. This equipment will be placed in

the various shops located in the county. Several thousand dollars worth of small hand tools and books have been issued directly to veterans for their personal use.

The primary job of the school is to give the veteran training to fit him to do certain kinds of work or to give him additional training so that he might advance in his trade. As rapidly as possible men are being given actual instruction in the shops with the equipment and tools needed in their trade. So that the trainee will understand the basic principles of his trade, and to give the men a well balanced course, some of the time is spent in learning why as well as how. This is carried on in classroom work, consisting of lectures and demonstration with the actual part or machine. Blackboards, charts and films are also used as aids in this type of instruction.

Recent equipment acquired to facilitate the type of instruction consists of three strip film projectors, a Delineascope and a 16 MM sound movie projector. Numerous films are either purchased outright for use of the School or are secured on a rental basis.

OIL WORKERS AGAIN PUT OFF STRIKE
 SAN FRANCISCO — CIO oil workers today postponed for 24 hours a strike called against the west's largest oil refineries and union leaders and a major oil company planned a meeting aimed at settling their wage dispute.
 The postponement was the third since last Saturday, when the strike call was set for California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada and Arizona.
 If the shutdown should take place tomorrow, it could possibly force fuel restrictions even more severe than during the war. In addition to affecting private motorists, the strike would curtail trucking, harbor shipping operations, railroad and airline transportation.

 LONDON—Gen Mark W. Clark was quoted as telling the Big Four deputies today that the United States had never recognized, and never would recognize, the legality of many of the Russian seizures of property in Austria.

 He said that 36 other laws, now permanent legislation, came into force only during emergencies and nothing requires their removal at this time.

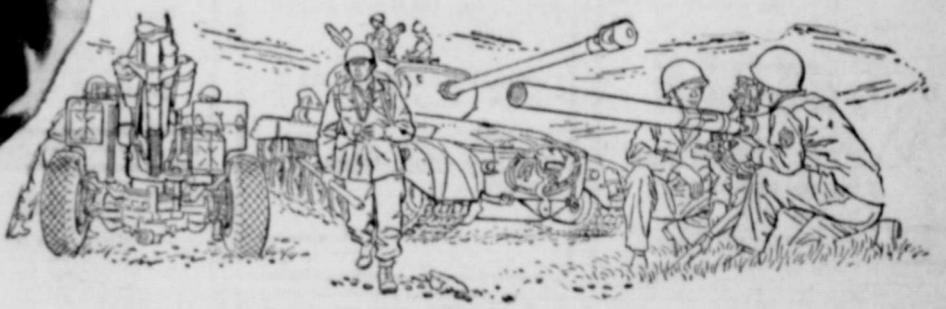
GOP Stands Firm In Determination To Cut Budget
