# RUSSIAN SCIENTISTS DEVISE RELIEF FOR CHILDBIRTH PAIN

By Dan Thrapp

United Press Staff Correspondent LONDON (UP)-Russian scientists have informed their British colleagues of an apparent new advance in the never-ending quest for painless childbirth. Although the Russians caution-

ing experiments, the communication from the Central Institute of Obstetrics and Gynecology added: "We are certainly entitled to

accelerating the process of delivery and reducing the suffering in childbirth." The Soviet technique is to administer vitamin B1 during actual childbirth, beginning with la-

"Three methods of introducing the vitomin were tried-intravenous injections, intramuscular

doctors abandoned this method. At present, the usual procedure is to begin with an in amuscular injection, followed, if the pains recur, either by another smaller injection or by doses through the mouth at an interval of half an

Relief from pain was felt within 10 to 15 minutes of the first injection. In nearly half the test cases, 40 per cent, the pains were relieved during the whole process of birth. In 52 per cent of the cases there was a prolonged alleviation of pain.


"In 3.2 per cent of the cases the effect was of short duration. Only in 5.6 per cent was no relief experienced.

The scientists reported that not only were there no harmful after effects-often an undesirable concomitant of the use of anesthetics or narcotics-but that introduction of the vitamin actually speeded up delivery by half.




