Well... I Dunno, But...

Chief George Murphy told us Saturday morning that following instructions from the city commission that all residents who have not connected with the city sewage system have been instructed to do so and that the connections will be made just as soon as possible.

Weather conditions had halted the work or it would have been done sooner he stated.

Chief also told us Saturday morning that the operation of the fire department was considerably handicapped and delayed Saturday morning by blocked alley ways.

When called to extinguish a blazing stove at the Gholson Hotel, the logical place to hook up the hose was at the alley entrance.

When they attempted this they found that cars had been parked in the alley, blocking passage of the fire trucks.

They were forced to make a front entrance and at the same time delayed in their operations.

He has appealed to the people to stop violating the city ordinances requiring that alley way be kept passable.

While the police department does not wish to take drastic measures in enforcing the law in this respect, the Chief stated that they will have to do it unless people voluntarily observe the law.

April 8 has been set as the date for the beginning of the trash collections and don't forget that prizes are being offered for the largest trash piles in each section of the town and then a grand prize for the largest in town.

H. R. Hicks who soon will open up the Arcadia Confectionery has been prodding us about getting a little plug about his new place.

To get even with him, we walked in the confectionery this morning and asked for a bottle of beer. He was quick to get back at us with the retort that he'd "gladly serve" it and forthwith handed us a foaming glass of root beer.

PREDICTS AID BILL CANNOT MEET DEADLINE

WASHINGTON—Senate minority leader, Alben W. Barkley, today predicted that legislation to provide \$400,000,000 in aid for Greece, Turkey will not be passed by the March 31 deadline when Britain intends to end its economic help to Greece.

The Kentucky Democrat told a reporter it was "obvious" the legislation would not reach President Truman's desk until after that time.

Barkley said it "might not even reach the Senate floor by then."

The President and the state department have warned that Greece faces a critical situation if help is not provided by March 31.

Barkley said an emergency loan "probably will have to be issued through the Reconstruction Finance Corp." if aid was to be afforded the two nations before March 31.

Barkley said if legislation were needed to get the RFC loan, "a joint resolution could be brought up and passed fairly quickly."

The Senate foreign relations committee is scheduled to open hearings Monday on the \$400,000,000 administration program to halt the spread of Communism in the Middle East.

Meanwhile, the Senate's bipartisan team of Vandenberg and Connally sought to link President Truman's program to the United Nations without giving the UN a direct hand in it.

Army Transport Crashes; Believe All Aboard Dead

CAIRO—A U. S. Army C-47 transport carrying two state department officials and four crew members crashed in the Ethiopian wilderness north of Addis Ababa Thursday night, it was disclosed today. All aboard were believed killed.

Billie D. Beck Graduates From Mechanics School

KEESLER FIELD, Miss., March 19—Pfc. Billie D. Beck, son of Mrs. C. E. Beck, Rt. No. 2, Ranger, Texas this week was graduated from one of the world's greatest educational programs—one of the Air Training Command's airplane mechanics training courses at Keesler Field.

The training he received in the mechanics school covered basic airplane and engine mechanic operations. The technical course extended over a period of approximately 16 weeks and included instruction in aircraft electrical systems, engine operation, fuel and oil systems, propellers, structures, instruments and basic inspection.

This qualified him for additional specialized training in the maintenance of heavy bombers, cargo planes, jet and rotor aircraft.

Fred Brown Made Jefferson Day Fund Chairman

Fred Brown, of Eastland, has been named Eastland county chairman for the 1947 Jefferson Day fund-raising campaign which will close with a statewide Democratic rally in Dallas on April 5. The appointment was announced in Dallas by Robert L. Clark, state chairman.

Clark, brother of U. S. Attorney General Tom C. Clark, in making the announcement declared "Texas always has been one of the staunchest supporters of the Democratic Party. The Democratic National Committee already is making plans for the presidential campaign in 1948. We must do our part now."

REV. DICKSON ARRIVES TO HOLD REVIVAL

Rev. Charles W. Dickson, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Roscoe, Texas, has arrived here to take charge of the services of the revival at the First Baptist Church which begins today.

Rev. Dickson is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene, and of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Ft. Worth. In each school he was president of the Ministerial Alliance for a two year period. He served as pastor of the First Baptist Church in Westfrankfort, Illinois for eighteen months before entering the service as a chaplain, serving on Guam and Oahu.

Rev. and Mrs. Dickson plan to apply to the Southern Baptist Convention in April for an appointment to a missionary field in Brazil where Mrs. Dickson's father served as a missionary for over 20 years.

The revival, held in connection with the simultaneous revival campaign of the Baptist Cisco Association, will continue through March 30.

BRUCE ISSUES STATEMENT ON HIS CANDIDACY

Lloyd L. Bruce, the only candidate seeking the office of finance commissioner for Ranger has issued the following statement relative to his candidacy.

To the citizens, my friends of Ranger: Please accept this not only as a statement of my policies but also as a personal appeal for your support and cooperation.

The fact that I have considered Ranger my home since 1907 and that the longest time which I have spent away from it was during the time of World War No. 1, in the service of my country, should be sufficient evidence that I am interested in its welfare and progress. We have not only reared and educated our children in Ranger schools, but Mrs. Bruce and I are both ex-students of Ranger High School and my diploma, dated 1916, is signed by two pioneer citizens, M. H. Hagaman and the late John M. Gholson, of which I am very proud.

It shall always be my policy to consider the interest of the greatest number of all the citizens of Ranger in my deliberations on any problems that may come before the commission for their consideration. I have no political ambition nor am I seeking any personal gain or advancement in asking for a place on the commission and to show my sincerity, it is my belief that all of the plans and problems of the commission should be shared with the citizens, that we might work together for a larger and better Ranger.

In closing, let me say that the fact that I do not have an opponent makes me more humble and have a keener sense of my responsibility to all the citizens of Ranger and with this feeling let me ask that each voter show his interest and cooperation by voting for the man that in your opinion, will be best qualified for making Ranger a better place to live.

HOUSE GROUP DOWNS SENATE BUDGET PLAN

WASHINGTON—House conferees today unanimously rejected a Senate compromise proposal to cut \$5,250,000 from President Truman's \$37,500,000,000 budget for fiscal 1948.

They stood by the \$6,000,000,000 cut voted by the House. The Senate had voted a \$4,500,000,000 cut.

After failing to reach agreement on the amount, the joint Senate - House conference committee recessed subject to call of the chairman, Rep. John Taber, R., N. Y.

Earlier, a Republican senator said GOP conferees had agreed on the \$5,250,000,000 figure. And chairman Styles Bridges of the Senate appropriations committee had predicted that the conference committee would approve the compromise figure.

It also had been reported that Republican conferees agreed to earmark \$2,000,000,000 of the projected budget saving for debt reduction and a "substantial amount" for reducing income taxes.

But Taber said the full conference committee did not vote on the amount to be set aside for debt reduction.

INSTITUTE APPROVED FOR GI TRAINING

James Smith today announced the approval of his West Texas Vocational Institute as a veteran training school and has invited veterans interested in learning the art of cabinet making to investigate the plan.

Smith has been operating his cabinet shop here for a number of years and is a qualified cabinet maker.

The institute has been organized for the purpose of giving vocational training to veterans under the education section plan of the GI Bill of Rights. The school is equipped with the most modern and efficient tools and has a staff of thoroughly competent instructors and a sufficient number of them to give the most careful direction and instructions to the students.

Classes will be conducted five hours a day, five days a week and attendance is compulsory under the course terms except when a good and satisfactory reason for absence is presented.

At the completion of the course, a certificate of graduation will be presented students and every effort to secure for them a satisfactory placement for working in their chosen field.

French Cabinet Averts Crisis

PARIS—Premier Paul Ramadier won a unanimous but somewhat tarnished vote of confidence in the Assembly today amidst a weird whirl of political jockeying that saw the Communist party split by an unprecedented compromise.

Urges Extension Of Rationing And Priorities

WASHINGTON—Chairman Alexander Wiley of the Senate Judiciary committee today urged sugar rationing and other government allocation and priority powers for three months beyond March 31.

A Republican conference, however, did not actually act on Wiley's suggestion and held in abeyance a decision regarding extension of sugar rationing.

Wiley proposed the temporary blanket extension of the allocation and rationing sections of the second war powers act so as to allow more time for consideration of individual bills for dealing with sugar, rubber and certain other commodities.

The whole second War Powers Act, containing rationing and allocation authority, will expire March 31 unless Congress acts.

BRITAIN AND FRANCE BALK; U. S. SILENT ON SUBJECT

MOSCOW—Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov proposed today that the Big Four accept Germany's pre-Hitler Weimar constitution as a basis for framing a new Reich government but met immediate opposition from Britain and France.

Secretary of State George C. Marshall did not indicate his position on the Russian proposal but it was believed that the United States would not favor the plan on grounds that it would centralize the new German government unduly.

Foreign Minister Georges Bidault immediately objected that Molotov's program "would not find much favor with the French people" and Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin declared that among the dangerous features of the Weimar constitution was a provision allowing the president to suspend the constitution.

Molotov's suggestion that the Weimar constitution be used as a basis for drafting the new German government was made extemporaneously after he had submitted a blueprint of Soviet ideas on Reich government.

He proposed a bicameral national legislature which would elect a German president.

Molotov attacked the Anglo-American plans for a federalized Germany which he charged was an indirect attempt to destroy and dismember the German state.

Niece of Ranger Man Killed Near Brownwood Fri.

Granville W. Jones and his daughter, Betty Jean have gone to Brownwood where they were called by the death of Mr. Jones' niece, Edith Dennis.

The 17 year old girl was killed Friday afternoon when a car in which she was riding with three others collided with a truck on the highway about three miles north of Brownwood.

Miss Dennis was instantly killed while the other three were only slightly injured and not even hospitalized.

She was the daughter and only child of Mrs. B. H. Yeager of Brownwood. It was stated here this morning that the deceased girl's father had been killed in an automobile accident several years ago.

GOP, Democrats In Doubt About Labor Law Veto

WASHINGTON—Legislation banning close to \$5,000,000,000 in postal pay suits headed for a Senate-House conference today with Democrats and Republicans disputing whether President Truman would veto the final product when it reaches him.

If he did so, it would provide the first important test of strength between the President and the Republican-controlled 80th Congress on labor legislation.

Senate Democratic Whip Scott W. Lucas, Ill., flatly predicted a veto. This was contradicted by Sen. Alexander Wiley, R., Wis.

12 CHILDREN ON \$35 A WEEK POSE PROBLEM FOR DAD

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C. (UP)—If you think you have a housing problem, consider the case of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Dye of Burnaby, B.C., whose son William has just been born. For William has 11 brothers and sisters, including four sets of twins.

Smorgasburnt!

The family presents a problem in feeding and clothing, but that is nothing to the job of trying to fit them all into the Dyes' three-room cottage in Burnaby.

This is what the census taker finds when he knocks on the Dyes' battered front door. After little William, comes Barbara, aged five Edna and Edward, seven; Frank and Frances, eight; John and Joan, nine; Donald and Dorothy, 10; Norma, 15, and Marion, 16.

Dye, who served with the Royal Artillery in World War I, is a mechanic by trade, but at present works as steward in a Canadian Legion club. He gets a salary of \$35 a week.

Some of the youngsters sleep in the basement, some on the porch of the little house. All the school age children attend school except Marion who works as a telephone operator. Norms and Marion stayed home to look after the family while the mother was in maternity hospital.

The growing family has crowded some of the youngsters out, but Dye wants to get a place where they all can be together. Ten-year-old Dorothy is staying with friends in Winnipeg. One other set of twins spends considerable time with friends in Burnaby to relieve the congestion.

Since William arrived, the Dyes have been receiving some help. Local stores have provided clothing, a cannery sent a few cases of canned goods, a department store has delivered 250 pounds of food and the Kinsmen's Club has arranged for a few weeks' supply of milk.

But the family's greatest worry is that they may have to break up and separate. A move is on foot to locate them a house with an acre or two of ground for farming.

Prison Tough Guys Edit High Toned Paper

BOSTON (UP)—Staffed by a murderer and several men convicted of burglary, larceny and payroll holdups, the Mentor is read avidly by inmates of the Massachusetts state prison in Charleston.

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

ed writing. Later he reported he had been in solitary confinement for infraction of prison rules and couldn't get the book off his mind. He began considering the possibility of putting the story into a colorful musical panorama.

According to Grandstaff he tapped out time with a pencil for lack of a musical instrument and recorded the notes on a crude manuscript. Out of solitary he polished the score, since declared by musicians to be virtually perfect in its mechanics, and sent it to Phillips.

It also found its way into the hands of Nashville, Tenn., music arrangers and later was seen in Dallas where its quality attracted such attention the Texas & Pacific Railway company had the composition reproduced in special choral arrangements.

Symbolically, the railroad's 34-voice male chorus, directed by Maurice Peterman, will sing the premiere. The T&P was the first railway into West Texas and played a major role in the development of Big Spring, one of the early key stations on the line. Much of the coinciding early history of the railroad and Big Spring are chronicled in Phillips' book. Grandstaff's lyrics tell of pioneer Big Spring, the historic "Big Spring" for which the city was named and other topics discussed by the druggist. The spring, now dry, was a watering place for buffalo, Indians and pioneer settlers.

Difficult to master, "Big Spring" has been the only interest of the chorus for months as the singers worked diligently to ready it for the first presentation. Music critics who have heard the unique works, which is attracting interest in Texas music circles, disagree as to whether it is a classic or semi-classic but most lean to the semi-classic. All are in accord on its merits. Several of the state's principal newspapers may send critics to the premiere.

There is no doubt as to the most appropriate place for the premiere and this city was chosen after an invitation by the Big Spring chamber of commerce to the T&P officials.

Two performances will be given by the chorus to accommodate crowds in the 1400-seat municipal auditorium. First will be a morning presentation principally for school children and the evening show will be at 8 p.m. The latter also will be broadcast locally.

Jesus' Intercessory Prayer

Scripture: The 17th Chapter of John

BY WILLIAM E. GILROY, D.D.

THE dictionary defines intercession as "a prayer or series of prayers for persons of different conditions."

Following the solemn conversations of Jesus with His disciples on the eve of His death, recorded in chapters 14 to 16 of John's Gospel, Jesus "lifted up His eyes to heaven" and made the prayer recorded in the 17th Chapter.

Though this is the only long intercessory prayer recorded, it was not the only intercessory prayer of Jesus. We may recall His words to Peter: "Simon, Satan hath desired to have thee, that he may sift thee as wheat; but I have prayed for thee that thy faith fail not." We may be sure that as Jesus prayed for Peter He prayed for the others also. In fact His life was one long prayer for others, and in the "Lord's Prayer" He taught us each and all to make intercession for ourselves.

But the prayer that John records is intercessory in form as well as in spirit, and it is a model for our intercessory prayers. For whom did Jesus pray? And for what did He pray?

HE prayed, first of all, for Himself. Is not that the beginning of true intercessory prayer? Not that it is in any respect selfish, but the first function of prayer is to bring us near to God and to prepare and strengthen us for the doing of His will. Next in the interces-

sory petitions is the prayer for those nearest to us in the doing of God's will.

Note how definite and specific was the prayer of Jesus for His inner circle of disciples. His prayer was not a vague, general, and sentimental prayer for all humanity. "I pray for them," He said, "I pray not for the world." God loved the world, and sent His Son into the world to save it.

BUT here were the men, the Twelve, though one was a traitor, through whom the ministry of Jesus was to be carried on. If salvation was to come to the world it was to come through them. And shortly, Jesus was to give them the commission to go into all the world and preach the Gospel. He knew that they would face hardship and persecution; so He prayed for them, that they might be sanctified and made strong.

And He knew that when they had passed on other disciples must continue the work. So He prayed not for them alone, but for all who should believe through their word. That means you and me, for we are a part of that Gospel succession in which the faith has been handed down from generation to generation. The intercessory prayer of Jesus is for us.

Someone has prayed, and is praying, for you. Are you praying for anyone else? Intercessory prayer is, or may be, a great strengthening bond of Christian life and fellowship.

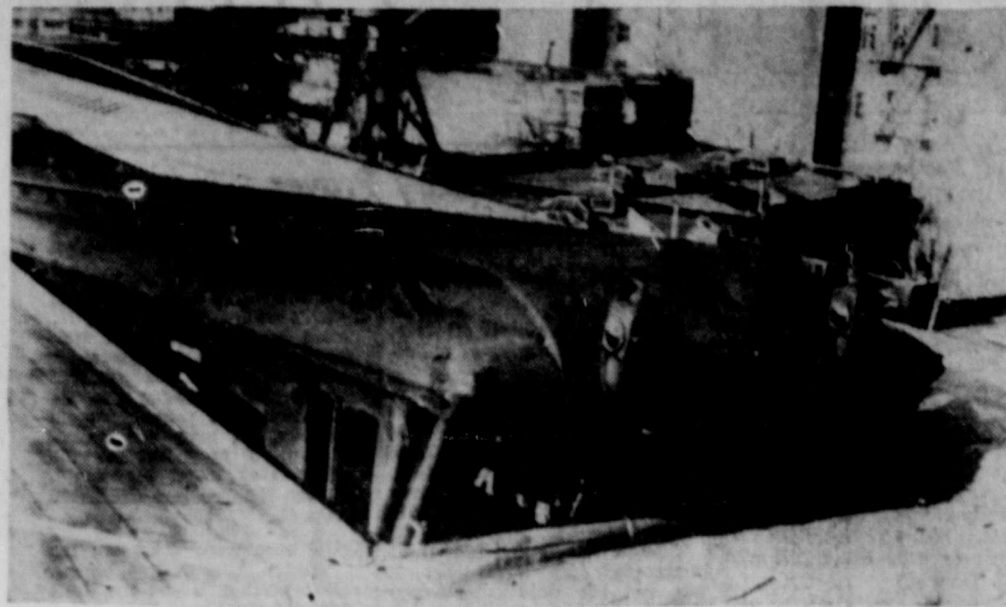

House Democrats Hope For Veto Of Tax Cut Bill

WASHINGTON—House Democrats were counting on President Truman today to veto the Republican-sponsored income tax cut bill if it reaches the White House in its present form. Mr. Truman has announced his opposition to tax cuts this year, but has not gone so far as to say he actually would veto such a bill.

Chicago Relief Rolls Jump 1,000 Cases

CHICAGO (UP)—One thousand additional cases were added to Chicago general relief rolls during January, a record increase for the last five years, according

to the American Public Welfare Association.

The municipal case load in Chicago increased from 23,000 to 24,000 persons during the first month of the year. City welfare officials attributed the record rise to continued economic insecurity of marginal workers—the bulk of them ex-war workers now unable to find permanent jobs.

Despite current increases, the case load still is far below previous figures. In March, 1939, for example, there were 277,551 persons on relief in Chicago.
