### Thirty American Paintings To Be Shown In Paris

NEW YORK (UP)—"I haven't realized such creative painting is done in the United States," Pablo Picasso is reported to have exclaimed when he saw photos of some of the canvases by American painters which will be shown this month in Paris.

The exhibition, to show 30 paintings of six American artists is scheduled to open on March 25 at the Galerie Maeght. It will comprise canvases of William Baziotes, Romare Bearden, Byron Browne, Adolph Gottlieb, Carl Holty and Robert Motherwell. About half of the canvases have never been shown before. Leading figures of Paris' cultural life—Picasso, Leger, Aragon, Eluard and others promised to attend the opening. The exhibit is arranged by the New York gallery of Samuel M. Kootz.

### St. Louis Debates Cuts For Teachers

ST. LOUIS (UP)—Changes in the St. Louis school system, including cuts in teachers' salaries, appear possible as the result of a recent primary election.

St. Louis voters on March 7 decisively defeated a school tax increase and two bond issue proposals.

When the election results were known, the instruction committee of the school board recommended the following economy measures, deemed necessary without additional revenue to operate the St. Louis schools:

The after-school recreational program for about 5,000 children to be terminated at once.

The adult education classes for 10,000 persons will not be resumed in September.

The summer playgrounds probably will not be opened.

An increase in the number of pupils taught by each teacher (to prevent hiring of new instructors) was deemed a possibility.

Also considered was shortening the school year from ten to nine months, which in effect would amount to a salary cut for teachers, although their pay per day would remain the same.

There likewise was talk of elimination of the \$250 a year cost-of-living increased granted teachers recently.

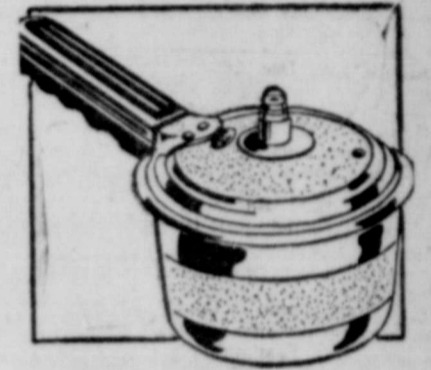

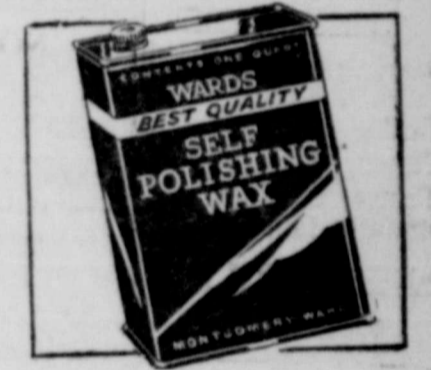

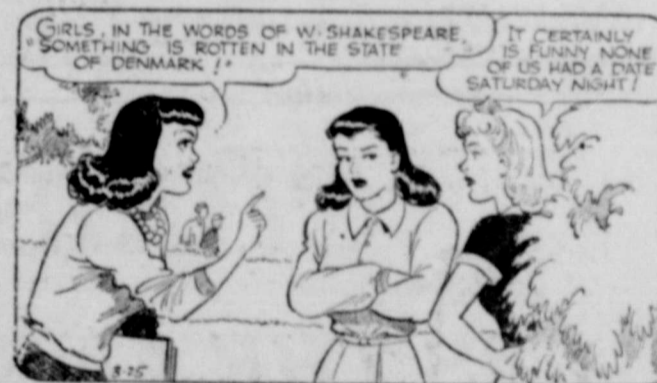

CHICAGO (UP)—The National Association of Housing Officials reports a trend away from purely temporary housing programs.

The trend has been highlighted in legislation introduced in several state legislatures proposing the construction of permanent dwelling for veterans.

New York is the only state which thus far has made a substantial appropriation for permanent housing construction, but plans for similar programs are being considered by legislators in California, Connecticut, Illinois, and Massachusetts, the association said.

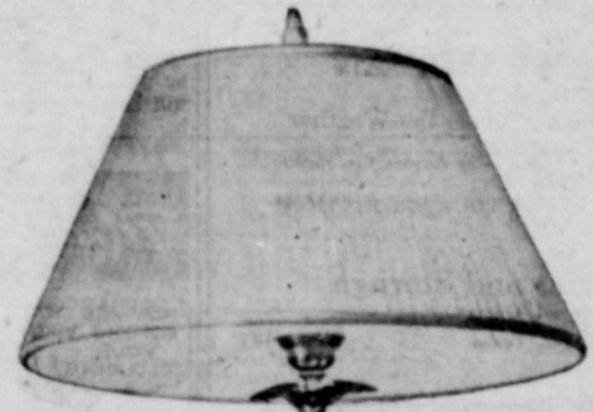
