Newsprint Takes **Another Frice** Jump April 1

Times has been notified by the G. H. Mead paper company that effective April 1, the price of newsprint used in the printing of the Times will cost an addition-

al \$6.00 per ton.

This it was pointed out has been brought about by higher freight rates and higher manufacturing

rates and higher manufacturing and operating costs.

This is the seventh price jump in recent years which has brought the cost for newsprint from \$40 a ton to \$90 a ton. Carloads of paper that have been unloaded for as fittle as \$1,400 now cost \$3,000 to \$3,600 per car load.

A carload of newsprint acheduled to be shipped to the Times April I will cost an additional of approximately \$240 because of the latest raise.

When-the election results were known, the instruction committee of the school board recommended the following economy measures fleemed necessary without addi tional revenue to operate the St. Louis schools:

The after - school recreational program for about 5,000 children be terminated at once. The adult education classes for

10,000 persons will not be resumed in September.

The summer playgrounds prob-ably will not be opened. An increase in the number of pupils taught by each teacher (to prevent hiring of new instructors) vas deemed a possibility. Also considered was shortening

the school year from ten to nine months, which in effect would amount to a salary cut for teachers, although their pay per day would remain the same.

There likewise was talk of elim ination of the \$250 a year cost-ofliving increased granted teachers
