All soft coal mines are closed this week in a "memorial" shut-down ordered by President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers, AFL. Krug's action meant that most, and probably all, of the 518 "hazardous" mines will remain closed after the mourning period ends at midnight Sunday. Some of them may never reopen. Many of the 2,013 other mines also will re-main closed until safety certifi-cates are issued. Most of these, however, are expected to be re

opened within a week after the "memorial" shutdown ends.

During the past year-and-a-half Americans have learned to take good news from China with a grain of cautious optimism. There was that announced truce between Natinonalists and Communists that didn't halt the fighting. There were various democratic resolutions by the government that came to nothing. And so on .

So we give two restrained cheers at the news that the Kuomintang has announced a reorganization which will include minor parties in the government, and that Russia has at last agreed to pull out of Dairen, Manchuria.

The former step came as a result of a nine-day meeting of the Kuomintang's Central Executive Committee. The sessions seem to have been marked by bitterness and by clashes between right and center. But it is somewhat encouraging to read that Generalisimo Chiang Kai-shek took a stand against the extreme right and scolded the committee for allowing many of its good resolutions in the past to be forgotten.

It is unlikely that the Kuomintang was thinking particularly of the U.S. when it promised again this long-needed reform. Surely it must have occurred to the Generalissimo and the top party leaders that such action could benefit them in the field of international relations.

The Chiang government has long been a source of official and unofficial embarrassment to the U.S. Even those who longed for peace in China and disliked the prospect of Russian domination there have had serious reason to doubt that a communist dictatorship would be any worse for the Chinese people than the present dictatorship of the right.
