Rebuilding Of Lidice To Start On June Eighth

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (UP)—Today a willow-lined brook and a handful of alders are all that breaks the flat line of the land where the town of Lidice once stood.

Put the deserted land will begin to live again soon. On June 8, the foundation stone for the first new Lidice building will be laid, on the fifth anniversary of the tragedy.

A score of dwellings for returned Lidice widows and children will be built this year. Much of the work will be done by volunteer labor — "youth brigades" and "labor brigades" from factories and mines where the workers have volunteered to give up their summer vacations to help rebuild Lidice.

The Mining Research Institute which will grow from the "Lidice Shall Live" fund collected in England, the monument donated by Americans, and other public buildings will get underway in 1948.

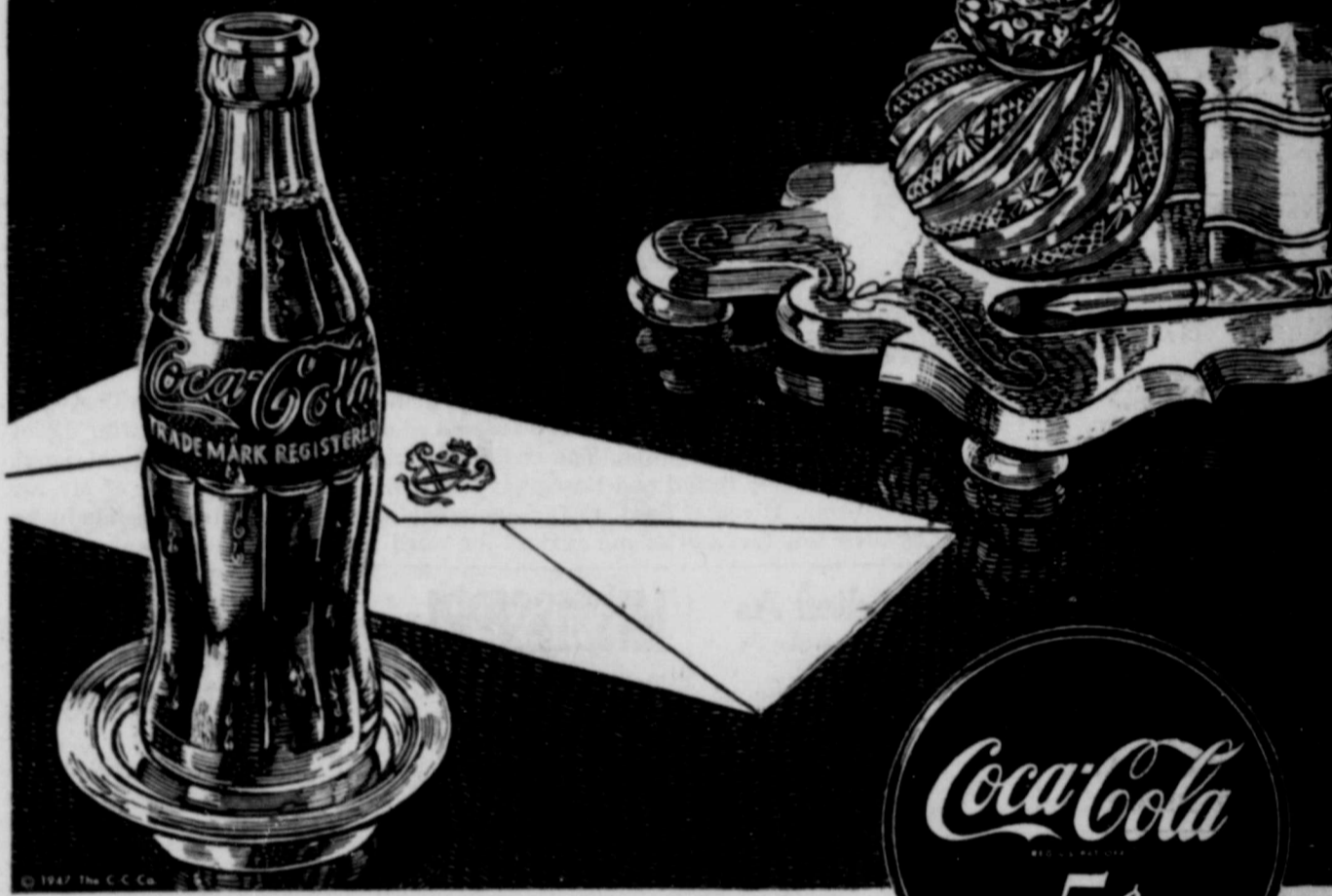
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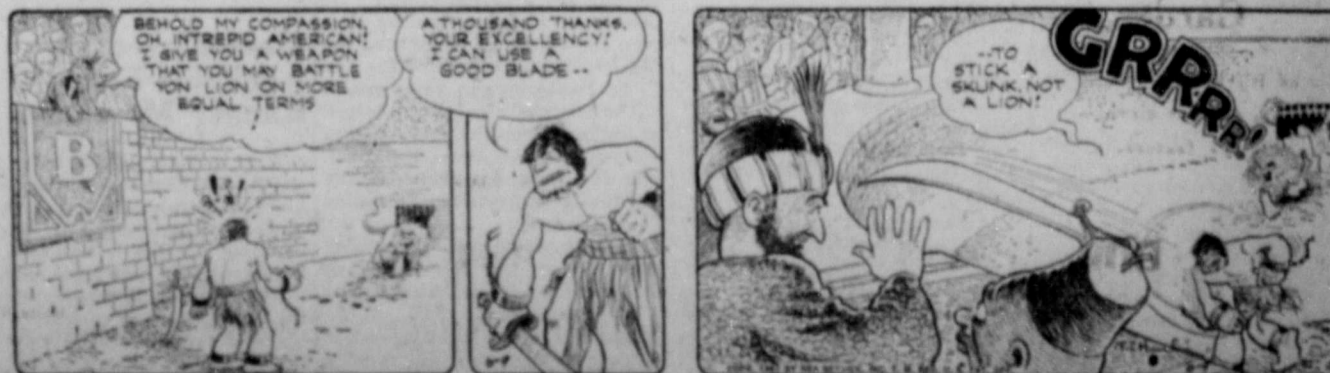

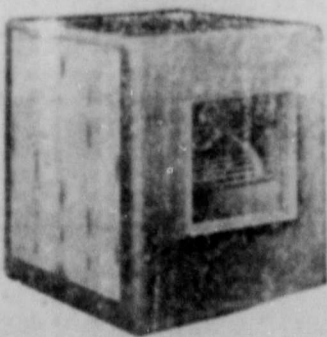

Did you ever wonder whether newspaper reporters lead as interesting and as exciting lives as you've heard they do? Well, I was inclined to doubt it but I've just finished reading the proofs of a book which will be off the press most any time now and after reading the book, which is entitled "Cub Reporter", I'm inclined to believe that newspaper folks do have experiences as varied and thrilling as the novels and the movies proclaim.

"Cub Reporter" is not fiction but tells about some of the events that a police reporter on a city daily "covered" as a part of his daily work.
