## Four award winners are recognized

Clara Vick made arrangements for the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet, held last Thursday night, to be video-taped for placement in the museum archives. Little did she know that she would be one of the featured "stars."

Mrs. Vick was honored as Citizen of the Year for 1989. In presenting the award to her, Jimmy Ross cited her dedication to the Castro County Historical Commission and the Castro County Historical Museum, as well as her efforts in the restoration of the Prisoner of War Chapel and visits with some of the Italian former prisoners.

Ross quoted the US Ambassador to Italy, who publicly commented that the efforts of this Dimmitt citizen were more valuable in creating a friendship between the two nations than anything he could personally do, or that either country could do.

Mrs. Vick has served on the Historical Commission since its activation in 1975 by the County Commissioners Court, and has served as an officer since 1979. She is also a charter member and currently serves as secretary-treasurer of the museum association, serving continuously since 1976.

Ross noted that, "She has rearranged, but not neglected, her business to devote time to the activities of the commission and museum."

Mrs. Vick has been a resident of Castro County for 35 years and for 19 years has been the owner and operator of one of the oldest continuous businesses in Dimmitt and Castro County, Cowser Abstract & Title Co.

Ross credited Mrs. Vick as being responsible for the designation and dedication of most, if not all, of the historical markers situated in the county, and called

her the driving force behind the reunion of the Italian prisoners of war at the abandoned camp site in the northern part of the county and in the restoration of the chapel built by the prisoners. She was invited to Italy in September of 1989 to attend a country-wide reunion of the Association of the Italian Prisoners of War.

"I can say with first-hand knowledge that she is a most competent and efficient abstractor, as well as a devoted and loyal citizen of Dimmitt," Ross concluded.

Mrs. Vick commented, "I appreciate this award very much and I thank everyone for this special honor. My work with the museum and historical commission has been a pleasure and I thank you for this opportunity. Throughout the many places that I have been, representing our town and county, I have enjoyed telling about our work and hospitality. Each committee and every person that I have worked with has been a most rewarding experience. With the work on the Volume II of the county history book ahead of us, I know with the wonderful cooperation from our citizens that it will also become a success."

Mrs. Vick presented the award for Citizen Through the Years to George Bagwell, another person who has been closely connected to the history of Castro County.

Mr. Bagwell has been a member of the Castro County Historical Commission since its inception in 1975, and is a charter board member of the Castro County Historical Museum Association. On Aug. 19, 1989, the new machinery barn at the museum was officially dedicated as the George Bagwell Barn, during the annual open house.

Mrs. Vick said that Mr. Bagwell is "always looking for something for the museum," and she noted that he worked many hours on the completion of the Castro County History Book Vol. I, published in 1981, and is already working on assignments for Vol. II, which will be published in 1991.

Mr. Bagwell moved to Castro County in 1923, and worked on his father's land. He was a charter board member of Dimmitt Wheat Growers in 1934 (now Dimmitt Agri Industries), and served as an active board member for 23 years. He helped organize the Dimmitt Consumers cooperative, serving as a board member many times.

Mrs. Vick noted that Mr. Bagwell was instrumental in establishing rural mail services and obtaining

telephone service for the rural areas. She said he supported the Rural Electrification Administration, which eventually resulted in bringing electricity to his farm in 1948.

As proof of his generosity and kind spirit, Mrs. Vick told about the time in 1930 or 1931 when Mr. Bagwell piloted the airplane that brought Santa Claus to Dimmitt. She revealed that he still gives many gifts to residents of the area, items that he has produced in his home workshop.

She complimented him as a conservationist and a believer in recycling even before that term became widely used. She also noted that he has taught Sunday school for more than 50 years, and still occasionally leads a class.

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## DISD planning committee will propose \$2.6 million package

The Dimmitt Independent School District's Long-Range Planning Committee will present a proposal for \$2.6 million worth of construction and renovations when the school board holds a special called meeting today (Thursday).

The meeting will begin at 6 p.m. in the school administration building's board room, and is open to the public.

The 40-person Long Range Planning Committee has spent almost three months studying school facilities and conditions, state requirements, probable future needs and school employees' "wish lists."

Included in the committee's recommendations are the construction of a multi-purpose activities/athletic facility with cafeteria at Dimmitt High School and major renovations at the high school and Richardson Elementary.

Finance Committee Co-chairman Eddie Sutton said the proposed

package would require a bond issue for \$1.3 million, with the other \$1.3 million of the projected cost coming from the school district's current surplus funds.

The bond issue would require a tax increase of 6.99 cents per \$100 of assessed property valuation, Sutton estimated.

The DISD property tax rate now stands at 87 cents per \$100.

The school district has been free of bonded indebtedness since May.

Here's what the committee will recommend tonight as a package project:

— At Richardson Elementary: Build five additional classrooms and refurbish the restroom facility for the handicapped; restructure and update the electrical system; and completely renovate the food preparation facilities and equipment.

— At Dimmitt High School: Build a multi-purpose activity/ath-

letic facility that would include both a new cafeteria and a basketball-PE area with a minimum seating capacity of 1,500, plus dressing rooms, athletic offices and storage; convert the present cafeteria area into a new media center/library; convert the present library into two classrooms and storage areas; renovate and enlarge the special education area and the administrative offices.

At all schools: Purchase and install new computer equipment and wire all campuses for future expansion of an overall computer network.

Members of the Long-Range Planning Committee, who had worked as four separate subcommittees (Renovation, New Facilities, Equipment and Finance) voted 32-4 last Wednesday to approve the package and submit it to the school board.

## County okays computer bid

The Castro County Commissioners voted Monday to purchase a computer system for the county auditor and county treasurer offices. A bid for \$40,100 was accepted from Software Group, Inc. of Plano, although it was the highest bid received. Pct. 2 Commissioner Dale Winders voted against, saying he felt the difference in price over the other bids was too great.

County Auditor Shirley Brockman and Treasurer Oleta Raper recommended the bid, saying that the company's software provided all necessary functions for their offices, and was in use in 70 or more other counties.

Low bid was \$15,735 submitted by Trans Data Systems of Amarillo. KMK Enterprises of Plainview bid \$21,366.75, and Accounting Systems Computer of Lubbock bid three separate proposals priced at

\$19,125 and \$18,152 and \$15,480.

The commissioners agreed to pay for the system on an installment plan over a three-year period. A representative of the company said there is also a \$135 per month maintenance cost. Training of personnel in using the new system is included in the purchase price.

County Judge Polly Simpson reported that Danny Newton of Newton Electric estimates that it will cost \$1,640 to install wiring for a separate circuit for the computer system. Simpson also noted that Contel of Texas will install a dedicated phone line for the system at a cost of \$89.55 plus \$30 per month.

In other business, the commissioners voted to allow three line-item transfers in the budget for Precinct 1 for paying part-time workers and for purchase of some road-working equipment.

## Corn Growers to meet Tuesday

Controversial GATT negotiations, the 1990 Farm Bill and other topics which will impact area farmers will be discussed Tuesday at the 17th annual meeting of the Texas Corn Growers Association and Texas Corn Producers Board.

The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Castro County Expo Building in Dimmitt. It will include speakers on farm policy related issues as well as corn production and marketing. A free sack lunch will be served by area members of Women Involved in Farm Economics (WIFE) at 12:15 p.m.

"This meeting should help answer any questions area corn growers have concerning GATT and the farm program," said Carl King, TCGA president. "The future of ethanol in Texas will also be an important topic. Presentations given by area crop researchers should provide farmers with information they can use to improve their production."

Guest speakers will include John Ford, legislative affairs director for the American Corn Growers Association.

Ford, a former undersecretary of agriculture, will examine what lies ahead in critical farm bill debates in Washington. He will also review the progress of the new ACGA, which is growing in membership nationwide.

State Rep. Pete Laney of Plainview will review legislative activities in Austin. Laney has been a supporter of TCGA's efforts to obtain a state tax incentive for ethanol producers. Kraig Gallimore of the Texas Dept. of Agriculture will discuss GATT.

"He will explain how US proposals in the GATT talks would virtually trade away American's food and fiber policy," King said.

The down trend in agriculture will be examined by Texas A&M University Economist Roland Smith. He will project how current farm program proposals will affect the agricultural economy in the next few years.

A statewide corn check-off referendum, to be held this spring, will be discussed by Elbert Harp, an area agricultural consultant and former executive director

of the National Grain Sorghum Producers Association. There is currently a seven-county checkoff region consisting of Castro, Deaf Smith, Hale, Swisher, Farmer, Bailey and Lamb counties.

"A statewide check-off would provide more dollars to fund critical research and market development programs to benefit corn farmers across Texas," said King. "We feel it's important that every corn producer support the referendum."

The state of the ethanol industry in Texas will be discussed by Lois Wales, a spokesperson for WIFE, one of the nation's leading promoters of ethanol production and usage. Hadley Paul, president of Tropicana Energy Co. in Irving will also speak on ethanol.

Paul's company is an ethanol supplier which anticipates widespread retail sales of ethanol-blended gasoline across the Panhandle-South Plains area in the near future. A Dimmitt convenience store already has the alternative fuel for sale. Its pumps are draped with banners which promote ethanol as a fuel which provides a new market for Texas corn farmers.

Speaking on the past year's producers board activities will be Weldon Davis, board chairman. Treasurer Harold Bob Bennett will review TCPB finances while Jo Beth Shackelford, TCGA treasurer, will discuss the growers association budget.

The research end of the meeting will feature Dr. Pat Morrison, area entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock. He will review various extension research programs aimed at controlling mites and other corn insect problems.

Dr. Bob Glodt of Plainview, a consulting entomologist, will discuss his research on a new and effective method of miticide application through plant banding. His research was partially funded by TCGA. Dr. Brent Bean, area agronomist for the Extension Service in Amarillo, will look at how a new herbicide may help growers control Johnson grass in corn.

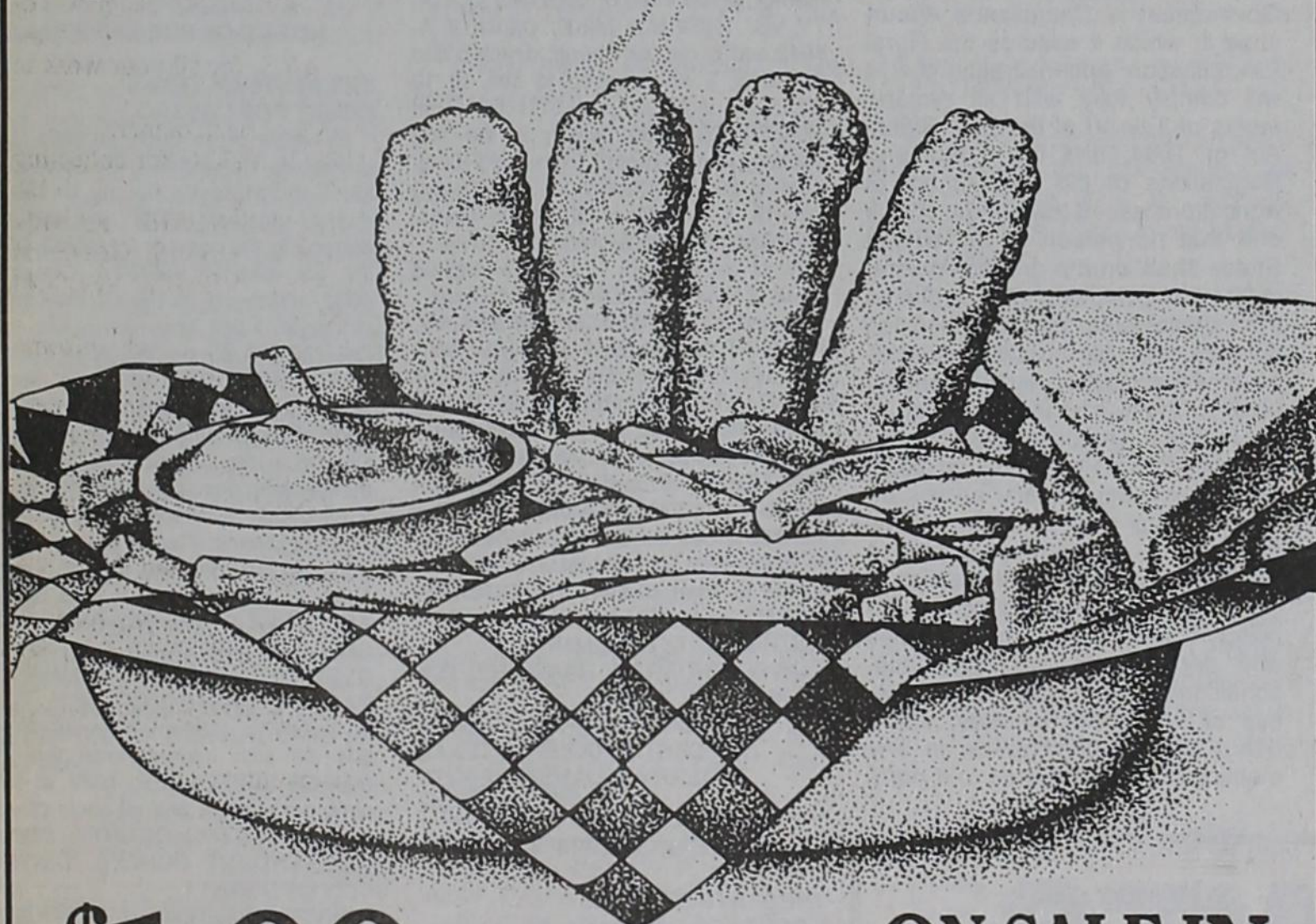

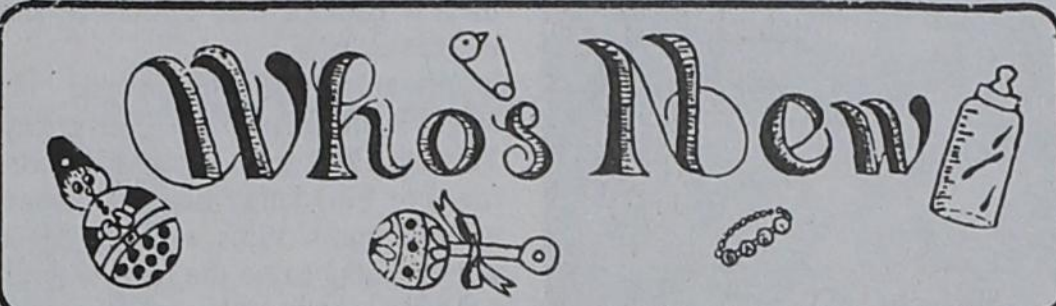

## Home economics tips

# Good nutrition requires eating a variety of foods

The best way to make sure you get the proper nutrition for good health, you need to eat a variety of foods.

Maintaining a nutritious diet is a balancing act. You have to juggle eating the right variety of foods necessary to supply the nutrients you need without getting too many calories or too much fat, cholesterol, sugar, sodium and alcohol.

Why do you need variety? Your body needs over 40 different nutrients to stay healthy. These include protein, carbohydrates and fat as well as vitamins, minerals and water. These nutrients are found in foods. Since no one food supplies all the nutrients the body needs to stay healthy, it's important to eat a variety of foods.

Most foods contain more than one nutrient but are particularly good sources of one or two nutrients.

Since most foods contain more than one nutrient, foods are grouped by the nutrients they contain. To assure a variety and a well-balanced diet, it's important to select foods each day from the major food groups. These groups include milk (cheese and yogurt), meats (poultry, fish, beef, eggs, dry beans and peas, nuts and seeds), fruits and vegetables (citrus, melon, berries, dark green leafy vegetables, deep yellow vegetables, dry beans and peas, legumes and starchy vegetables), and bread and cereals (whole grain and enriched breads and cereals). It is important to select a variety of choices from each food group.

Each group supplies key nutrients. Each group supplies a different combination of key nutrients. Foods from the milk group are major sources of calcium, riboflavin (vitamin B2) and protein. The meat group supplies protein, niacin, iron, thiamin (B1) and other minerals. The fruit and vegetable group is a good source of Vitamins A and C, folic acid, fiber and many minerals. Foods in the bread and cereal group furnish B vitamins, iron, carbohydrates and fiber.

Don't eliminate an entire food or food group from the diet for any reason. For example, if foods from the milk group are left out of the

diet, it's difficult to get enough calcium to prevent osteoporosis, the brittle bone disease.

The daily recommended servings from each group include:

**MILK GROUP**—One cup milk or yogurt, two ounces of process cheese food, or two cups cottage cheese.

**BREAD & CEREAL GROUP**—One slice bread, 1/2 cup cooked cereal, rice or pasta, or an ounce of ready-to-eat cereal.

**FRUIT & VEGETABLE GROUP**—1/2 cup cooked or raw vegetables, 1/2 cantaloupe, 1/2 grapefruit, whole apple, banana, or orange.

**MEAT GROUP**—Two to three ounces of lean, boneless, cooked meat, poultry or fish.

There are six types of nutrients. Most of us can get enough of these nutrients by eating foods from the major food groups each day.

Proteins are the building blocks of the body. They are needed for growth, maintenance and replacement of body cells. They also form the hormones and enzymes used to regulate body process.

Carbohydrates include starches, sugars and dietary fiber. Starch and sugar supply the body with energy. Dietary fiber provides bulk to the diet, which helps with regular elimination of wastes.

Fats provide energy and are carriers of fat soluble vitamins. Some fats help form cell membranes.

Vitamins are organic substances needed by the body in very small amounts. They help release energy from carbohydrates, fats and protein. They also help in other chemical reactions in the body.

Minerals are needed in small amounts. They are used to build strong bones and teeth and to make hemoglobin in red blood cells. They help maintain body fluids and help in other chemical reactions in the body.

Water, the "forgotten nutrient," is needed to replace body water lost in urine and sweat. Water helps to transport nutrients, remove wastes and regulate body temperature.

## Cats down Whirlwinds for new lease on race

The Bobcats gained an inside track on the second-half district title Tuesday night with a big win over the Whirlwinds at Floydada.

The Winds had won the first encounter here, 60-53, by burning the nets with three-pointers, and went on to win the first half with a 5-0 mark, forcing the Bobcats to settle for second.

If both teams win the rest of their district games—as they did in the first half—they'll have to meet a third time in an important showdown to determine the 2-AAA title and playoff seeds.

Tuesday night, Floydada sharpshooters Frank Suarez, Grant Stovall and Kenneth Collins got 21 of the Whirlwinds' points on treys from outside the perimeter, but the Bobcats made up the difference with fast breaks and tough inside play on both offense and defense.

Neither team was hitting up to par from outside, and both squads missed enough free throws to put the game away.

Jermaine Williams scored 14, Miguel Saucedo 13 and Billy Ray Thomas 12 to lead Dimmitt's scoring. For Floydada, Suarez finished with 17 and Collins with 16. Most of the points came the hard way as neither team allowed many "gimmes."

After a slow start, the Bobcats went ahead for the first time at 4:45 of the opening period on a Williams-to-Saucedo fast break. Then the Bobcats surged to an 18-11 lead by the end of the period.

But the Whirlwinds fought back in the second and narrowed the Bobcats' lead to 25-24 before Williams canned a 17-footer with one second left.

Floydada continued its charge in the third and tied the score at 35, 38 and 40, but could never recapture the lead. Thomas closed out the third-quarter scoring with a put-up at 0:30 to give the Bobcats a 42-40 advantage going into the fourth.

Collins converted a three-point play to tie the score at 50 with 3:19 remaining, but Robert Ruiz sank a pair of free throws at 2:47, then the Bobcats captured a Floydada rim-out and went into their four-corner offense with 2:00 left.

In a play that turned his coaches into heavy breathers, Ruiz drove through the entire Floydada defense and sank a reverse layup at 1:15 to hike the Bobcats' lead to 54-50. Suarez answered with a quick jumper, then Williams sank a 15-footer

to regain Dimmitt's four-point lead at 0:36.

In the final, hectic half-minute it was miss-miss-miss as the Bobcats failed on three free throws in a row and Stovall saw his final three-point attempt rim out. Saucedo closed out the scoring with a fast-break layup at 0:11 to make it 58-52.

The Bobbies shook off a slow first half and raced to a 73-37 win over the Lady Whirlwinds to remain unbeaten in district play.

The Bobbies earlier had downed the Lady Winds by 29, but could manage only a 29-21 halftime lead as they struggled through the first two quarters.

But they took command in the third when they switched to a 2-2-1 full-court trapping press defense and netted 12 points on three trips downcourt, with a steal and a couple of forced turnovers.

Gloria Gauna, who was double-

teamed all the way, led the third-quarter charge with 10 points as the Bobbie guards drove inside and dished off. Wendi Ethridge added six from close in, and when the smoke cleared the Bobbies had fashioned a 27-8 quarter and built a 27-point lead, 56-29.

## Swiftettes beat Happy

What do you do when your all-state post guard and leading scorer in sandwiched between defenders for the opposing team?

You go to the outside shot, penetrate and wear the opposition out with your press.

That's what Nazareth did Tuesday night against Happy and it worked.

The top-ranked Swiftettes took a 4-2 lead when Darla Leavitt scored with 5:03 left in the first quarter and never looked back, posting a 58-52 victory over the No. 6-ranked Cowgirls.

Happy double- and triple-teamed Leavitt all night long, but Nazareth's guards and post player Monica Kleman moved outside and scored almost at will.

The Swiftettes shot 57% for the game and the baskets flew in from all over the court—the wing, top of the key, inside the lane and the baseline.

"We didn't have that sluggish spot like we usually do," said Nazareth Head Coach Sandy Heiman. "We played good, consistent basketball for four quarters."

"Before the game we talked about penetrating and taking the short shots where we could crash the boards. It worked for us. When Happy was concentrating on Darla so much, it opened up things for other the other kids and they took it on in."

Three Swiftettes scored in double figures during the game including Noel Johnson, who paced the defending state champs with 16 points; Leavitt, who managed 13; and Tami Ball, who scored 12 points off of penetrations. Monica Kleman and Dana Schulte each added six points and Janay Johnson tossed in five.

The Cowgirls were led by Janale Stockett's 23 points and Peggy Harman's 17.

Happy opened up the game's scoring when Harman canned a short jumpshot with 7:40 left in the first stanza, but the Swiftettes wouldn't allow the Cowgirls another lead in the game.

Nazareth's full court press forced the Cowgirls into turning the ball over eight times in the first quarter and tough defensive play by Kleman and the rest of the team on Harman gave the Swiftettes the momentum they needed to take an 18-10 lead after the first eight minutes had expired.

The kids were handling themselves until Happy threw the press on. It caught us off guard. It shouldn't have, but it did."

The Swiftettes ran off six unanswered points to start the third quarter and built their lead back up to 35-25. Leavitt intimidated Happy's shooters, blocking three shots in the quarter and Noel Johnson was accurate on four of four field goal attempts in the stanza to pace the Swiftettes.

Happy couldn't get closer than six points to the Swiftettes and was still down by 10, 47-37, at the end of the stanza.

Nazareth's domination continued into the final quarter, and Happy just couldn't get anything going until the last 1:14 in the game and by then it was too late.

Kleman fouled out with 2:15 left and Leavitt picked up her fifth personal with 1:18 left. After that, Happy outscored the Swiftettes 6-0, but it wasn't enough.

The Swiftettes are undefeated (7-

0) in district play and hold a 22-3 overall record. Happy fell to 20-6 overall and 5-2 in district.

The Swifts didn't get going until the second half, but when they did Happy didn't stand a chance.

Nazareth improved its record to 14-6, 7-0 in district while Happy fell to 5-18, 4-3.

After a slow start the Swifts led 19-10 after the first quarter and 32-24 at halftime, but came out in the second half and attacked the Cowboys with a vengeance.

Nazareth scored 12 unanswered points in the third quarter before Happy got on the boards mid-way through the stanza. After Happy scored its' first basket of the half, the scoreboard flashed 44-26, Nazareth. The Swifts allowed Happy just six points in the stanza and held a 49-30 lead at the end.

He noted that he had \$10,000 in his budget for capital outlay and requested line-item transfers from other areas of his budget to cover the purchases.

Brockman went over Smith's budget by departments to see if any could be cut. Smith requested that \$1,250 be transferred out of oil and gas and the same amount out of vehicle maintenance and repairs. Brockman recommended not cutting the amount allowed for repairs, citing the relatively high level of repairs Smith had already had for his equipment.

Smith also suggested some funds could be taken out of the allowance for seal coating, but Simpson told him those funds were already obligated for two seal-coating projects.

The commissioners strongly cautioned Smith that additional funds would not be available for those departments once the line-item transfers were approved. They also noted that no more funds would be available for capital outlay once he made the planned purchases.

County/District Attorney Jimmy Davis told Smith that he also could not purchase any more items from McLain for the rest of this fiscal year, which ends in October. He said that separate purchases of items could be construed as circumventing the bid requirements of the law. Smaller counties are required to seek bids for purchases of more than \$15,000 from one supplier.

Smith commented that if he got funds later he would also like to purchase a semi-truck-tractor rig from McLain, and if he couldn't purchase it, he would get someone else to buy it from McLain, and then he would purchase it from that person. Davis told Smith that would be illegal.

Earlier in the meeting, the commissioners also gave approval for transfer of \$3,000 from gross pay to part-time help for Pct. 1. Brockman told Smith that the funds remaining in gross pay would only cover the salaries for his current four full-time employees and for two full-time employees who are scheduled to return to active duty around March 1 after being released by their doctors under Workers' Compensation provisions. Brockman also noted that no more funds would be available for part-time workers.

Residents of Pct. 1 appeared at the meeting to request support from the commissioners' court for improvement of dirt roads in the precinct. Pat Elkins asked why the commissioners were against farmers helping to haul the low-grade caliche for placement on the roads.

Pct. 3 Commissioner Jeff Robertson remarked that the commissioners were not against the farmers' efforts as long as they complied with provisions of the law and requirements of the county's insurer, Upshaw Insurance.

Upshaw requires that anyone doing volunteer hauling for the county must present a certificate of insurance demonstrating \$500,000 liability coverage. If any are allowed to work without such coverage, the county's coverage could be cancelled or raised to a higher premium.

Smith told the commissioners that he currently knew of five persons who were doing some hauling without showing coverage. The other commissioners cautioned him to have it stopped immediately until coverage is shown. Smith inquired whether some sort of blanket coverage could be provided for volunteer workers, but Davis said the county cannot insure any vehicle to which it does not hold title.

Smith said he told one of those hauling the road material about the insurance provision and the man remarked that, "It wouldn't do no good, anyway," and that he didn't want to waste his time.

"That man is a taxpayer, and the taxpayers are my boss, not the other commissioners," Smith said. "I wish the other commissioners would spend as much time on their roads as they do trying to keep me from building up mine."

Robertson said that Smith was still obligated to follow the law, and that he (Robertson) did not want to be sued or go to jail because of Smith's actions.

The commissioners took a formal vote on requesting that Smith stop the hauling until proof of insurance is shown. Smith voted against the measure, with the other three in favor. Smith did agree to follow the request.

Later in the meeting, Smith asked the commissioners to reconsider payment of a bill he received for road work done by McLain at a cost of \$1,877.50. The court had earlier refused payment of the bill because Smith had authorized the work without going out for bids on it as had been requested by the court. Simpson told Smith to bring the bill to the next meeting of the court and it would be discussed.

The commissioners voted to allow Smith to invite an authority on road building to present a workshop in Castro County, as long as there is no cost to the county.

The commissioners authorized County Surveyor John Alldredge to begin work as soon as possible on surveying and marking section corners in the county as a Centennial project of the county. Alldredge told the commissioners that he charges \$15 per hour for his services, and noted that he may be able to begin as early as next week, depending on the weather.

Alldredge submitted a design for the section markers, saying he would make them at least five feet long and bury them to within six to eight inches of the surface. He recommended making the markers out of pipe enclosed in concrete and stacked in sections, so that if a top section is damaged it could be removed and replaced without losing the location.

The surveyor recommended 31 "urgently needed" markers, and agreed to report to the commissioners every two weeks on his progress and expenditures.

Alldredge complained to the commissioners that many of the survey marks he has set in the past have been moved, destroyed or carried off, and noted that such action is a misdemeanor.

He said that one of the worst offenders is the phone company in laying underground cables. He also pointed the finger at some of the commissioners, saying that grading of roads and installation of culverts sometimes disturb markers.

Alldredge told about survey marks he had found dating back to 1876, when the area was first surveyed, and he noted that some of those most historical marks have also been destroyed.

He concluded by citing scripture references in Proverbs 22:28, Deuteronomy 19:14 and Hosea 5:10 that enjoins the Israelites from "moving thy neighbor's boundary stone."

The commissioners voted to appoint Kylene Anthony as voting judge for absentee ballots for the Democrat Party Primary, replacing Joe Bob Sanders, who is unable to serve.

Senior member of the commissioners' court Vincent Guggemos was named county judge pro-tem by unanimous vote of the other commissioners.

# Cleveland: 'Coach of the Decade'

Dimmitt's Bobcats are a sure bet to play a prominent role in any "All-Decade" selections in Panhandle high school boys' basketball.

And they played it in spades Sunday when the Amarillo Globe-News announced its all-decade selections in its sports series, "Salute to the '80s."

Coach Ken Cleveland was named the Coach of the Decade.

His son, Kevin, was named one of the top eight players of the '80s.

DHS's state championship team of 1982-83 was named one of the five best teams of the decade.

Three Dimmitt games and the Nazareth Swifts' state championship game of 1986 were selected among the best 10 games of the decade.

Here's what Globe-News sports writer Lance Lahmert had to say about Coach Cleveland:

"Kenneth Cleveland will be the first to tell you the basketball tradition at Dimmitt High School started long before he arrived on the scene in 1961.

"That might be true. But Dimmitt's fortunes have turned to gold with the cool hand of Cleveland at

the helm. Especially impressive are the numbers the Bobcats put up in the 1080s:

Ten seasons of 20 wins or more. A 38-0 record in 1982-83. A streak of 45 wins in a row. Ten playoff berths. Eight straight trips to the regional tournament. Six trips to Austin for the state tournament (the other four years, the team that beat Dimmitt in the playoffs advanced

to state). Two Class 3A championships. A final tally in the '80s of 282 wins and 83 losses."

"Cleveland... said his favorite moment of the '80s is hard to pinpoint, 'but if I had to say, it was probably the year we went 38-0 (1982-83) and won it all. My son (Kevin) came off the floor for the last time and gave me a hug. It was a special moment.'"

Named as the all-decade Panhandle-area team were Bubba Jennings, Clovis; Ed Cunningham, Sanford; Fritch; Coyle Winborn, Pampa; Mike Nelson, Pampa; and Sammy Simpson, Amarillo High.

Named as the all-decade "off the bench" players were Kevin Cleveland, Dimmitt; James Dawn, Amarillo Tascosa; and Terry Whitcher, Borger.

Picked as the top 10 teams of the decade were (1) 1985-86 Amarillo High, 31-5; (2) 1986-87 Amarillo High, 30-4; (3) 1981-82 Pampa, 29-5; (4) 1988-89 Tascosa, 25-8; (5) 1982-83 Dimmitt, 38-0; (6) 1980-81 Canyon, 29-9; (7) 1982-83 Borger, 29-7; (8) 1984-85 Amarillo Palo Duro, 24-8; (9) 1985-86 Borger, 26-4; and (10) 1979-80 Clovis, 27-4.

Chosen among the 10 best games of the decade were Dimmitt's 60-59 win over Linden-Kildare in the state championship game March 13, 1982, when Phil King rebounded Kevin Cleveland's rim-out shot and put it back up for the winning basket with just one second left; Dimmitt's 56-57 loss to Cleveland in the 1986 state championship game; Nazareth's 53-49 victory over Archer City in the 1986 Class A state championship game; and Perryton's 59-58 victory over Dimmitt in the 1981 bi-district championship game, when the Rangers (ranked No. 1 in the state) came from a 17-point fourth-quarter deficit to win the game over Dimmitt (ranked No. 2) with five seconds left.

**Conservation Conversation**  
 Running Water Soil & Water Conservation District

The Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District is in the process of purchasing two new pieces of equipment that will not only enhance the quality of the service that the local SCS personnel can provide to local producers, but will also assist the local SCS personnel in making better use of their time. The two new pieces of equipment are a laser level and an ultrasonic flowmeter.

With the laser level, one person can lay out terraces and check out terraces, lay out ditch lines, tailwater ditches, stake and check out tailwater pits, stake out row direction, stake and check out diversions, etc. Almost any practice that required a two-man SCS crew can now be operated by one man.

The ultrasonic flowmeter will allow the SCS personnel to complete more sprinklers and well evaluations each year. The information gathered with the flowmeter will also be more accurate and precise than information gathered with the turbine flowmeters. With the ultrasonic flowmeter, some of the information one can acquire includes gallons per minute, gallons per hour, velocity of the water, and any negative movement of the water if more than one well is being used.

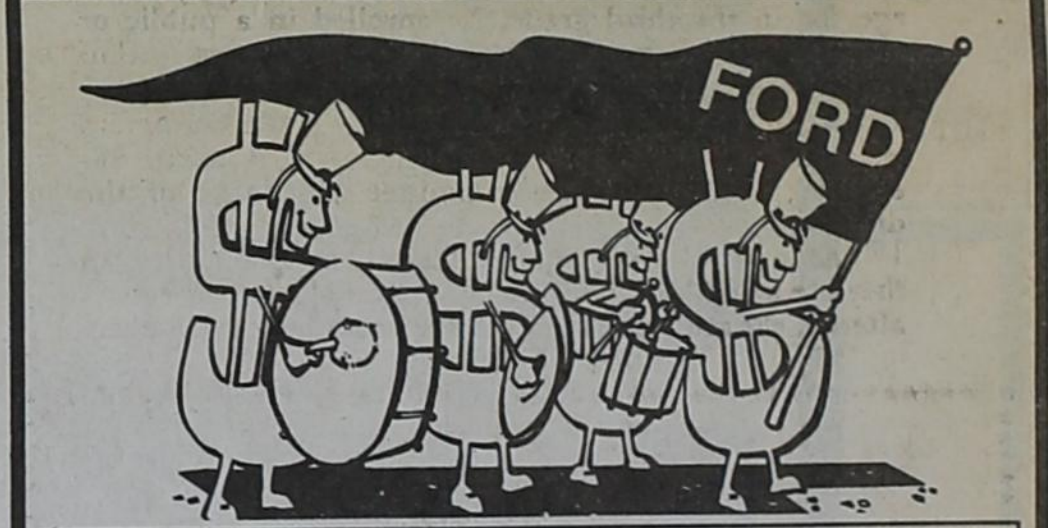
With these two new pieces of equipment, even though the SCS personnel has declined and the workload has remained heavy, the problem of having unanswered requests or requests postponed will be eliminated and the quantity and quality of assistance will be increased.

The Running Water SWCD has

made an application to the Texas Water Development Board in Austin for a grant which would, if accepted, pay for 75% of the cost of the laser level and flowmeter. The total cost for both is \$10,885.

The District's funding is based on a matching fund system, in which the state matches local funds acquired through donations, tree sales, and use of the District grass drill. The District is seeking anyone or any group interested in making a donation toward the purchase of the laser level and the ultrasonic flowmeter. 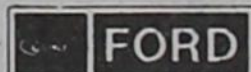

# Here are the 1990 junior livestock show regulations

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

### I. General

- All entries must be sent to the Young Farmers, Vo. Ag. Department, Dimmitt High School, 1505 Western Circle Drive by 5:00 p.m., January 29, 1990. Any incomplete or unsigned or late entry will be fined \$25.00.
- Entry fee — To be used for bedding, show expense, etc.  
Calves . . . . . \$10.00  
Barrows and Lambs . . . . . \$10.00
- All livestock must be in place by 12:00 p.m., Wednesday, February 14, 1990. Weighing will begin at 4:30 p.m., must be weighed by 8:00 p.m.
- All animals must be weighed at the time of entry by the official weighers. Only one weigh back will be allowed if the animal does not make the limits set. This weigh back must be within one hour of the first weighing or at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- All animals will be ear-tagged or numbered by the County Agent or Ag Teacher before they are weighed.
- Each exhibitor will not be allowed to show more than two calves, two barrows, and two lambs. Exhibitor will be allowed to sell no more than three animals and only two animals in any division. If individual shows more than three animals, he must notify the Superintendent immediately after judging which three animals he will place in the sale.
- The number of animals that will be sold through the auction will be as follows: 125 Barrows, 125 lambs, 40 steers, or 75% of the total animals that are weighed in. Whichever is the smaller number:
- The percent of the animals to be sold will be figured on each class. If animal eligible to sell is pulled, the next animal in line from that class will sell. This will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- Animals that make the show but do not make the sale will be sold with the floor animals, unless exhibitor pulls the animals by one hour after showing.
- All livestock will be sifted by weight. Sifted animals will be the responsibility of the owner and must be removed from the barns by 10:00 p.m. on Wednesday.
- A division showmanship trophy will be awarded for Beef, Swine, and Sheep. The animals must have been owned, fitted, and groomed by the exhibitor for the exhibitor to be eligible for a showmanship trophy.
- No calf will be allowed in the show that has not been owned as of September 1st. Barrows and lambs must have been owned as of December 1st.
- Only active 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show. All livestock entered in the show must have been fed under the supervision of the Castro County Agent or a Vocational Agriculture Teacher of Dimmitt, Hart or Nazareth High School and must be so certified by one of the above on the entry card.
- To be eligible to show, all 4-H club members must be enrolled in a Castro County 4-H club under the supervision of the Castro County Agent. All FFA members must be enrolled in a Castro County school. All exhibitors must reside in Castro County, be at least nine (9) years of age, or in the third grade, be enrolled in a public or private Elementary or Secondary school located within the county.
- All animals must be reasonably dry and clean before weighing. Any animal not so, may be declared ineligible to show by the committee in charge of the division.
- Animals are the responsibility of the exhibitor until they are loaded on the truck. Any animal left in the barn after trucks are loaded are the responsibility of the seller.

- The Dimmitt Young Farmers shall reserve the right to disqualify any exhibitor or animal for any reason that is deemed necessary. Also the Young Farmers will not be responsible for any injury, loss, or damage to persons or property arising from the Castro County Junior Livestock Show and Sale.
- Exhibitors and show officials will be the only persons allowed in the show ring.
- Any animal sold on floor must have been entered in show.
- Any exhibitor found violating the rules may be subject to a fine up to \$200 and suspension from the County show for a period of 1 year. The person signing the entry card may also be fined up to \$200. Entry cards will not be accepted from the offending organization until the fine is paid.
- All protests must be in writing and be accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the livestock show management immediately after occasion for such protest. The protest committee will consist of the Young Farmer officers and the various Division Superintendents.
- No animal may leave the stock show premises from the time of weigh-in until after the show without the approval of the Superintendent. All take home animals must be checked out of barns by noon on Saturday.
- Each club will be responsible for cleaning their pen. If pens are not cleaned a fine of \$200 will be levied. Check will be held until fine is paid. All pens must be cleaned by 6:00 p.m. Sunday.
- No change in the pattern or highlighting of any animal in all 3 barns by painting or dyeing will be allowed.
- No adults in show ring during show or classification.
- Exhibitors ineligible to participate at the Castro County Jr. Livestock Show due to the NO PASS AND NO PLAY rule cannot have another or others exhibit the animal or animals in question.

### II. CLASSIFYING

Lambs will be weighed and classified at 4:30 P.M. on Wednesday in the show ring. Calves will be weighed upon arrival at the show and classed by height and weight. Steer classes will be determined by the Superintendent. At least five animals are needed to make a class. Any animal not classified at proper time must wait until last to be classified.

#### Judging Schedule

- Lambs - 8:00 a.m., Friday, February 16
- Steers - 11:00 a.m., Friday, February 16
- Barrows - 1:00 p.m., Friday, February 16

### III. STEER DEPARTMENT

- Only steers are eligible to show.
- All calves in the show must weigh at least 900 pounds, however, 1350 pounds is the top pay weight.
- The first and second place winners in each of the classes will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the Show.
- Awards:  
Placings . . . . . Ribbons  
Grand Champion . . . . . Banner  
Reserve Grand Champion . . . . . Banner
- If there is not enough of any one class to be placed in a separate class, they will be classed with another class.

### IV. LAMB DEPARTMENT

- Both wethers and Ewe lambs are eligible to show.
- There will be 4 breeds of lambs as follows:  
a. Fine wool — This class shall include only purebred of grade Rambouillet or Delaine or a cross between these two breeds.  
b. Fine Wool Cross — This class will include lambs sired by Suffolk, Hampshire, Corriedale, or Columbia rams and out of fine wool ewes. Lambs that carry more than 50% medium wool breeding will go into the medium wool class.  
c. Medium Wool Class — This class shall include only purebred or grade Hampshire, Suffolk, Corriedale, and Columbia or other medium wool cross.  
d. Southdowns - This class is only for purebred Southdowns or lambs that exhibit predominant Southdown characteristics.
- Weight Classes:  
Breeds of lambs will be divided into light - medium - heavy classes if there is as many as 30 animals in a breed class, otherwise a light and heavy class. The minimum weight will be 80 lbs. There will not be a top weight, but the maximum pay weight will be 130 lbs.
- Lambs will be classified in show ring according to breed before weigh-in. A classifying committee will assist the Superintendent in placing the animals in the proper class. Classifier's decision will be final.  
If there are more than 50 in one breed, the Superintendent will break the breed into four classes: Light, Medium, Medium Heavy and Heavy.
- Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show.
- Lambs wool should be uniform length no more than 1/4 inch in length. Top knots are permitted.
- Where 4 animals are not available to make weight classes, then lightweights and heavyweights will be grouped into a single breed class.
- Awards:  
Placings . . . . . Ribbons  
Grand Champion . . . . . Banner  
Reserve Champion . . . . . Banner

### V. SWINE DEPARTMENT

- Only Barrows are eligible to show.

- Barrows weighing less than 210 pounds or more than 260 pounds will be sifted from the show. There will be 5 pounds variance up or down one weigh back.
- No feeding in aisles.  
All feed will be dumped outside, on south side of barn.
- There will be 7 breeds of barrows as follows:  
a. Berkshires  
b. Chester Whites  
c. Durocs  
d. Hampshires  
e. Spot and Poland Chinas  
f. Yorkshires  
g. Crosses and other breeds  
If there are more than 50 in one breed, the superintendent will break the breed into 4 classes: Light, Medium, Medium Heavy, and Heavy.
- The barrows will be divided as follows:  
If there are less than 30 barrows in one breed:  
Lightweight: 210 - 235 lbs.  
Heavyweight: 236 - 260 lbs.  
If there are more than 30 barrows in one breed:  
Lightweight: 210 - 225 lbs.  
Mediumweight: 226 - 240 lbs.  
Heavyweight: 241 - 260 lbs.
- At judges discretion, any obvious violation of classification will result in disqualification of animal in question.
- First and second place barrows from each class will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed.
- Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show.
- Where 5 animals are not available to make weight classes, then lightweights and heavyweights will be grouped into a single breed class.
- Barrows will be sold at weigh-in weights.

### VI. SALE 1:00 p.m., Saturday, February 17, 1990

- Exhibitors selling livestock must have their animals ready to be brought into the auction ring when their number is called.

1. Grand Champion Steers, Barrows, Lambs  
Reserve Champion Steers, Barrows, Lambs  
All breed champions  
All reserve breed champions  
2. 1/2 Barrows  
3. 1/2 Lambs  
4. 1/2 Steers  
3. All animals that are to be sold as take homes must be listed on the sale sheet prior to the sale. Animals not listed as a take home on the sale sheet will be sold. If any exhibitor wants to list animals as a take home, it is his responsibility to notify his County Agent or Vo-Ag Teacher. The County Agent or Vo-Ag Teacher will present a list of the floor animals and take home animals within one hour after the judging. If not notified the animal will be considered a floor animal. A fee of \$50 will be charged to add or take off a take home animal. Ag Teachers and County Agents are required to remain at show until all animal counts are balanced.  
4. Exhibitors will be allowed to sell a total of three animals and no more than two in any division.  
5. Any animal donated to be sold back will be sold after this sale.

# Fructose is 'select' for Campbell's products

The fructose and high fructose corn syrup produced at American Fructose Corp. in Dimmitt is "Mmm, good" according to Campbell Soup.

Campbell Soup Co. now recognizes the Dimmitt plant as its "Select Supplier" of fructose and high fructose corn syrup and presented AFC officials with a plaque last Thursday morning in Dimmitt.

Bill Ballentine, director of operations for American Fructose's Dimmitt operation, accepted the award from Chuck Miller, Campbell Soup's director of procurement.

The "Select Supplier" status is the highest quality supplier award presented by Campbell's. It requires a lot of work to achieve the quality, product uniformity, commitment to training and process evaluation programs, and exhibition of technological innovativeness necessary to achieve the goal.

"The progress you have made at this location (AFC, Dimmitt) is astounding. Normally, from a beginning point to a 'Select Supplier' status takes about three years," said Chuck Bally, a purchasing agent with Campbell Soup's Paris, Texas plant.

"We, at the Paris plant, are very excited that we now can call American Fructose in Dimmitt one of our few select suppliers. It's an ongoing program. We like to feel that this is the initial goal that we have reached, but we've really just put in place the tools that we can really begin to reap benefits with, particularly with employee involvement and the use of statistical tools," Bally said.

"This is a very detailed program. It takes a lot of work on both Campbell's part and the suppliers' part. Basically, the program defines quality by using statistical process

controls, a method of training employees and employee involvement. It's a matter of looking at a product or ingredient on a total cost basis as opposed to a purchase price. A partnership or relationship then is established with the vendor and we both work to improve the quality of their process and their products as well as our process and our finished products," he revealed.

"It's a long program. In some instances we've been working with people for three to four years. American Fructose has really embraced the program and they've worked like gangbusters to get themselves to this position. They have a very fine operation here," Bally said.

"At the end of this year we'll have slightly over 100 suppliers to Campbell Soup Co. on a worldwide basis that are select suppliers. That's out of 4,000, so it's a very unique and select group."

"Because American Fructose is a select supplier, we know their product is right. We know they take it seriously because they've seen the benefits of it, not for Campbell Soup, but for American Fructose," said Miller.

The fructose produced at American Fructose in Dimmitt is the only fructose used in products manufactured at the Paris plant, according to Bally and Miller. And it's used a lot.

"Fructose goes into a large percentage of our soup products. Franco American, our spaghetti products, our pork and bean lines, all of our home cooking products (Chunky Soup, Home Cookin' Soup, etc.) and our red and white label soups use fructose," Bally said.

"One of the big items we will use the corn syrup produced from this plant in will be Prego," Miller said.

Campbell's isn't producing Prego at its Paris plant yet, but it plans to later in the year.

"We are in the process of expanding our plant. We will be producing Prego in the fall and we will have a requirement for corn syrup then," said Bally.

Fructose isn't the only product Campbell's gets from this area.

According to Miller, several vegetables, some beef and sugar are acquired from the High Plains area.

"We use some carrots that are grown on the High Plains and I'm sure some beef from this area gets

into our system," Miller said. He added that sugar, from Holly Sugar Corp. in Hereford, is also used in some of the Campbell Soup products.

"It has been a wonderful experience to work with Campbell's," said George Chu, director of quality assurance for American Fructose Corp. "Through this 'Select Supplier' program we have learned a lot of things from Campbell's. We, as a company, have totally accepted this Campbell's philosophy and have implemented it. We are implementing their statistical process controls in the plant. The people

from the plant have shown tremendous cooperation. They (AFC's employees) are changing from an old culture to a new one and have adapted very well. I think it's a big compliment to the people involved."

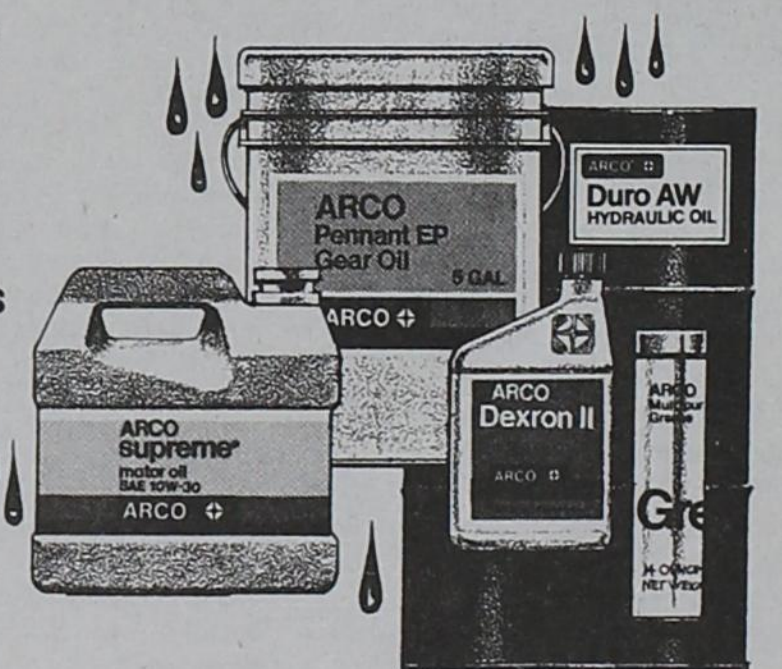

A 20-year-old Hart man was arraigned on felony charges of aggravated assault on a peace officer in connection with a Dec. 9 incident, and has been released on \$10,000 bond, pending action of the grand jury.

Sheriff's deputies are investigating vandalism at the Dimco building east of Dimmitt. Entry to the building apparently was gained by kicking in a door. Windows were broken and the office area was ransacked, but apparently nothing was taken. No estimate was given for the damages.

Al Webb, manager of Farm and Ranch Supply in Dimmitt, told police last Thursday that someone apparently had taken \$110 in cash from a bank bag in a desk in the office of the business. Webb said he left the office unattended only once that day, and reported that a suspect had been around at about that time. Investigation is continuing.

A 17-year-old Dimmitt woman told police Jan. 23 that a 19-year-old man had hit her in the face and hit her 2-year-old son on the legs with a belt. He had also allegedly threatened to kill her. Police removed the woman and child from the home, where the suspect was sleeping, and took them to a friend's home. No warrant had been issued in the case as of Tuesday afternoon.

A 15-year-old Dimmitt student told police Friday night that a suspect had hit her in the face, bit her

left palm and pulled her hair in a fight. Investigation is continuing.

Dept. of Public Safety Trooper Jimmy Dunklin stopped a car early Monday and arrested the driver on misdemeanor charges of DWI, second offense, and the four passengers on charges of public intoxication. The five men were all from Friona, and have all been released.

DPS Trooper Nick Hand investigated a traffic incident in Hart Friday night, when the city marshal was unavailable to respond. Hand noted that a pickup driven by Chawick H. Hill, 17, of Hart, was stopped at the intersection of FM 168 and Ave F. As Hill attempted to make a right turn, a car driven by Baltazer Alcalá, 19, of Hart pulled to the right of the pickup into its turning path. Both vehicles sustained light damage and no injuries were reported, according to Hand.

Joe Gomez, 18, of Dimmitt, was ticketed Saturday night in Dimmitt

for no liability insurance and no driver's license. Gomez had been driving his car south on North Broadway, and struck the back end of another vehicle stopped at the signal light at the intersection with Bedford. Driver of the other vehicle was Juan Garcia Jr., 20, of Dimmitt. Both vehicles sustained moderate damage, but no injuries were reported.

Ed White of the J.E. Merit Construction Co. told police Jan. 24 that someone had slashed all four tires on his car, and estimated the damage at \$280.

Saturday, Susie Gonzales of 104 NW Fifth Street in Dimmitt reported to police that two lounge chairs were missing from her front porch. She valued the missing items at \$60 each.

Two incidents of disorderly conduct were reported during the past week, along with one DWI and one case of public intoxication in addition to the five Friona men.
