Decords of the work done in appropriations committees seem to indicate that both the House and the Senate may have tried to do an stelligent job of cutting, with their eyes open and the blindfold re-noved, though this is hard to believe. Under the Reorganization Act, the two appropriations committees were allowed to decide for them-selves how big a staff they would need. In addition to the usual batch of clerks, each committee set up a research and investigation staff.

THOUGH the Democrats have tried to make a case that there was no oom for economy below the President's budget estimates and pooh-pooled Republican economy efforts so far, there is no tion of the need for a lot of meat-axe wielding.

In the depression government spending contributed a great deal to the national economy and was allowed to grow too big. In the war which followed every government agency had all the money it could use. The way the millions were scattered around was nothing short of a national scandal.

Chopping a billion and a half off the War Department, cutting Labor Department by 43 per cent and Interior by 45, lopping \$30 million off Treasury when it has \$600 million to collect from tax dodgers and killing the State Department's \$31 million International Information program when Russia is spending ten times that amount on propaganda may all be crazy and suicidal. But the economizing job has to be done. Making these and all the other agencies come in and prove

how necessary they are is good business.

Also, what the House does on these appropriation bills isn't the last word. The Senate has to review all these actions. Historically, the Senate has corrected many mistakes made by the House. This is legislating by trial and error, but it is the best system anyone has so far invented to see that the job gets done.




