BEVIN GIVES AMERICAN AID VIEWS

PARIS — British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin brought to the European Big Three meeting today American views on European reconstruction which may strongly influence Russia's decision to join or reject a unified recovery program. Bevin arrived at Lebourget from London, was met by Foreign Minister Georges Bidault, refused a public statement and hurried to the British embassy. Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, Bevin and Bidault met in the "parrot" room of the foreign ministry. From the conference will emerge Molotov's decision whether Russia will join Britain and France in organizing an American-aided recovery program. If Molotov refuse Europe may split in half economically.

RIVER MAY MATCH ALL TIME HIGH

ST. LOUIS — The corps of engineers predicted today the Mississippi river would reach its highest flood stage in more than a century at St. Louis by Monday. The coast guard estimated at least 4,000 persons already were homeless in the St. Louis area as heavy rains continued to swell the flooding Mississippi and Missouri rivers which met just north of here. The engineers said the fight to hold the Stringtown levee north of Chester, Ill., had been given up and water was pouring over more than 13,000 acres of cropland in that district. The engineers said the river, now at 38 feet, eight above flood, would approach the all-time high of 1844 when it reached 41.2 feet. Meanwhile, about 1,000 servicemen from this area were dispatched to help hold the still standing levees and to evacuate refugees from both streams.

COUNTRIES CHARGED WITH USING FORCE UPON GREECE

LAKE SUCCESS — The United States bluntly accused Albania, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia today of using force against Greece and demand that the United Nations Security Council use "the full weight of its authority" to halt them. American Delegate Warren R. Austin called for an early showdown with the three Balkan countries, claiming that they have been committing "the very kind of acts which the United Nations was designed to prevent." World peace will be even more seriously threatened, Austin said, if "the acts... against Greece's independence should continue." Austin said the acts of the three Balkan countries were as bad as "actual invasion by organized armies." He said the future of the UN may depend on how the case is settled. In the strongest speech yet delivered by an American in the council, Austin said the diplomatic and guerrilla warfare in the Balkans had grown into "one of the most serious" cases yet before the UN.

All members of the Reyes family are quite musical, and the parents, recognizing their son's talent, took abroad to study at the age of twelve. He has performed with great success in France, Belgium and Cuba before his dramatic New York Debut in 1941. Since then he has appeared with the New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra and on numerous radio programs such as the Voice of Firestone. ABBEY SIMON, who is ranked as one of the foremost young pianists of the times. He received his musical training principally at Curtis Institute and, shortly after his graduation, won the coveted Naumburg award which carries with it a Town Hall Debut in New York. During the summer of 1946 Mr. Simon appeared as soloist under Dmitri Metropoulos at the Philadelphia Dell, and under Efrim Kurtz with the New York Philharmonic in Lewisohn stadium.

Department Fires Persons Said To Be Disloyal

WASHINGTON — The state department today disclosed that it has recently dismissed 10 employees who were suspected of being disloyal to the United States. Names of the 10 dismissed were not disclosed, but a state department spokesman said they were fired "very recently." Secretary of State George C. Marshall was said to have ordered the dismissals under a public law giving him "absolute discretion" to fire state department employees "in the interest of the United States."

Application For Airport Aid Being Prepared

Ed S. Martin, consulting engineer who made the master plan for the Ranger Airport, is in Ranger assisting the Chamber of Commerce in drawing up papers relative to securing federal aid for the airport improvements. An application for aid is being prepared and will be submitted to the city commission who in turn will submit it to the Civil Aeronautics Authorities.

Company Says Production Cut 55 Per Cent

PITTSBURGH — Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corp. announced today that it had been forced to slash its steelmaking operations in the Pittsburgh district by 55 per cent as a result of coal shortages. The corporation — largest operating subsidiary of U. S. Steel Corp. — said the cut back was the result of "the depletion of coal stocks, the elimination of beehive coke supply and the miners holiday." The United Mine Workers wildcat walkouts, blamed on resentment over passage of the Taft-Hartley labor law, have closed more than 1,000 soft coal pits in the nation, including all U. S. Steel mines in the Pittsburgh district.

Committee Make Appropriation For Civil Work

WASHINGTON — The House appropriations today voted \$334,186,369 for war department civil functions—including control and rivers-harbors projects—in the fiscal year starting next Tuesday. It was \$43,540,231 — 11.3 per cent less than requested by President Truman but still less of a cut than had been predicted. Flood control and rivers and harbors construction bore the brunt of the reduction. Major items in the bill. General flood control — \$132,041,800 less than requested for this purpose in the budget estimates. The remaining \$9,772,000 approved was for maintenance, surveys, emergency repairs and salaries in the chief army engineers office.

Indonesians Prepare For War With The Dutch

BATAVIA — Indonesian Republic officials today began to strip their files and burn documents in preparation for the expected outbreak of war between the Dutch and the Indonesians. Tension was mounting hourly. An Indonesian source said that Republican liaison missions were preparing to leave Batavia for Republican-held territory this week-end. Most of the high Republican officials already had left Batavia but information ministry employees were ordered to remain at their posts. MacArthur To Return When Treaty Finished

TOKYO — Gen. Douglas MacArthur told visiting American newspaper executives today that he will return to the United States upon completion of the Japanese peace treaty, which he predicted would be signed within 12 to 18 months. MacArthur said he personally knew of no reason why the treaty could not be signed within a year. Failure to sign the peace treaty is costing the United States Government \$1,000,000 a day, MacArthur said.

Brigham Young Chair Given To Mormon Museum

PONCA CITY, Okla. (UP) — Frederick L. Hanks has decided that an old kitchen chair he inherited as a family heirloom was made by Brigham Young, one of the founders of the Latter Day Saints (Mormon) Church. He promised to donate the chair to a group of women church members in Salt Lake City, Utah, who asked that the chair be placed in their museum of early-day Mormon mementos. Checking the chair's history, Hanks found that one of his great grandfathers bought it in 1834 at a cabinet maker's shop near Mendon, N.Y. Mormon church history indicates that Brigham Young operated the shop as a young man and that he made chairs, tables and other furniture for farmers in the Mendon community.

Former Navy Divers Put Skill To Good Use

ST. MARIES, Ida. (UP) — Six former navy divers, veterans of salvage operations in the Aleutians and the South Pacific, are engaged in an unusual logging operation here—hauling sunken logs from the St. Joe River. The divers, all from Spokane, Wash., bought war-surplus diving equipment and pontoons to raise the logs, which lie 15 deep below the log slip of the St. Maries Lumber Co. The men take turns donning the lead-weighted diving suit and helmet and going down 40 feet to the river bottom to hook tongs on the logs, some of which have lain under water since the mill began operating in 1913.

KENTUCKY CUT
TO GET SHARE
TOURIST TRADE

FRANKFORT, Ky. (UP)—Kenti-
ucky has set out to capture part
of the nation's tourist business to
contribute to its own economic
well-being.

The Kentucky executive cabinet
approved a plan of its commis-
sioner of conservation, Harold A.
Browning, for construction of
hotel facilities in six of its leading
state parks.

"This is only a beginning," said
Brown, who announced that the
initial outlay would involve spend-

ing from \$1,300,000 to \$2,000,000.
One of the projects includes a
100 to 200 room hotel at Kentucky
Lake near Gilbertsville, site of the
huge Tennessee Valley Authority
dam.

Additional hotels and cabins will
be constructed at Carter Caves,
Cumberland Falls, Butler Memori-
al near Carrollton Natural Bridge
and Pennyrite State Park.

A bond issue will be floated to
finance construction of the hotels.
Bonds will be payable from hotel
earnings.

"If we are to share in the nation-
wide tourist business," Brown-
ing said, "we must be willing to
make the initial outlay to attract
tourists to our borders."

"Kentucky's share of the pre-
war tourist traffic was \$68,000,-
000 a year. That can be raised
easily to \$200,000,000 a year. All
we need to do is provide sufficient
facilities for the tourists. We have
natural attractions galore that will
bring many to our gates."

"Natural beauty abounds here.
It is not necessary to leave Kentu-
cky to see beauty and sights
worthwhile. Our Mammoth Cave
(now a National Park), Cumber-
land Falls, Natural Bridge, Carter
Caves and other sites offer the
tourist all that is desired."
