The Jaycees this morning asked us to thank the Jaycee wives who sold tickets and the young ladies that aided in the Safety program. The wives and the girls all worked hard on their tasks and gave a valuable contribution to the show.

Mary Ann Estes, whose husband was one of the men who put on the rodeo show told us Saturday night that this was one of the best shows that they'd ever had and that there were more entries in the events than at any other show they'd ever staged.

Mayor Lee Dockery was among the many mayors that were entertained at the big celebration in Fort Worth Sunday at which the named "City of Fort Worth" B-36-A1 was dedicated and named "City of Fort Worth."

### Dominican 'Invasion' Reports Continue



Reports of a portending "invasion" of the Dominican Republic (1) have gained impetus with word from the Tampa, Fla. (2) custom collector of an unauthorized flight of seven fighter planes—flight origin undisclosed—following previous reports that a three-ship invasion force of 3000 embarked from Cuba (3). Twenty planes were patrolling the Dominican coast, according to word from Ciudad Trujillo (Santo Domingo). Dominican Ambassador Frier said the invasion force was composed of "Communist revolutionaries" recruited in Cuba, Guatemala, Venezuela, and Puerto Rico, which those governments deny. (NEA Newsmag).

### NEW SOVIET AIRCRAFT UNVEILED

MOSCOW—Allied military observers were impressed today by a series of new Soviet aircraft, including jet models, unveiled at a mammoth air show for Premier Josef Stalin and other Communist leaders.

Six types of jet-propelled planes participated in the demonstration. Pravda, the Communist party organ, said a seventh had been created. Almost every one of the Soviet's top designers was represented, indicating the stress which the Soviet placed on jets.

Besides jet planes, Soviet pilots displayed a Lovochkin propeller-driven fighter with a ability to climb almost vertically. Three new types of four-engine transports also were shown publicly for the first time.

"The progress the Russian aviation industry has made since the end of the war is, to say the least startling," said one Allied military observer.

Another observer said the show "should impress on us all the fallacy of under-estimating Soviet aviation."

### Churchill Says Loan Frittered Away By British

WOODSTOCK, Eng. —Winston Churchill charged today that the Labor government had "frittered away" the American loan on "indulgences" such as picture shows and tobacco instead of spending it for post-war rehabilitation.

In his first political speech since he underwent an operation for hernia, the wartime Prime Minister ripped into the Laborites for their policies while the nation was drifting toward economic disaster.

The Laborites, Churchill said, waited until too late because they were too "busy planning and making their brave new world of controls and queues, of hordes of officials and multitudes of regulations."

### Truman Returns From Camp Visit

WASHINGTON — President Truman returned to the White House at 10:45 a. m. CST today after a restful but cool week-end at Shangri-La, presidential hide-away camp in the Catoctin Mountains of northern Maryland.

On the way home, the President stopped at suburban Silver Spring, where he met Mrs. Truman who arrived by train from their Independence, Mo., home.

### NEW PLAN FOR ARMED UNITS TOLD

WASHINGTON—Secretary of Defense James Forrestal has under consideration a plan for a sweeping reorganization of the Armed Forces to provide unified command of land, sea and air forces in and around the continental United States, service sources said today.

The plan has been worked out by the joint chiefs of staff. It provides for a single command with a staff of Army, Navy, and Air officers directly under the joint chiefs who would command the defense of the nation's borders.

It would provide for dividing the nation into strategic areas, each of which would have its own single commander over all three forces. This single command would relate to actual combat maneuvers, not to such problems as supply and administration.

Forrestal could put such a plan into effect through executive order without congressional approval, military authorities believe.

### MORE GIFTS TO FAYE REVEALED

WASHINGTON—While Elliott Roosevelt listened intently, publicity agent told Senate investigators probing the Howard Hughes plane contract recommendations made by Elliott that he gave expensive silk handbags to Faye Emerson, actress wife of the late president's son.

Meyer said Hughes, the west coast plane maker and movie producer, footed the bill for \$115 in silk hand bags for both Faye Emerson and Judy Cook, attractive underwater swimmer.

In a snappish mood, the pudgy Hughes' front man said they were "entertainment in general for Hughes aircraft."

When Meyer was called before the Senate investigating subcommittee today he was greeted immediately by the bill for \$115 which Chairman Homer Ferguson, R., Mich., produced.

The handbags were billed on Sept. 8, 1944, almost a year after Hughes had received a contract for fast photo-planes upon the recommendation to Gen. H. H. Arnold, Air Forces chief, by young Roosevelt, then an Air Force colonel.

Meyer previously had told the committee had played "cupid" for the Elliott-Faye romance which culminated in marriage in 1945. Roosevelt faced a barrage of questions from members who want to know if Hughes' lavish entertainment—including champagne and night club week-ends—swayed his judgment in recommending Army purchase of Hughes' planes despite adverse opinions by other top Air Force officers.

### Making Like Jeep With Fire Truck No Good

ARLINGTON, O. (UP) —Butler W. Reed now knows that a fire truck isn't quite like a jeep. Reed made a bet that he could drive a fire truck as he once drove a jeep. He picked up the Arlington fire department to try his experiment, and stole the truck.

The youth used all the gears generously as he plowed across fields and highways and laid low many miles of fences. Reed won the bet—\$25.

But Reed has to pay \$500 damage to the local village as well as report regularly to the town hall to polish the new fire engine. The polish is supplied free.

### INDONESIANS JOIN DUTCH IN WAR TRUCE

BATAVIA—The United Nations bid to end the two weeks of fighting in Indonesian was capped with apparent success today when the Indonesians joined the Dutch in issuing a cease fire order.

Radio Jogjakarta, operated by the Indonesian government, announced that a cease fire order was being issued to the Republican forces, effective at midnight 10:30 a. m. CST.

The House set by the Indonesians for the silencing the guns in the jungle skirmishing was the same as that the Dutch had fixed in acquiescing to the UN request.

Jogjakarta said President Soekarno of the Indonesian Republic would make a radio speech at the hour set for the end of hostilities, and would be followed on the air by Premier Amir Spahrriffoedin.

For a time the efforts to end the fighting appeared to have hit a snag. The Jogjakarta radio said earlier that Indonesia had agreed in principle to the proposal, but no plans to call off the Republican troops had been announced.

In reporting that Spahrriffoedin had received the UN request, the radio did not disclose the nature of his answer.

### TERMS OF THE OFFERS NOT MADE PUBLIC

DETROIT—The Ford Motor Company and the CIO United Auto Workers made counter offers today in their effort to settle a dispute over the Taft-Hartley law and avert a strike of 108,000 Ford workers at noon tomorrow.

Richard T. Leonard, UAW vice president, and his negotiators presented a new proposition aimed at sidestepping the wildest strike penalty section of the law.

John J. Sugas, Ford Vice-President, led his group into a caucus on the proposal and then emerged to present their views. After a brief joint session, Leonard's committee caucused. No word on the terms of either proposal was forthcoming from the meeting.

Both sides were working rapidly to seek a common ground on the Taft-Hartley dispute and a wrangle over a company-proposed pension plan before 2 p. m. when a UAW Ford council meets to take definite strike action.

### Gallant Homer Makes Himself Much At Home

NEW YORK (UP)—A blue-black pigeon with a droopy left wing flew into a window of the Long Island College Hospital and strutted around until he had made friends with the white uniformed girls in the X-ray department.

Reaching the smoky area, the ducks would become blinded and many would strike the net and fall to the ground. Indian women killed them with wooden clubs.

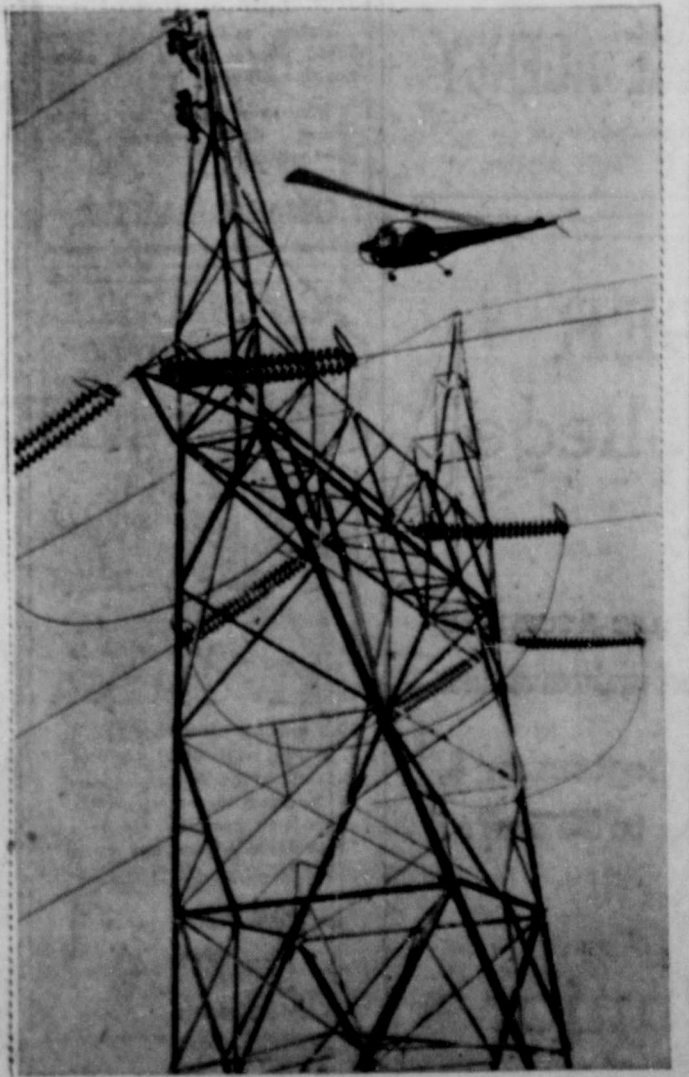

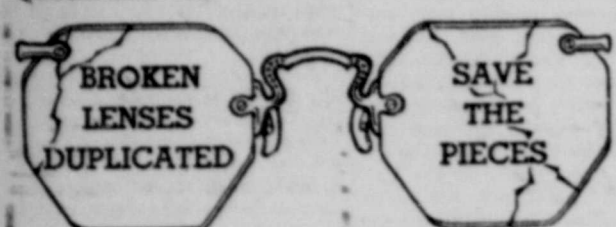

## Letter 'K' Heard Over Enemy Radio Clue To Missing Officer's Safety

**PHILADELPHIA (UP)**—The family of Cmdr. Richard O'Kane, American submarine skipper, never gave up hope that he was alive after they learned that his class at the U. S. Naval Academy had no midshipman whose last name began with "K".

The story of the O'Kane family hopes and their son's eventual rescue has just been revealed.

It began in November, 1944, when O'Kane's submarine Tang was reported overdue and presumed lost. No survivors were reported. O'Kane was believed dead.

But in March, 1945, rumors reached the United States that at least one member of the Tang's crew had lived.

In June of the same year, a prisoner of war speaking on a Japanese propaganda broadcast re-

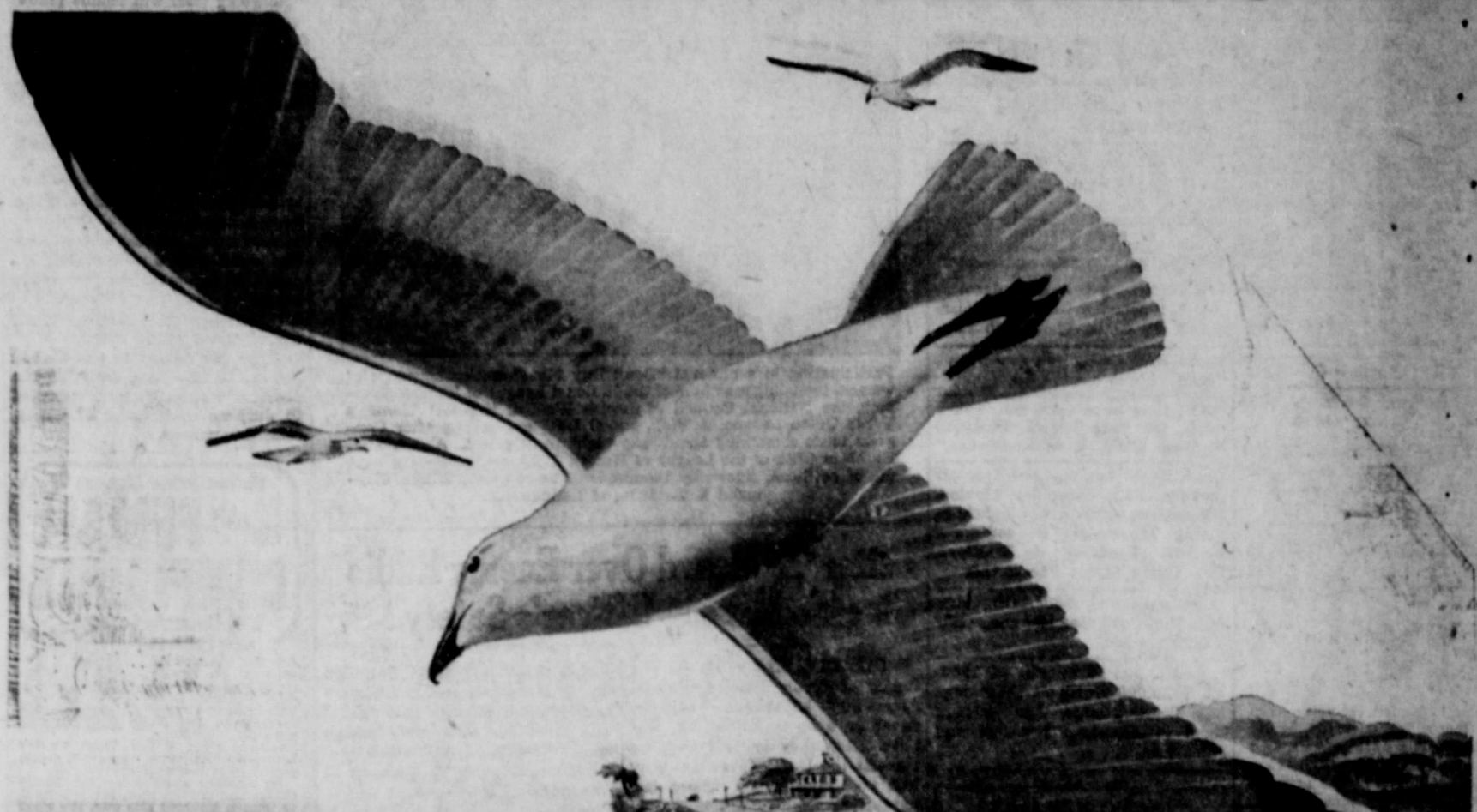
