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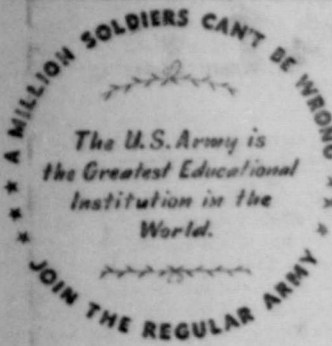
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Printer For 60 Years Still Runs Own Shop

Britain To Withdraw Part Of Loan From United States

WASHINGTON—Britain will withdraw \$450,000,000 of her loan from the United States between now and Aug. 29, leaving her only \$400,000,000 in remaining credits, it was learned authoritatively today.
The withdrawal of \$450,000,000 will be the last made by the British until agreement is reached on a permanent revision of the "free convertibility" clause of her \$3,750,000,000 loan from the United States. This clause required her to surrender dollars on demand to nations holding British pounds in certain accounts.
Britain notified the U. S. Treasury of her intention to make the additional withdrawals—in three \$150,000,000 lots—10 days ago, or well in advance of the "emergency" moratorium on the withdrawals.
The first withdrawal of \$150,000,000 will be made today. The second on Aug. 25, and the final one on Aug. 29.

Austrian Winter Peas, 3 1/2 c per pound; Hairy Vetch, 10c per pound; Mixed Vetch, 7c per pound; Common Vetch, 5c per pound; Hubam Clover, 7 1/2 c per pound; Mellilotus Indica, 5c per pound; Singletary Peas, 5c per pound; Blue Lupine, 2c per pound; Black medic, 12c per pound.

The farm limit for these seed will be figured at 50c per acre on total crop land, for example if a farm has 100 acres in cultivation the amount would be \$50.00 for legume seed. Receipts must be presented when prior approvals are obtained. There will also be a purchase order program in operation.

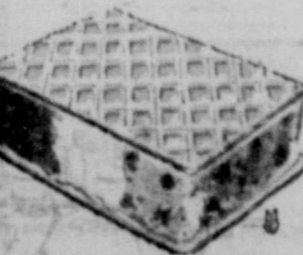

Official quarters said the Soviet note received by the State Department, objected to the three-power talks as a violation of the Potsdam Agreement.

The three power conference is scheduled to open in London on Friday.

Similar Soviet protests were understood to have been delivered to the London and Paris foreign

offices. The Soviet protest followed reports that France was willing to permit German steel production to be increased to 10,000,000 tons annually—a figure near that sought by the United States and Britain.

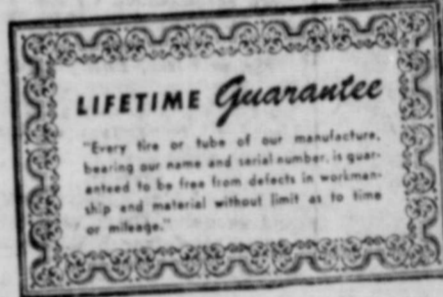
