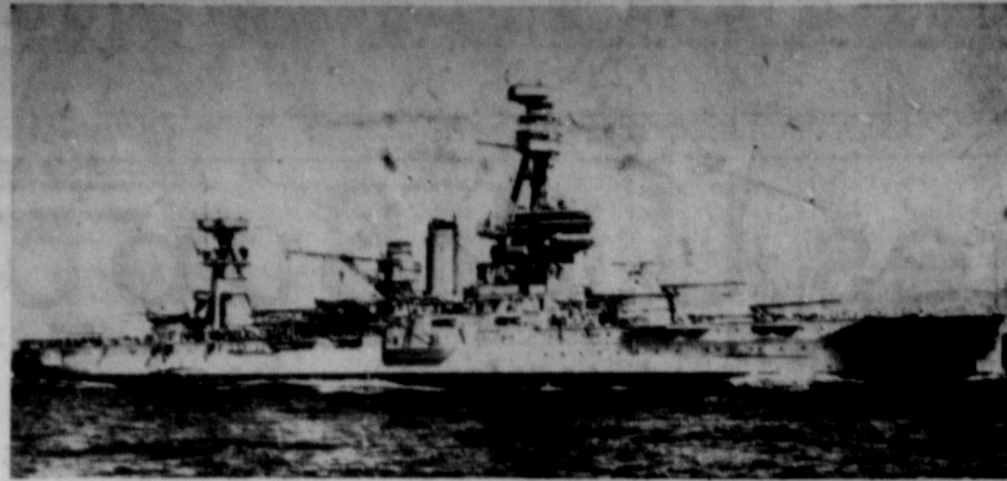

Greek Beheading Story Based On Officer's Bull

 LARISA, Greece (UP)—Notes from a war reporter's note book: Greek atrocity stories have priests being crucified by bandits and prisoners decapitated, some with jack-knives. Every bandit captured has been told the government troops will execute him. Basis for the beheading stories was when troops lopped off the heads of nine bandits killed in battle and brought them to headquarters "for identification." The rebels use this as battle propaganda, claiming the men were pri-

soners of war who had been executed. The local commander's excuse for bringing in the heads was that "there was inadequate transport for all the bodies."

Greek air force pilots claim the Yugoslavs have been training the bandits in anti-aircraft fire. They report increasingly strong ground fire and loss of six Spitfires since May. No rebel aircraft have yet opposed the Greeks. Nor any artillery. Heaviest weapons used by the guerrillas have been three-inch mortars. Most shamed man in Greece was the captured soldier who was freed by the partisans and sent home nude. He showed up in leaves.

Murder is only a misdemeanor in Greece, punishable by a jail sentence. Crimes "against the state" carry the death penalty. UNRRA has been a godsend in northern Greece, and the difference between death and existence.

UNRRA food stuffs to undernourished children are for sale in nearly all towns. The kids were given the food, they sold it to storekeepers, who now offer it as merchandise—at greatly increased prices. Child beggars roam all Greek streets.

The mountain villages are gradually being depopulated. Everybody is heading for this and other large towns which are immune

from bandit raids. The refugee problem, is becoming one of Greece's worst. Bandit leader Ispandis is regarded by the Communists as a second Robin Hood. He's reported to be a smallish man immaculate of dress, vain and quite a lady killer. General Markos, whose real name is Markos Vafiades, carries a price of 20,000,000 Greek drachmas (\$4,000) on his head. He's regarded by the Greek Government as public enemy No. 1. They'll take his noggin either dead or alive.

Burned-out trucks junked along the roadside, remind one of Patton's drive through France. The guerrillas captured them along the lonely mountain roads in their recent surprise attack in the Pindhos region. Everything the army has is British. The Greek army truck drivers prefer Canadian built trucks to British. None

lasts very long subjected to the torture of Greek terrain and gear smashing drivers. Captured partisans are mostly youngsters 16 and 22. Many of the arm reservists have been in uniform seven years.

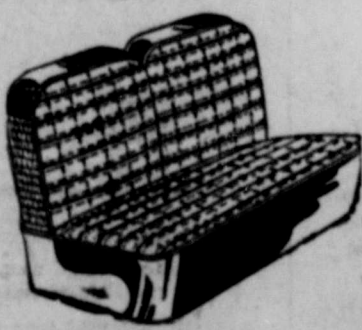

Only Lobsterwoman Brings In A Haul

SCITUATE, Mas. (UP) - A pert 21-year-old blonde is this town's first and only lobsterwoman and mossier.

Starting as a moss-gatherer at the age of nine, Miriam Flynn has built up a combination moss and lobster business that now requires five dories and two helpers. The day begins for her at 3:30 a.m., five months in the year.

When she pays off her helpers she has enough left for herself to double the salary of the average big-city secretary.

"Mim's quite a worker," they say along the waterfront. "She works twice as hard as any man and hauls as good a tide as any man can."

That means, in the lingo of the mossers, that Miriam, a perfect size 10, can scrape and pull as many pounds of carrageen from the rocks as any stalwart in that back-breaking business.

The moss that Miriam gathers, cures and stomps into 250-pound bales for shipment is used in making foods, medicine and beer.

And when the tide is too low for mousing, Miriam baits her 25 lobster pots, harvesting the night's catch and securing lobster claws with wooden pegs.

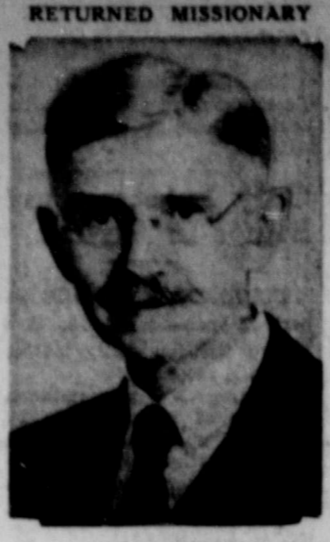
A&P To Put Out New Home Style Loaf of Bread
