Work On Library Club Building To Be Resumed

Work on completion of the wading pool and library building will begin immediately according to an announcement made today by the city commission. Work on completion of the tennis courts in Willow Park and lights at the Main Street railway crossing will also be resumed.

It was pointed out that speed of the work may be delayed due to the shortage of materials, but completion of the building will be speeded as much as possible.

The building is located in the southeast corner of Willow Park. When completed it will have a library room, a club room, a big reception room, rest rooms, and kitchen.

Members of the Ranger Civic League now have underway plans for building a library to house in the structure and some funds have already been pledged for the work.

Hollis Welch, VA Training Officers Resigns Position

Hollis A. Welch, veterans administration training officer stationed here since last November, has resigned and within the next few days will leave for Austin where he has accepted a position.

Mr. Welch stated that he did not know at this time who his successor in Eastland would be.

"Eastland is a town that grows on you and I regret that I must leave," Mr. Welch said. "I have made a lot of good friends here and in the adjacent territory that I have served."

Two thousand persons had been hurriedly evacuated from the lake area just before the full force of the storm struck. Some of the Army trucks transporting them were trapped by roads blocked by water and the evacuees walked and scrambled to dry areas.

Broken signs made foot-going tricky. Shattered neon tubing lay all around.

Many of the beautiful homes on the eight mile avenue circling Lake Pontchartrain were being damaged by flood waters.

WHITE RUSSIA JOINS SOVIET AGAINST U. S.

UNITED NATIONS HALL
Flushing, N. Y.—White Russia, following the lead of its mother state, today duplicated the Soviet attack on the United States as a "warmonger" and seconded the Soviet demand that the American press denied freedom to criticize Russia "on pain of criminal punishment."

Russian UN Delegate K. V. Kirselev's address to the UN General Assembly was almost a carbon copy of the vitriolic denunciation of the United States made yesterday by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky.

Other delegates were largely ignoring the Soviet charges and the Soviet resolution which would brand the U. S. as an instigator and fomenter of a third world war against the Soviet Union.

The Soviet proposal was headed for certain, overwhelming defeat. The Soviets went through the routine procedure early today of asking UN Secretary General Trygve Lie to place it on the assembly's agenda.

The United States was not without its supporters. Argentina's Jose Arce eloquently defended U. S. policy in Greece as an effort to prevent a world war.

Kirselev bitterly denounced the recent Rio De Janeiro Inter-American Defense Treaty and continuation of the Anglo-American joint chiefs of staff in Washington as signs that the western world is preparing for war again to be resumed.

It was stated that the commission has made a very few adjustments in valuation where inequality was evident but only 17 people have appeared before the body to discuss tax matters.

Arguments Due This Afternoon In Damage Suit In 91st Court

The hearing of testimony in the case of C. L. Archer vs. the City of Cisco et al, now on trial before Geo. L. Davenport of the 91st district court, was concluded this morning and court recessed until 2:00 o'clock this afternoon when arguments by attorneys will be heard.

C. L. Archer and his wife are suing the City of Cisco and others for damages to their son alleged to have been received February 7, 1946, when he was in custody of Cisco officers and a constable of the Cisco precinct.

The amount of damages sought is \$20,000 for their own mental suffering and \$80,000 for the injuries alleged to have been done to their son.

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As information we quote you minute passed by the State Highway Commission on Sept. 9, 1947:

"IN STEPHENS AND EASTLAND COUNTIES, it is ordered that a Farm to Market Road be designated from an intersection with US Highway 180 at Caddo to an intersection with US Highway 80 at Ranger, a distance of approximately 19 miles.

The State Highway Engineer is directed to assume existing road for state maintenance at such time as Stephens and Eastland Counties shall have agreed to secure right of way as may be considered necessary for the ultimate development of this road.

An appropriation is hereby made in the amount of \$30,000.00 in Eastland County to provide for the rehabilitation and improvement of this section and an appropriation is made in the amount of \$30,000.00 in Stephens County for rehabilitation of the existing road and the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with said work in the most economical manner."

GI'S GERMAN GIRLS FIND LIFE EASIER IN OCCUPATION

(Editor's note: William F. McMenamin, United Press War Department correspondent WEISBADEN, Germany (UPI)—The best-dressed German girl today is the American soldier's girl friend. She is well fed.

The non-fraternizing German girl is easy to pick out from the GI's girl friend. She wears ersatz shoes with wooden soles. The dress she wears is pre-war and shoddy.

The swimmer suffered a badly-mangled arm and leg and the bears several small caliber pistol wounds.

The GI buys luxury items to outfit his girl friend either in the post exchange or has them sent from the United States. Maybe he gets her a job in military government, particularly if he is an officer. Then she gets one meal a day of American food, served in a large central mess, to supplement her German ration.



get first chance at all feminine items in the post exchanges. But if items are not sold in about a month or two the PX holds a "sale" to clear out the items at bargain prices.

Unmarried officers and men are permitted to buy feminine items in the sales.

The result has been, most officers agree, an aggravation of the morale problem among the occupation forces. The European command is cracking down on men who maintain mistresses but the practice is still common.

Now that the non-fraternization ban has been lifted the GI can declare his intention to wed a German girl four months before his scheduled departure. One month before departure the marriage is performed, only after a careful check of the girl's morals and her political background.

The couple can go on an army-sponsored honeymoon in the Bavarian Alps or along the Rhine before departure for the States. But the couple cannot return to Germany during the occupation.

NEW YORK—(NEA)—The Amateur Championship of the United States Golf Association returning to the famous Pebble Beach course at Del Monte, Calif., Sept. 8-13, recalls one of the more dramatic of these shows.

In next to his last year as a regular combatant, 1929, the immortal Robert Tyre Jones, Jr., went out there in a private car. It was a pompous procession. Bobby Jones was to make a shambles of the field in the first national tournament ever held on the Pacific coast.

Earlier that summer, Johnny Goodman, from the wrong side of Omaha's tracks, had arrived in New York for the U. S. Open at Winged Foot in a cattle car.

And they had an even better story when Goodman promptly eliminated Jones.

Another remarkable golfer broke into the national picture the very next day when W. Lawson Little just as promptly knocked off Goodman.

The championship this year is once more being decided entirely at match play. In more recent tournaments 64 qualified in pre-match play medal.

Seventy-two holes of medal play is the only true test, but the simon-pures seem to prefer match play, though in 18 holes of the latter a player may survive with an 80 while another is put out with a 71. This trip the players reaching the 36-hole semi-finals will have to last through six 18-hole matches. The winner has to beat only

eight players as everybody else knocks everybody else out.

The field consists of 210, of whom 202 were determined by sectional qualifying rounds and eight were exempt therefrom as former U. S. or British amateur champions.

Ballard Harris Eastland, landed here last night in a Payne craft.

Scientists are perfecting an airplane that will fly in fifteen feet and land approximately the same distance. The first to do this has already been flown.

Wings for this aircraft are circular instead of elliptical behind the propeller. The propeller is placid wing, and the hole in this is created and it grows faster.

It is done. The plane will take-off fast and land on a hot day because the air is heavier and it is required faster.

An airplane will take-off on a 1000-foot runway at sea level, 2000 feet will be required for the same airplane to take-off at an elevation of 5000 feet. This is because of the difference in air density.

For this reason, the CAA requires a 1 per cent increase in the length of a runway for every 100 feet it is above sea level. The minimum length for light plane runways is 1800 feet at sea level.


