## Clayton Predicts Trade Peace In Europe

## UN HEALTH GROUP ISSUES CALL FOR WAR ON DISEASE

GENEVA (UP)—A new world war has been declared, but this one is against disease. International action to combat such world-wide scourges as tuberculosis, malaria and venereal disease was decided upon by the interim committee of the World Health Organization (WHO) at its fourth session in the United Nations Palace of Nations here. Representatives from 15 nations took part. The decisions of the WHO included an agreement to send small demonstration teams to countries on request to fight tuberculosis by initiating intensive programs of BCG vaccination as a means of prevention.

A long-range anti-tuberculosis program to be presented to the first World Health Assembly was however, deferred to the fifth WHO session.

The WHO agreed that the second meeting of the expert committee on malaria will be held in Washington in May 1948. The WHO report on malaria held out hope that DDT offered relatively cheap means of obtaining control of this major disease menace.

The conference authorized the setting up of an international influenza center in England to help combat another world-wide influenza epidemic such as the one after the first World War. The United States representative offered to make available the National Institute of Health in Bethesda, Md., as a regional influenza laboratory.

Regular testing of approved yellow fever vaccine was approved to be considered by the WHO representatives from Canada, Brazil, France, the United States and Russia. It was decided further to set up shortly expert committees on venereal diseases and for revision of existing sanitary conventions. The international experts on venereal diseases are to meet before the end of the year and to plan a world-wide campaign.

A new expert committee on international epidemics control will re-study existing international controls to prevent epidemics from spreading around the globe and to cope with the problem of disease control in connection with modern developments in transportation by land, sea and air.

The WHO secretariat was instructed by the conference to study the inadequacy of present and future insulin supplies for diabetes. The conference also decided to call the attention of the first World Health Assembly to the problem of alcoholism and asked for a study in co-operation with United Nations agencies.

Fifteen United Nations member countries so far have ratified the WHO constitution and eight non-member countries. The World Health Assembly is to be called six months after the 26th United Nations member country has ratified the constitution. The executive secretary, Dr. Brock Chisholm, said he expected 26 countries would ratify the constitution before the end of the year enabling the calling of the World Health Assembly during the first half of 1948.

## JUDGE SAYS DELINQUENCY ON INCREASE

"Juvenile delinquency in Eastland county is increasing each month and the attitude of parents of delinquents is alarming," was the opening remark of County Judge P. L. Crossley when he spoke to the Rotary Club Wednesday at noon at the Gholson Hotel. He was introduced by H. R. Hicks, who was in charge of the program for the day.

Going further into the subject, Judge Crossley stated that cases in the county range from one to 12 each week in number and the offenses vary as widely. He stressed the importance of the decision made by judges in such cases, pointing to the serious responsibility placed upon judges in deciding the disposition of the cases. "Juvenile delinquency in Eastland county is the concern of every citizen," the judge stated, "for these boys and girls are our citizens of tomorrow and it's up to us to do something about it."

Judge Crossley gave a detailed account of the present plan in the state for farm to market roads, or lateral roads, pointing out the fact that the plan does not provide sufficient funds for needed development. He cited the fact that the state highway system has been built on money provided by taxation and not under any such program as required for lateral road building.

The speaker strongly urged the adoption of the unit system of operation in Eastland county. This, he said, would provide more money for operation, facilitate operations and erase precinct dividing lines in the county. He backed up his argument by giving figures to show that precincts in the county that provide the greatest amount of funds, still have the same vote in county court as precincts that account for much less.

He closed his discussion with an accounting of county funds which he said are all in a very healthy condition.

B. A. Tunnell, president, presided at the meeting in which members voted unanimously to send written appreciation to Rev. J. B. Duesman for his fine work among the young people of Ranger and also to inform Scout leaders in Abilene of his scouting in this line.

Dr. Claude P. Jones delivered an invitation to the club to attend a joint meeting of the Eastland Lions and Rotary Clubs next Tuesday at which time Omar Burleson, congressman from the 17th District, will speak.

Guest at the meeting Wednesday were O. G. Henry of Dallas, H. N. Streit of Boone, Iowa, Lloyd Clem and Ray Ward, the latter two of Ranger.

## Warns Public On Cashing Checks

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UP)—When asked to cash a check, it pays to give it close examination, San Antonio's U. S. Secret Service Agent, Charles Ellis warns.

He cited as an example a case in which \$50 was paid to a woman when presented, complete endorsement, a piece of paper which not a check at all.

It was merely a notice from an army finance office saying that subsistence allowances to the addressee would be discontinued. It's only resemblance to a government check was its size.

Ellis explained that no federal action was possible because no forgery of a government check was involved.

"Uncle Bud" Warren of Amarillo, one of the most widely known singing teachers, will also be here.

## Louisville Gets Five Per Cent Rent Increase

WASHINGTON — Rent Director Frank Creedon today approved a five per cent rent boost for Louisville, Ky., landlords in the first action of its kind under the new rent law.

Creedon upheld the recommendation of the local Louisville rent board.

The Louisville board, composed of two realtors, two lawyers and a banker, made its recommendation two days after Creedon, in response to protests that the board was not representative, asked Gov. Simeon Willis to name extra members to represent tenants.

Approval of the increase was expected to stir up a storm of protest. One group, the Washington chapter of Americans for Democratic Action, had objected to the increase even before it was granted.

It had urged Creedon to disapprove the Louisville boost on the ground that it would "seriously jeopardize rent control for the entire nation."

## Snake Cultists Lose Out On Double Indemnity

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UP)—The cultist who suffers a fatal bite in snake-fondling ceremonies in Tennessee can kiss his double indemnity on a life insurance policy goodbye henceforth.

A ruling by the Tennessee Court of Appeals says such a death cannot be called accidental. It ruled out an appeal for double indemnity on the insurance of Lewis F. Ford, who died from the bite of a rattlesnake he handled at the Dolly Pond Church, Chattanooga.

## JEWES REFUSE SETTLEMENT SUGGESTIONS

**LAKE SUCCESS** — Jewish spokesmen today denounced as "delayed tactics" suggestions that the Zionists and the Arabs try again to reach an agreement on Palestine outside the United Nations.

They pointed out that time and again during the last 10 years a settlement of the Holy Land problem has been sought in such negotiations and that the whole issue was tossed into the United Nations when the last attempt under British auspices failed in London.

There appears to be an overwhelming majority of the Assembly in favor of partition of Palestine between Jews and Arabs. But there is likewise almost unanimous agreement that such a decision would have to be imposed by force.

Thus, the major question is—"who will bell the cat?"

Now that Britain has announced its intention to withdraw from Palestine, no other nation wants to take on those onerous duties.

The United States, meanwhile, facing at best only an indecisive vote, pressed the assembly for a verdict of "guilty of aggression" against Yugoslavia, Bulgaria and Albania.

## Philadelphia School Tower Swept By Fire

PHILADELPHIA — A spectacular three-alarm fire swept through the tower of the Benjamin Franklin High School today, but the more than 2100 students and teachers escaped safely from the building in five minutes.

When flames shot from the tower 120 ft. above Broad Street the alarm rank through the four-story school. Although the 2100 students and 50 teachers believed it was a routine fire drill, they sped down the 32 exits to courtyards leading to the street.

## Two Ranger Men File Names For Election Oct. 18

Lester Crossley, city secretary, stated today that Calvin Brown and E. L. (Leldon) Martin, Jr., have filed as candidates for the position of finance commissioner of the city of Ranger.

Deadline for filing is midnight Saturday.

The election will be held Saturday, October 18, the date set by the commission, after the resignation of L. L. Bruce necessitated the election.

## Report On Flood Damage In Area Sent Washington

FORT WORTH, Oct. 9.—Flood damage in the watershed of the Little River, tributary of the Brazos, averages \$7,421,900 a year.

This was reported today by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service after completion of a flood control survey of the five million-acre watershed a 200-mile-long rectangular area with corners at Ranger, Cisco, Taylor and Cameron. Louis P. Merrill, regional conservator of the Soil Conservation Service, said that a report based on the survey would be submitted to the Secretary of Agriculture. If approved, the report will go to Congress which will decide whether funds should be appropriated for flood control work, Merrill explained.

Agricultural property suffers 98 per cent of the total damage, the survey disclosed. Ninety-three per cent of the agricultural damage is done to crops and averages \$6,595,000 a year. Floods wash out crops of cotton, corn, grain sorghums and small grains while they are growing and damage harvested crops still on the field. Other agricultural damage averages \$328,000, this including damage to fences and farm buildings and injury to livestock. Damage to roads, bridges and public utility property averages \$149,000 annually, scouring of bottomland.

## Action Against Grain Gamblers May Be Taken

BOSTON — A veiled hint of a Department of Justice drive against grain market speculation was made last night by U. S. Attorney Gen. Tom C. Clark who denounced some operators as "gamblers" and promised action to halt rising prices.

Speaking before the Boston Chamber of Commerce Clark said "speculators in public misery" were guilty of depriving families of necessities and of promoting inflation in the United States and starvation abroad.

## Arabs To Fight Partitioning

BEIRUT, Levant States — A special premier's committee of the Arab league today considered proposals to withdraw all foreign oil rights and intervene in Palestine with arms if the United Nations general assembly decides to partition the Holy Land.

Saudi Arabia demanded the declaration of a holy war and immediate military action. But Saudi Arabia opposed any economic sanctions against the western powers.

## OBSTACLE NOT POLITICAL; IS CAUSED BY SHORTAGES

WASHINGTON — Undersecretary of State William L. Clayton said today he believed a resumption of trade between Russian-dominated eastern Europe and the countries of western Europe was logical and inevitable.

Regardless of political considerations and Soviet Russia's attitude, Clayton told a news conference he believed there could be no economic barrier between eastern Europe and the nations of western Europe.

It was Clayton's first news conference since returning from Europe, where he spent five months studying economic problems.

He said there was very little surplus of food and raw materials in eastern Europe at present but he was confident that there would be surpluses in the future.

Asked whether he thought this lack of goods in eastern Europe was the chief obstacle to trade between the east and west at present, Clayton replied he thought it was. He did not think the chief obstacle was political.

Clayton said the economies of eastern and western Europe are complementary. He said the surpluses of the east were needed in the west and that the finished products of the western portion were needed in the east. He added that the only thing which might stop this flow of goods would be a cessation of production. In this connection, he said he believed Russia would use surpluses of food and raw materials for exports and imports of manufactured goods to raise her standard of living.

Clayton reviewed the course of trade negotiations at Geneva and expressed the belief that they would be generally successful in world trade barriers.

## Sen. Vandenberg In Hospital

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich.—Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R., Mich., is a patient in Butterworth Hospital here, it was learned today.

Sources close to the Republican foreign policy maker said Vandenberg went to the hospital "for a checkup." They said "no surgery is involved."

The 62 year old Senator returned from Washington conferences and entered the hospital unheralded Monday night, it was learned.

His wife also was in the hospital. Mrs. Vandenberg was reportedly improving from an operation two weeks ago.

Final rites for Mrs. W. B. Samford, 81, Eastland county pioneer who died Tuesday evening in a Ranger hospital were held this afternoon at 2:30 in Eastland.

She is survived by nine children including Mrs. Villa Ahlbert and Miss Vallie Samford of Eastland, daughters, who made their home with her at 201 East Plummer street.

## DOUKHOBOR SECTS SHATTER PEACE IN CANADA VALLEY

NELSON, B. C. (UP)—The peaceful Kootney Valley in British Columbia is rapidly becoming a land divided like Caesar's Gaul into three parts.

On one side are the normal residents—farmers, miners and cattlemen. In the middle are the orthodox and independent Doukhobors—and to the left, the extremist "Sons of Freedom".

Two peaceful towns guard this valley of luxury. To the north, Nelson, South near the border, Grand Forks. In between are some 7,000 Russian-Canadian Doukhobors—living their communal lives, singing their native songs, speaking their native language and living their native ways.

Towering mountains guard the valley from "outside civilization," and the people here bask in sunshine, untroubled by the worries of the rest of the world.

But all is not well within the valley—for the fanatical Sons of Freedom, close to 2,500 strong—are virtually taking the law into their hands. Not since 1932 have residents seen anything comparable to the recent outbreaks.

Fifteen years ago the extremists carrying the torch. They confined their demonstrations to nude parades and an odd dynamiting of a school, bridge tomb. They were protesting the coming of the second World War, but their protests went in vain.

Now in an effort to unite all Doukhobors under the one banner of the Freedomites, they are striking terror into the hearts of the orthodox sect by their firing of pendents suspected by the Freedomites and homes. Those independent suspected by the Freedomites of profiteering from the war are being marked for demonstrations.

Already close to 35 buildings have been set to the torch in the current outbreak of frenzy, and 100 before the Sons relent in their drive.

This is not the first time in the history of the Doukhobor uprising

that fire has been used. In 1932, dynamite, believed stolen from a dam under construction near Nelson at that time, was used to blow up some 20 schools and bridges. But since that source of supply was removed the flaming torch has wreaked havoc and wrought fear.

The history of the Doukhobor sect in Canada is one of continual resistance against Canadian ways. Ever since their arrival in 1899, they have been a source of trouble to one government after another. They were evicted from Russia towards the end of the last century for refusal to fight against the czar. It was part of their religion not to bear arms, and ever since their first demonstrations there during the Turkish War of 1814, they have absolutely refused to have anything to do with guns.

The Doukhobors were not long in Canada before they began to divide among themselves. The burning of schools began in 1923, and since then it is estimated that more than 500 buildings have been put to the torch.

### Strained Meat Is Urged For Baby Diet

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP)—Strained meat, added to the diet of six-week-old babies, protects the infants from anemia, according to Dr. Ruth M. Leverton, University of Nebraska nutritionist.

Dr. Leverton's report was based on a study by the university in cooperation with Lincoln and Omaha pediatricians. The survey, she said, showed that meat improved blood conditions as well as checked the disease.

Nurses caring for infants taking part in the study reported that babies receiving meat generally were "less fussy, and slept better at night," Dr. Leverton said.

Dr. Isaac Monrie Cline, who for 35 years was the chief U. S. forecaster at New Orleans said a first class hurricane was too big

Cline said that unless the entire area feeding the storm could be coped with the hurricane would remain potent.

## CALIFORNIA TAKING STEPS TO BAR GANGSTER INFLUX.

 SACRAMENTO, Cal. (UP) — Top California officials, noting the apparent westward movement of gangsters, are organizing to drive them away from the "easy pickings" of the Golden West.

The matter was brought to a head last July by the gang-style elimination of Benjamin (Bugsy) Siegel in Beverly Hills. Siegel, a known southern California underworld figure and Nevada gambler, was murdered in the luxurious home of Virginia Hill, Alabama heiress.

The Siegel slaying followed by weeks the garroting in San Francisco of Nick de John, one-time Chicago hoodlum.

Gov. Earl Warren already had asked for and received from the state legislature authorization to appoint special commissions to investigate crime conditions in California.

"The rapid growth of our state, the westward movement of organized criminals, post-war violence

and many other factors make it essential to make a complete survey of all the elements and conditions that contribute to our crime problems," Warren said.

From Washington, California's Democratic senator, Sheridan Downey, took up the cry with a charge that members of the underworld element "already were entrenched with some state officials."

California's attorney general, Fred N. Houser, immediately denied Downey's charge and opened state-wide gangster investigations of his own.

Houser reported his investigations had linked the Siegel murder to a California bookmaking war. He said he was satisfied Siegel had been "trying to push a racing wire service into northern California" in competition with an already established service covering Arizona, Nevada and southern California.

Further indications of a westward movement of the underworld were apparent, Houser said, from reports from Chicago and New York listing 150 gangsters believed to have moved to California.

The list will be turned over to local authorities, he said, to assist in running them off the streets. Warren, following up appointment of his five crime study com-

missions, announced he would call a general state crime conference this fall.

"I think everybody recognizes that a lot of bad people—people of the underworld—have been moving into our state recently," Warren said.

"Criminals go where the grass is greenest. At present, with all the money in circulation and with our state's growth and wealth, it is a natural thing for the underworld in other parts of the country to look upon our state as a lucrative field for their activities."

Because of the summer's drought, many children cannot get milk. Butter was 500 francs a pound, or about \$4, when last seen on the market. But the waiter on the boat train from Cherbourg said with a shrug that "you can't find butter today in all France."

Much of the price increase occurred within the past two months. Bread increased 24 per cent during September. Milk went up 91 per cent. Meat is anywhere from 40 to 80 per cent higher than it was in July.

Backyard Cleaning Urged For Statue

NEW YORK (UP) — Americans have been asked to urge Congress to appropriate sufficient funds to clean up the "backyard ugliness" of Bedloe's Island, on which the Statue of Liberty stands.

The action was suggested in a resolution adopted at the convention of the Monument Builders of America and the American Monument Association.

"Although the statue itself is well maintained, the island presents many aspects of backyard ugliness," the resolution said. The association said it believed that appropriations to enable the National Park service to carry out its plan for the development of the island "can well be afforded within the framework of federal economy."

Eggs At \$2.40 Dozen, No Butter Usher In Hard Winter In Paris

By Dudley Harmon United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS (UP)—Three years after liberation, Parisians are looking ahead to a bad winter. Prices were high enough when his reporter was last in Paris few years ago. During the past few months they have shot up still more in many categories. Parisians tell the newly arrived American that they now spend from two-thirds to three-quarters

of their income for food alone. Yet, they say ironically, their annual rent often costs only a little more than the sums they spend on newspapers and magazines. A strict control on unfurnished apartments holds rent down to a sum which would buy only ten meals in a first class restaurant. "It's typical of the lack of balance in France today," one woman told the United Press. "Take clothing, also. Materials are more plentiful and much cheaper than a year ago. But wages have increased and a dress still costs the same as last year."

A tour through the Latin quarter, not a wealthy section of the city, shows eggs for sale at 240 francs apiece, or about \$2.40 a dozen. Inferior hamburger costs the equivalent of \$1.50 a pound. A dry cleaner who charged 130 francs a year ago asks 250 today.

### Under The Dome At Austin

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)— Gov. Beauford H. Jester and Former Gov. Coke R. Stevenson both sit a horse well, and that's no mean political asset in these Palomino days.

But there the resemblance between Jester and Stevenson stops sharply.

Ten months of the Jester administration had developed wide variance from the practices of the Stevenson administration, as the respective governors have experienced governors' troubles.

Stevenson made his decisions, braced himself and took the blows that followed, silently, Jester appoints a commission or a committee and explains why.

Only time will tell which system gets the better results. In appearance, Jester and Stevenson are almost opposite types. Stevenson is the rugged ranch-

man; Jester is the polished diplomat type. That Texans do not hold Stevenson's "country ways" against him nor handicap Jester for his good looks, the voters have shown by giving each of them rousing political victories.

Jester smokes cigars. Stevenson puffs a pipe so constantly that few cartoons show him without a pipe.

Jester likes to be in the air. His plane trips already have far out-distanced those of any other Texas governor. Stevenson likes to keep his feet on the ground, or at least near it. After one plane trip to Washington when he had trouble with his ear drums, Stevenson struck to travel by train or automobile.

Jester issues frequent "communiques" from his office. The Press Room gets them impartially, regardless of the importance of the item. Stevenson seldom issued a formal statement. Generally he "refused to comment," but when he had "cooled the cup" on hot topic, his remark was likely to be startling.

Like when he remarked to a press conference: "I'd fire J. Frank Dobie without batting an eye."

Stevenson became labled "Calculating Coke" while he was governor. Many of Jester's actions are spontaneous. He likes to get on the scene and act from there, as he did in the Texas City disaster and the recent East Texas forest fires.

If the two men become rival candidates for the United States

Senate, the differences will be even more marked.

Stevenson never had a formal platform in a political race. He recently told the United Press that if he runs for the Senate, he sees no reason why he should deviate from that course.

Jester had a detailed platform when he became a candidate for governor. It was in that platform that he first used the commission approach to meeting problems. He adopted a veterans commission.

Then on the matter of national politics, there is a wide difference between the men. Jester holds that the governor of Texas is the titular head of the party in the state. He almost surely will be a delegate to the next Democratic National Convention and already he is taking up the cudgels for a return to the old party plan of nominating candidates for President and for vice-president by two-thirds vote.

Stevenson attended no National Democratic Convention while he was governor. Though he has been accused of giving comfort and advice to the "Texas Regulars" behind the scenes, he did not go on the floor of the Democratic State Convention when the group, later known as

"Regulars," took over party control for a time.

Few people about the capitol believe that Jester and Stevenson will be opponents in the race for the U. S. Senate. Most observers pick present Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel and Stevenson as contenders, some expect Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson of the Tenth Texas District to make the race again, and others think that Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright, retired, will try the field of politics.

Former Gov. James V. Allred is not put aside by those listing possible candidates. The Wainwright prospective candidacy stirred up much discussion. Then came a proposal to draft Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, a native Texan, which Nimitz promptly squashed. When service people were being discussed as candidates, there were those who recalled that other Texans with great records in World War II could be drafted.

The Marines have Gen. Ira L. Kimes, retired, hero of the Battle of Midway, now living at San Marcos. The WAC has Mrs. Oveta Clap Hobby of Houston. Mrs. Hobby, incidentally, has probably a better training for office holding than any of the distinguished service men mentioned. She is a former parliamentarian of the Texas House of Representatives.

Senator W. Lee O'Daniel continued to keep silent on his intentions regarding the office he now holds, even when a prospective candidate for the place asked him point blank if he will see re-election. State Rep. Tom Martin, Freericksburg plunked the question at the Senky while escorting "Pappy" around the little city when Singing Societies met there.

### Hospital Life To Be Continued

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UP)— Living in a hospital is nothing new for Raymond Lopez, Jr., for he's spent most of his four years in them.

But now something new has been added to his woes, designed, of course to make him a well boy. Raymond has been put in a specially built Bradford frame, a contraption made of gas pipe with two strips of canvas stretched across it.

He must stay in the frame a year and is taken out only for baths and alcohol rubs twice daily. The reason for all this inconvenience is a curvature of the spine, caused by a tubercular condition of the bone.

During the year he must spend in the frame, Raymond will undergo a series of about four operations. He is being given streptomycin, one of the newer drugs used in treatment of tuberculousis.

Raymond, an uncomplaining sort of youngster, spent the last three months of his first year in a hospital. Then he was in the children's hospital here for more than two years. He changed hospitals again recently when doctors became interested in his case.

### Sul Ross To Give Aptitude Tests

ALPINE, Tex. (UP)— Sul Ross State College, the first Texas college to work with the Texas Employment Commission as a try-out school, has begun a broader program of student guidance than ever before attempted. Under the program all freshmen students enrolled for the fall semester are to be given general aptitude tests, which will measure their aptitudes in 20 general fields and approximately 3,000 occupations.

The results of the tests will be used by counselors in the college to assist students in choosing their college courses and their vocations.

The tests are administered by personnel of the Texas Employment Commission.

### Boy And Dog Combination Makes Good

PHILADELPHIA (UP)— Lassie didn't come home one night and neither did his five-year-old master.

Little John Thomas Felizzi was reported missing by his parents. They knew of John's dejection

to the frisky black-and-white dog, and so informed police.

(Continued from page 1) fields, \$305,000, and silting of bottomland, \$25,000, according to the survey. No attempt was made to put a dollar value of the large volume of topsoil washed away every year by floods.

The average annual damage figures were broken down for the streams of the watershed as follows:

Upper Leon River (Ranger, Comanche, Eastland, DeLeon, Cisco, Dublin area), \$678,000; South Leon (Comanche), \$110,000; Lower Leon (Hamilton, Gatesville, Belton), \$4,331,000; Cowhouse (Belton, Gatesville), \$277,000; Lampasas (Lometa, Lampasas), \$470,000; San Gabriel (Georgetown, Taylor), \$475,000; Elm (Temple), \$993,000; Brushy (Taylor, Roundrock), \$1,794,000; and Little River (Holland, Cameron, Rockdale, Temple), \$1,282,000.

Farmers were the major source of the facts on flood damage, Merrill said.

Began in 142 and interrupted by the war, the flood control survey was resumed in September

1946. It was undertaken to find out whether intensive treatments of agricultural land to aid in flood control would be economically sound, Merrill stated. Congress, he added, will determine that point.

The Little River has a long record of damaging floods. The most disastrous occurred in September, 1921, when a day's deluge of 23 inches caused a flood that took the lives of 164 persons and caused property and land damage estimated at \$12,640,000.

For more than two years Eastland county citizens headed by Fred Brown of Eastland have been working on securing flood control for the Upper Leon watershed, the main objective construction of dams to erase the damage from floods along the river, and at the same time furnish a water supply for several towns, including Ranger and Eastland.

Among those from Ranger who have been working on the deal are E. R. Pearson, who heads the Ranger delegation, R. V. Galloway, E. T. Eubank, J. J. Kelly and others.

DEMAND FOR PEANUTS AT SLOW PACE

Demand for peanuts is very slow at present prices, according to reports received by the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Support prices were being paid most Southwest growers for farmers' stock peanuts this week. Demand for shelled goods was slow at mostly 16-14 cents per pound for Spanish No. ones, with only a few sales higher, and some as low as 16 cents.

Harvesting in North Texas Central Texas and Oklahoma is becoming general and will soon be in full swing. Harvest in South Texas is well advanced. However, not much crushing is going on in this area.

So far as the southwest is concerned, scarcely sufficient trading in oil and meal has started to fully establish a market, but opinions range mostly from \$95 to \$100 per ton for meal and 23 to 25 cents for oil.

Most of the crop in the Virginia-Carolina section will be harvested by the end of this week. Stacking has not kept pace with digging in many fields where farmers are allowing the vines to cure two to three days before stacking.

In the southeastern section of the country a heavy volume of farmers' stock Spanish and runner peanuts was moving to mills

and to storages. Growers were getting support prices for both types of peanuts.

## TEXAS CITIES HAVE LOWEST MOVIE PRICES

Washington Bureau of The News. WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 — The four largest cities of Texas, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio, have the lowest motion picture prices for first runs in a survey of ten cities published here. These cities are said to have the lowest ticket scales among key centers and all others are considerably higher.

Top theaters of the four Texas towns, operated by Interstate Circuit, charge 50c matinee and 60c evening prices, the lowest by some decimals in the country for cities of comparable size. Dallas' 9c children's price is not only the lowest anywhere but also the lowest in Texas as 12c is charged elsewhere.

Kansas City, Mo., prices are 45c matinee and 60c evening, Sunday and holidays, with 16c as the all-day children price.

Minneapolis, Minn., has a 50c matinee price, 70c for nights, week ends and holidays, and 12c for
