

Wood From Amazon Found Fine For Violin Bows

By H. E. Minard United Press Staff Correspondent BELLEVUE, Wash. (UP) — Pernambuco, a mysterious South American wood, awaits a master

craftsman's tools here. One of the first shipments to this country since before the war, five tons of the rough, vari-colored, grainless logs are baing sawed, ripped and delicately carved by 73-year-old Eugene M. Sherman, viotin maker.

Fernambuco grows along the tributaries of the Amazon. Not much is known about it, but it is believed that ages ago its resilient limbs made fine bows. The bows were the kind that twang a deadly arrow ino a human target.

Today, gentle, gray-haired Srerman was making bows, too. Only his bows, he hopes, will make the sweetest music ever heard.

Long ago in the 19th century the Frenchman Francis Tourte made a violin bow. It was an accident how he stumbled on Pernambuco. But nevertheless a Tourte bow never has been equalled.

"It's a mystery and a challenge" Sherman said. "Why does a Stradivarious violin improve when stroked with a Tourte baw?" Tourte discovered Pernambuco long after Stradivarius died, he said.

Sherman believes this country has sufficient talent to steal postwar European output. He said he hoped the Department of Commerce would find a way to increase his import of Pernambuco. "How is it that an artist like Heifetz can tell a Tourtet bow ith his eyes closed?" he asked. Maybe it's seasoning-or may-

Apollo and Mycinthus were playing a game of quoits and by accident one of the quoits thrown by Apollo, struck Hycin thus, causing his death. Apollo grieved over his death, so he commanded the ashes of Hycinthus to bring forth the blue hyacinth as an ever lasting tribute.

The Spartans held the festival "Hycintha" in honor of Apollo. This took place in the three hottest days of summer, the 7th to 10th of the month Hecatombeus, which in Sicily was called Hycinthus. The rites were a mixture of mourning over his death and rejoicing over his elevation

One of the most famous battle grounds in the world bears the name of Hycinthus, for Jacinto means hyacinth in Spanish.


