United Tress Staff Correspondent LONDON (UP) — British ex-perts on Germany believe any at-tempt of the Communists of western Germany to join the new interiational Communist drive against the western powers is doomed to failure. Experts did not exclude the pos-

sibility that German Commun might try to join a general European Communist offensive aiming at wrecking the Marshall Plan and engage in economic sabotage actions, particularly in the Ruhr area.

Such attempts, the experts added, would lead, however, to punter-measures and sanctions by the western allies and in the final analysis to the total isolation of the Communists from the people of western Germany. Any Communist sabotage ac-

the new Aviation Cadet Training class will start March 1, 1948, at Randolph Field, and applications are being accepted now, it was announced by Sgt. James Hendrick, Eastland Recruiting Service.

Each class starts with 500 cadets, and men completing the 12-month course are commissioned second lieutenants and assigned to flying duty with the United States Air Force.

Admission standards for cadet

training are high. Only unmarried young men between the ages of 20 and 26 h are eligible. They must have completed at least one-half the credits leading to a degree from an accredited college or university, or be able to pass an examination given by the Air Force. Excellent character, a sound physique, and good health also are required.

Aviation Cadet training is pen to civilians as well as to enisted men now in the Service.

Each class lasts for 12 months and is divided into three courses; primary and basic is at Randolph Field, Advanced single-engine is at Williams Field, Arizona and multi-engine advanced is at Barkslale Field, Louisiana,

Texas Holds **Decisive Lead** In Road Program

LAREDO, Nov. 4-Texas leads in the nation in mileage of secon-dary roads completed under the postwar construction program, Ben F. Ostergren, manager, Coun-ty Highway Officials' Division, American Road Builders' Association, told the Texas County Judges' and Commissioners' Asiation at a session of their state

nvention here today. To date, Texas has completed 1,664 miles of secondary roads at a cost of \$14,688,000, Mr. Ostergren pointed out. Secondary road construction in Texas accounts for 34 per cent of the nation's total mileage of secondary roads completed under the program. Completed stcondary road mileage for all states totals 5,066 miles was \$55,982,437, of which \$29,611,657 was Federal-aid.

Texas had 1,318 miles under struction at an estimated cost of \$16,653,000, involving \$8,187,-000 in Federal funds at the time of the report. Contracts had been zyk smiled and saidlet for 218 miles on which construction had not been started, at a total cost of \$2,298,600, of which \$1,149,300 represents Federal-aid. Plans had been approved for 147 miles, and 1,094 miles were in the programmed stage, the report shows.

WASHINGTON— The tax advisory committee today recommended to the House ways and means committee a reduction in individual income tax rates "for all," with consideration given to living costs for those in the lower income groups.

The committee's report was signed by nine of the 10 members of the advisory committee created by the House ways and means committee to recommend revenue

committee to recommend revenue law changes.

The full text of the report was distributed to the ways and means committee and reporters but publication was set for newspapers of Wednesday morning.

In presenting the report, Advisory Committee Chairman Roswell Magill, New York lawyer and former undersecretary of the treasure, read, one paragraph from it to support the committees captention that the equitable adjustment of tax rates and exemptions was "a number one federal tax problem today."

"We recommend," the report said, "a reduction in individual income tax rates for all, with due regard for the cost of living of those in the lower income groups, and for the needs of the balance of the economy."

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
