Molotov Says Atom Bomb Secret Blasted

CHEERING RUSSIANS HEAR U. S. SECURITY BELIEF SCORNE

LONDON—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov told a cheering audience in Moscow today that "the secret of the atom bomb has long ceased to exist."

Molotov's statement on the atom bomb, the full implications of which were not made clear immediately, was broadcast from Moscow, where he addressed an audience of Russian leaders celebrating the 30th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution.

Molotov said America's belief in its "internal strength" based on knowledge of how to make the atom bomb was "an illusion."

"We live in a period where all roads lead to Communism," Molotov told his audience. Broadcast direct from the assembly hall in Moscow where the speech Molotov spoke, was recorded in London by the Soviet Monitor.

Molotov reaffirmed the Soviet intention of pursuing a peaceful course, saying—

"Suffice it to say how interested the Soviet Union is in a durable and lasting peace. All true friends of peace—and they constitute a majority of any country—can rest assured that the Soviet Union will defend the interests of peace to the last."

He cited Premier Josef Stalin's interview with Harold Stassen, American presidential candidate, as evidence that the differing economic systems did not rule out peacetime collaboration with Russia by other countries.

"There is another policy counterposed to Comrade Stalin's policy of peaceful collaboration," he continued. "This other policy is led by America, now with the Truman doctrine, now with the Marshall plan, and to Europe, to China, and so forth."

Wants Regular Session To Take Tax Cut Action

WASHINGTON—Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr., said today he personally believes that any tax legislation should wait until the regular session of Congress in January.

The Massachusetts Republican head of the House told newsmen shortly after his return to the capital that he thought it would be "better to take up taxes as the first order of business in the regular session."

Chairman Harold Knutson, R., Minn., of the House ways and means committee, has announced he would seek approval of the House Republican leadership to consider at the special session of a revised "quickie" bill to reduce personal income taxes effective Jan. 1.

Rural letter carriers of the 17th district will hold a meeting at the Connellee Hotel in Eastland Monday night, November 10, at 7:30. The meeting will be held in the roof garden of the hotel.

There are some 400 members of the 17th district organization which takes in 12 counties. This will be their first meeting since the opening of the recent war.

Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson will be the principal speaker.

WEATHERFORD B TEAM WINS FROM RANGER

Ranger football fans received thrill after thrill here Wednesday night as the B team lost in a hard fought football game with Weatherford taking the big end of the score by 19 to 6.

Long passes kept the fans on their toes with Weatherford keeping the ball in the air most of the game. Weatherford scored on a pass straight down the field. It was good for 49 yards and 6 points. They failed to convert the extra point.

The Ranger team put up a good defense and held the opposing team the remainder of the first half, the score at the end of the half being 6 to 0.

To start the second half, Ranger received. From this point it looked like the Pops had been received and offered some threat. They kept the Weatherford team deep in their own territory all through the third quarter. As Weatherford attempted a pass, Ranger rushed the passer forcing him to throw a wild pass that landed squarely in the arms of Ranger's left end, Ice. Ice raced 40 yards down the field before he was overtaken and brought down.

In the opening of the fourth period, Weatherford completed a long pass, good for 20 yards and the second score of the game. Again they failed to make the extra point.

After receiving the kick-off, the Pops started their drive that netted their one touchdown. Ice caught a pass from Smith that was good for 24 yards. Then Williams circling his left end picked up 15 yards. A roughing penalty against Weatherford on this play put the ball on the four yard line. After two plays Williams plunged over for the score. Siles' kick was low and the extra point was lost.

Weatherford came right back passing and running to score a gain this time plunging over the 1 yard line. A plunge over center was good for the extra point to make the score at the end of the game 19 to 6.

SAYS UNFAIR TACTICS USED ON HUGHES

WASHINGTON—Counsel for Howard Hughes charged today that a Senate committee had used "unfair tactics" in "secretly" examining the millionaire plane builder's tax records.

Thomas A. Slack, Hughes attorney, told reporters that the committee violated normal government practices in attempting to show that Hughes owed the government a total of \$5,919,000 in back tax penalties.

Slack's statement was made as the Senate was investigating subcommittee prepared to resume hearings on Hughes \$40,000,000 in government contracts for war planes.

Committee Chairman Homer Ferguson said Slack and other Hughes spokesmen would be permitted later to answer charges made yesterday that Hughes made money from war contracts.

Hughes himself had stated from the witness stand that he suffered losses on his war business.

Slack said he was not satisfied with Ferguson's assurance. He said he should be allowed to answer the charges "now," before they were "forgotten by the public."

Employees Asked To Help Prevent Overpayments

Help of employers in preventing subsistence overpayments to veterans who quit their training was asked today by the Veterans Administration.

VA said that training officers assigned regularly to firms in Dallas and vicinity where veterans receive training had been supplied with simple cards on which such reports could be made. The firm previously was required to write a letter to VA when a veteran discontinued his training, but under the new system the card itself suffices.

All that the employer must do is to list the name of his firm, the name and claim number of the veteran trainee, and the date training ceased.

This new system already has proved its worth, VA said. Where letters were required, the average lapse between discontinuance and the time VA was notified was 25 days. This now has been reduced to about seven days, and in many instances the report is made even more promptly.

VA said that it was to the veteran's advantage that his withdrawal from training be reported immediately. Where overpayments are made, the veteran may be prevented from reentering job training or college unless arrangements are made to liquidate the amount owed the government.

Brother Of Miss Kinney Dies In Galveston Wed.

Word was received in Ranger Wednesday afternoon of the death of John Franklin Kinney, brother of Miss Anna Belle Kinney, superintendent of the Ranger General Hospital.

Mr. Kinney died in the John Sealy Hospital in Galveston about 11 o'clock Wednesday morning, following a long illness. Miss Kinney, her mother, Mrs. Pearl Kinney and the deceased's wife were with him at the time of his death.

It was stated today that the family expected to leave Galveston Thursday night with the body for Bowling Green, Ohio, and the body will be at the Becker Funeral Home there pending funeral arrangements. They will arrive in Ohio Saturday.

Mr. Kinney who was 42 years of age, is also survived by two children.

TRUMAN ASKS ATTENTION FOR EUROPEAN AID FIRST

WASHINGTON—President Truman said today that he wants the special session of Congress to act on emergency aid for Europe before taking up what he regards as the equally important problem of controlling prices and inflation.

The President also told a news conference that he will send a separate, comprehensive message to Congress on the emergency aid for Europe before taking up the equally important problem of controlling prices and inflation.

His separate message to Congress on the long-range Marshall plan will be based on the many reports the President has been receiving lately on the European economic situation and the effect of the American foreign aid program on the economy of this country.

Mr. Truman said he did not know when this message would be ready, but that he would see to its preparation as soon as possible. Secretary of State George C. Marshall will present the outline of the plan to congressional committees on Monday.

Dr. Kuykendall, in presenting figures to show the income from ranch and farm products, stated that he had been assisted in compiling the figures by the Commercial State Bank, T. C. Wylie, and F. T. Smith. He stated that an estimate arrived at after extensive research revealed the overall income for ranches and farms of this area is \$2,500,000 a year.

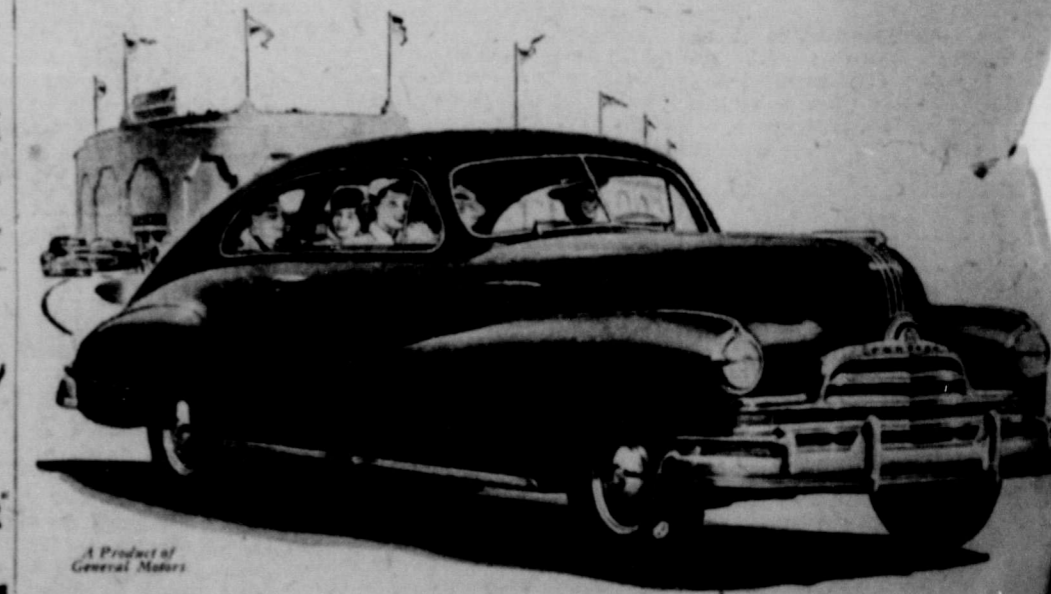

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Ouch! 'New Look' For Men Is Plotted

Paris Tailors In Sinister Scheme Involving Ski Pants

PARIS (UP)—Men, steel yourselves for a body blow. Paris is plotting a "new look" for you, too.

The revolution is taking place very quietly, however. Plotters to change men's styles, which have remained virtually static since 1900, are working underground, unknown to the innocent man in the street, who still walks gaily, clad in his cotton or silk shirt, his vest, trousers and coat.

D-Day for the announcement of

the "new look" for men is still a closely guarded secret. Only here and there were there dangerous overtones that style priests were ruminating such a revolution.

Mme. Elsa Schiaparelli, veteran revolutionary in the fashion world said this week:

"Unfortunately, there are two things which make a change in men's clothing difficult. They are afraid of wearing colors they like and they are afraid of looking effeminate."

But she too, is indicating subtly the revolution to come:

"The white summer uniform of a sailor is nice, don't you think? A tunic of this kind, in haberdashery well-cut and fitted looks splendid, and would be a perfect answer to the complaint that men are too hot in summer."

Home of the coming revolution however, is not in the Parisian "haute couture" houses, but in the little tailor shops in the old section of the city.

Jean Van Acker, a well-known tailor spilled the beans.

"The new look for men," he said, "is as follows: No vest, matching coat and pants, but with the pants cut like ski trousers."

"Thin-soled shoes for men in winter are silly. The new look" to come will include heavy-soled shoes, much like out after ski boots now, with pants cut in a "V" shape narrowing at the ankles, with a strap under the foot.

Jackets, I felt, will remain much the same except in summer men will order thin, light gaberdine or linen shirts, with tailored collars, to be worn with a tie, a pocket for the inevitable fountain pen and cigarettes, and cuffs. This idea is largely gaining popularity after the American soldier's summer uniform."

Van Acker, who owns a little tailor shop in the business district of Paris, said the wrist watch was largely responsible for the death of the vest.

"Young men aren't ordering them any more," he said. "They don't need the pocket, because they don't have any watch or chain. Waistcoats aren't warm enough either. If a young man wants to keep warm, he wears a pull-over under his coat—even in Paris."

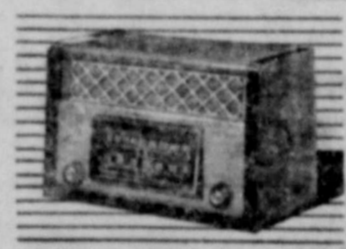
