

The new corns will not be ready however, although Dr. Melhus says temalan corns have been purified by in-breeding and the best combinations tested on a large-scale basis, the new corns will be avail

able for limited field testing.

Many of the 35 hybrids with
Guatemalan breeding had wellfilled, mature ears developed on study stalks with green leaves. The four Iowa and U. S. hybrids used as checks were short-stalked, small-eared and fired because of the unusually hot, dry summer weather of July, August and Sep-

As yet the yield records are not available, but the superior per-formance of the hybrids with Guatemalan germ plasm is outstanding. The Guatemalan hybrids were able to maintain their green leaves





#### Air Experts Study New Wing Glider

HAWATHORNE, Cal. (UP) -A German, war - developed flying-wing glider, "the nearest thing to a bird," is being examined by orthrop Aeronautical Institute ngineers who hope to find applications to the government's guided missile projects.


