WASHINGTON -Secretary of State George Marshall made ived quietly here since he retired all-or-nothing appeal to Congress today to approve the European recovery program because world situation is "critical in the

> extreme." The gray-haired soldier-states man formally presented the administration's case for the Marshall Plan to the Senate foreign reations committee and then dropped his prepared manuscript he committee table. Leaning forward in his chair, he declared in

"The people of the United States must thoroughly under stand the critical world situation." The four-year recovery program, he said will require sacri-

ices by the American people. "When we measure these sac ifices against what we are fighting for . . . the whole world hangs in the balance," he said.

He read his formal statement a a firm, clipped voice. He gave he committee a firm challenge to out up the entire \$6,800,000 down payment for the first 15 months of he Marshall Plan or "don't undertake it at all.

He underscored that challeng. in his closing and extemporaneous remarks. He reminded Congress hat in many parts of the world there is more fighting now than here was in the war."

"The whole situation is critical in the extreme," he said. Marshall said the U. S. "happens to be the trongest nation in the world to lay, certainly economically, and I hink in most other respects.

The alternatives to an adequate program, he said, are intense listress and social and political apheavals which could well wind up eventually in a third world

"Our national security will be seriously threatened," continued, "We shall in effect live in an armed camp, regulated and

Marshall testified before the Senate foreign relations committee as the first administration witness for the plan he conceived seven months ago and which he described today as "an investment

WASHINGTON, (NEA) .- President Truman's message on the Marshall Plan was sent to Congress on the last day of the special session, along with a State Department 240-page "Outline of a European Recovery Program." The question of just what it's all about has been lost sight of, however. In the meantime, critics of the Marshall Plan idea have been having a field day.

There will probably be a month of public hearings.

There will probably be a month of public hearings on the plan before Senate and House Foreign Af-fairs Committees, another month of floor debate before a bill to authorize the European Recovery rogram can be voted on, and then another month of hearings and more floor debate before money is appropriated to carry it out. It is only then that a definite answer can be given on what the Marshall Plan really is. If ECA—the Economic Co-operation Administration—is in business by April 1, it

In all this fog of millions of words and millions of figures, the real nature and intent of the Marshall Plan are apt to be lost again. It therefore becomes necessary to keep clearly in mind just what the Marshall Plan fundamentals really are.

UNLESS you wish to become involved in a mire of trade statistics, administrative detail and political bickering, there are really four basic questions: Why is it necessary to have any Marshall Plan at all? Can the United States afford to finance it? Couldn't it be done some other way for less money? What would happen if nothing

were done?

As to the first question, there are only two big industrial areas in the world—the U. S. and western Europe. Before the war, they made about 95 per cent of the world's manufactured goods. Only one of those areas is now capable of full production—the U. S. It is therefore called upon to produce more than its share. Until the European productive machinery can be put back in operation, the world's shortage of goods is bound to continue. And inflation—far more serious in other countries than in the U. S.—will also continue. The only choice for the U. S. is to restore European production.

Can the U. S. afford to finance this effort? The answer given is that it has made far greater efforts in the past, without harm.

that it has made far greater efforts in the past, without harm.

Seven items Europe needs worst will pinch the American economy.

They are petroleum products, bread grains, nitrogen fertilizer, steel, industrial and farm machinery, and freight cars. Because these items,

are in short supply all over the world, furnishing them in quantity to Europe may force American prices still higher. IF it is felt that the U. S. cannot stand the impact of this full burden, it may be asked if the job could not be done for less money—by a smaller Marshall Plan, perhaps. The answer given here is that, as in any new business, the greatest danger of failure is in not giving it

enough capital.

If it is then held that the U. S. should do nothing at all, the consequences of such a step must be carefully weighed. Soviet Russia wants the Marshall Plan to fail. Americans who oppose the Marshall Plan are thus playing the Communist game. The reason the Russian are thus playing the Communist game.

sians don't want the Marshall Plan to succeed is that the Communists want to control the western European productive area.

If the European industrial area falls to the Communists, the effects on the U.S. would be catastrophic.

The inevitable result of this would be a major American depression. American production might be cut by a fourth—or \$50 billion a year. With that would come severe unemployment. The cost of the relief bills in the U. S. might easily be greater than the cost of the European Recovery Program.

Moreover, if the U. S. stuck to its traditional free-enterprise system,

It would have to prepare for another war. And the cost of national defense for America, alone in the world and without allies, might easily outstrip the cost of the Marshall Plan.

Utilities Plan **Higher Capacity**

NEW YORK (UP) - The electricity industry met successfully in 1947 all demands for power with its record output of 305,0 0,000,000 kilowatt hours and in 1948 anticipates additions to gen erating capacity in excess of 5.-Oakes said the anticipated addition to generating capacity will exceed by a good margin and ex-pected 3,400,000-kilowatt rise in 1948 demand.

Electricity output in 1947, rising 13 per cent over 1946 volume, was 25,000,000,000 kilowatt hours greater than in 1944, the previous peak year.

Over the next four years, moreover, "generating facilities of the business-managed electric companies will be increased by 35 per cent through a long-planned construction program which got under full headway during the latter half of 1947,55 Oakes stated.

He pointed out, however, that part of this program constitutes work delayed by World War II, placed early in 1941. At a cost of around \$6,000,000,000 the fouryear program will add another 15,000,000 kilowatts of generating capacity by the end of 1951. The planned construction by governnent-operated power projects in the same four-year period will bring the total additions of new capacity to 17,000,000 kilowatts

During 1947 the industry estab lished a record for new customers and boasted that it met successfully all of the increased demands for power. At the year-end gen-When George A. 


