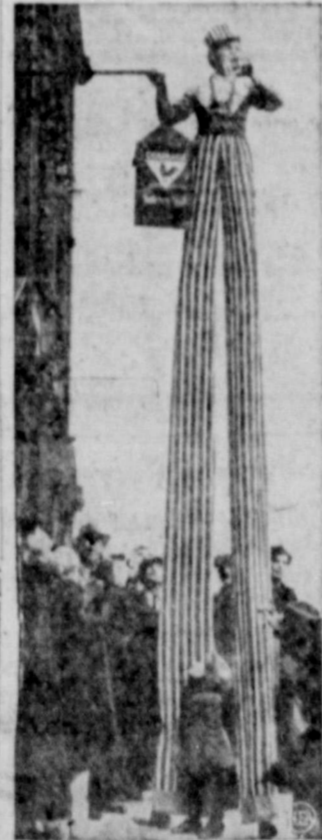
\$3,370 Car Bought With Bad Check

Asks Winter In Jail And He Gets His Wish

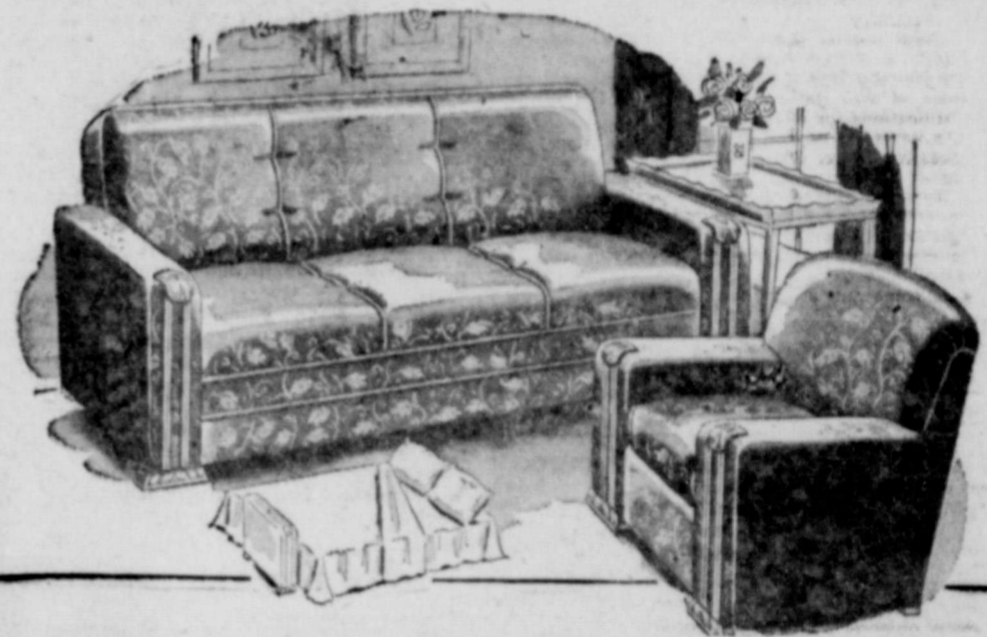
JAMESTOWN, N.Y. (UP) —

Says Vitamin B May Promote Tooth Decay

CHICAGO (UP)—A Northwestern University chemist says that vitamin B may promote tooth decay.

Dr. Leonard S. Fosdick, in a paper presented to the American Association for the Advancement of Science, said that may explain why persons suffering from pellagra are immune to dental decay.

It also explains, he said, why the natives of post-war Italy have little tooth decay. Surveys have indicated a general vitamin B deficiency among Italians.

Fosdick said no lactic acid forms in the mouth if there is no niacin present. Niacin is a member of the vitamin B complex family.

Other important factors in tooth decay, Fosdick said, are fermentable sugar in the diet and the amount of saliva flow of the individual.

In about 90 per cent of all cases, he said, fermentable sugars are necessary for acid production in the mouth.

"If we assume all other variables are constant, then the mere fact that the Eskimo, the inhabitants of war-torn Europe, and the starving people of India have little or no fermentable sugar in the diet would explain their apparent resistance to caries," Fosdick said.

"It would also explain why, the white man's diet, they may develop rampant caries, and why the caries activity of members of our armed forces who spent time in Japanese prison camps decreased materially."

Fosdick said persons with a copious flow of stimulated saliva are less susceptible to dental decay, while those with no saliva invariably have poor teeth.

"In this regard, it is interesting to speculate on the effect of prolonged nervous tension or emotional disturbance on the flow of saliva," he said, "It is known that a stimulation of the sympathetic nervous system will cause a cessation of saliva flow. It has been suggested that, during times of stress, caries activity increases."

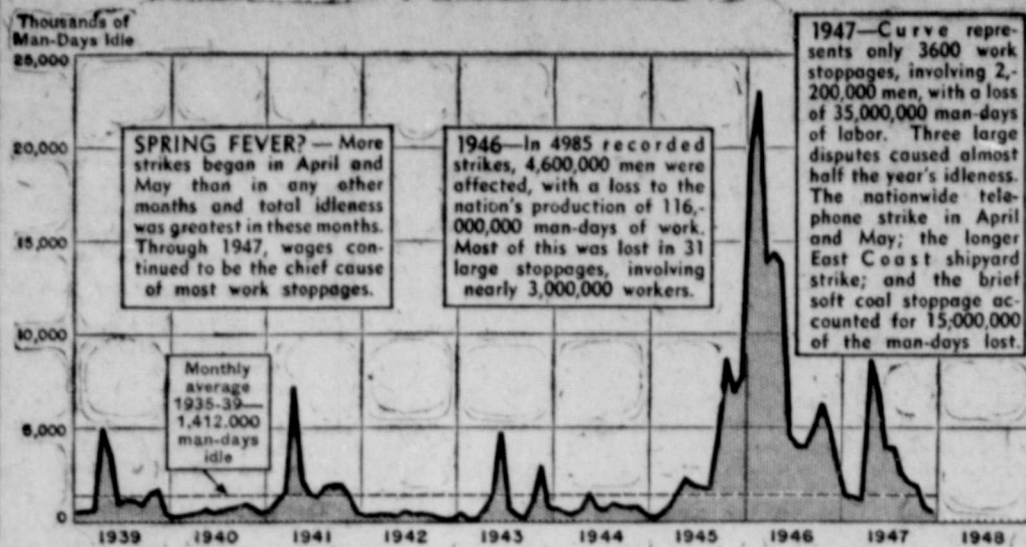

Elmo's A Natural: 11's Up His Alley

ATLANTA, Ga. (UP)—Any way you look at Elmo Ellis, Atlanta radio writer, he's a "natural."

He was born on Nov. 11, 29 years ago (the 2 and 9 added up to 11) the exact time and date the Armistice was signed. Elmo's birthplace was the little Alabama town of West Blocton, which has 11 letters.

Ellis weighed 11 pounds then. Eleven aunts and uncles came to see him. In high school, he wore the number 11 on his football uniform. Later at the University of Alabama he won 11 major honors.

When he was 22 (twice 11) he became director of scripts and production at radio station WSB in Atlanta. Twenty-two months later, he entered the army, where he was put to work typing 11 weekly radio shows for local stations.

In the army, he served at 11 different posts, during which time he wrote and directed 11 different series of network programs. After his discharge, he went to New York with his wife Ruthie Ellis (11 letters) whom he met on a day in August (11th to be exact). There he wrote 11 network shows. Finally, he returned here, where he and his wife now live on Fifth Street (count the letters). He so far has written 11 stories for a magazine at the age of 11. Now he's working on a novel which has 11 letters in the title.

STOCKS MOVE UNCERTAINLY WITH SALES AT 5-YEAR LOW

NEW YORK (UP)—Depression ruled Wall Street in 1947 with stock exchange volume at a new low since 1942 and price movements baffling the experts.

So far as the averages of the major groups were concerned, the market ended the year just about where it began. But outside the issues in those averages, there were private little bull markets and private little bear markets.

Selectively dominated the trading through the year. The oil stock stood clear out on the rising side. Textiles, chemicals, steels, motors and motor equipments were firm to strong.

Preferred stocks were hammered down, substantial declines came into liquors, movies, mercantiles, aircrafts, and airlines.

The selectivity often invaded the various groups and some stocks of an industry rose substantially while another fell or barely held its own.

With dealings down, commissions were lower and the Wall Street houses, in most instances, lost money or at the best failed to show profits. Those houses which dealt in commodities, however, made up stock losses in this lucrative trading.

Stocks held within the limits set in the 1946 market. Next year may be different, the experts assert. They aren't willing to hazard a guess on the trend of the market but they feel it will break out of the limits of the 1947 market either on the upside or the downside.

As the year ended, the market had before it a big array of uncertainties. Market men felt that industry would report smaller incomes after many had set new tops in 1947. On that basis, smaller dividends are foreseen after the

1947 record top of nearly \$5,000,000,000.

Wall Street sees further falling off in our exports and isn't convinced the Marshall plan will take up the slack. The whole foreign problem is seen as bad for the market in its uncertainties. And the domestic picture, with inflation difficulties, probability of attempts to curb inflation through credit controls, and lack of incentive for investment in industrial expansion.

Excesses in industry such as record high inventories financed by record high bank loans also are cited as adverse market factors.

Talk of a recession ahead abated at the year end after several predictions of a setback made by reputable economists. As the year ended, predictions were made in the other direction, namely that no recession is in sight for 1948.

The more optimistic hoped for tax relief which, if granted, they feel would furnish incentive for investment and thus help the list-
