Negro Loses One More Round Of **University Fight**

AUSTIN -Herman Marion Sweatt, Negro mail carrier from Houston, today lost another round in his battle to enter the Univversity of Texas Law School.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals, the last hurdle between Sweatt and the State Supreme Court, upheld a decision of a district court barring the negro from entering the school.

The court's action affirmed ruling last May 16 of the 126th District Court of Travis County. At that time the court denied Sweatt a writ of mandamus, a le gal action that would have forced the University's board of regents to admit him to the school.

Chief Justice James W. McClendon charged in the court's ruling today that the State of Texas had "effectually accomplished" by a temporary law school, set up in Austin under the Texas State University for negroes, all that was required under the United States


