Senate Group For Anti-Poll Tax Legislation

WASHINGTON — A Senate rules subcommittee voted 3 to 0 today to approve an anti-poll tax bill.

The proposed legislation is one of the main planks in President Truman's civil rights program which has resulted in the revolt of Southern Democrats.

The House approved the anti-poll tax bill last session.

Subcommittee Chairman William E. Jenner, R., Ind., said he is confident the full rules committee also will approve the measure. But if the bill gets on the Senate floor it would be certain to run into a southern filibuster.
