He was guilty of causing undue suffering, loss to farmers and ranchers and was the direct cause of a marked increase in profanity among citizens hereabouts. Though small in stature* and young, the magnitude of his crimes has caused fears of possible delinquency in future generations of the Ground Hog family, and little faith is expected to be put in their fu-
