## Under The Dome At Austin

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Move over paleface, the redman's on the rebound in Texas.

So is the cost of administering him. C. H. Cavness, the state auditor, furnishes them facts and figures in a report on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian reservation near Livingston.

In 1944 there were three births and two deaths. The tribal population was 357.

But in 1947 there were nine births, four deaths and the tribal population had climbed to 396.

Included in the 396 are 14 Indians carried under the heading of "increase not explained." They got there, but apparently nobody knows how they arrived.

In 1946, eleven of them were

tallied in the same manner. Before that, the books balanced.

The Alabama and Coushatta tribes of Texas operate as a federal corporation. Big business. They were chartered under an act of congress on June 18, 1934.

So far, no dividends have been declared.

In fact, the costs have climbed with the years.

Pull up a dollar and listen to the figures.

In 1944, although there were 357 members of the tribes, only 273 of them lived on the reservation. The net average monthly cost per inhabitant was \$47.65.

Three more Indians came to live on the reservation in 1945. The total went to 281. And the average monthly net cost climbed to \$65.45.

In 1946, the bump was a little lighter. The reservation population touched 289, but the cost per inhabitant went to \$69.80.

But that was before 1947. Last year the reservation population reached 296 and the cost per inhabitant went to \$95.42—double the cost of 1944.

This expenditure is not for feeding the Indians. They feed themselves. Most of it, apparently, is for administering them, and maintaining the reservation facilities.

Included in this cost are the salaries of a superintendent, a farm supervisor and a trained nurse, 11 of whom are employed full time at the reservation.
