Almost Pure Helium Being Made In U. S.

WASHINGTON (UP)- Helium whose production is a United States government monopoly, is now 99.8 per cent pure and doesn't cost a cent more.

The step-up from the previous 98.2 per cent eliminates "deadweight" impurities, will save transportation costs and permit new and better welding techniques for fabricating materials, the Interior Department said.

As far as is known, there is no helium production outside the United States. None of the non explosive, lighter-than-air gas is exported. Foreign countries use hydrogen, which is lighter than helium but inflamable.

The Bureau of Mines sells helium from its two Texas plants to progress in the beautification of the government and industry for a city. 
