## REPUBLICANS IN HIGH HOPES OF CRACKING 'SOLID SOUTH'

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13, (UP)—Republican hopes of cracking the east white Democratic "Solid South" rose today to the highest point since Herbert Hoover did the trick in the 1928 elections.  
Republican strategists figured their chances had improved considerably as result of the growing battle between regular Democrats and rebellious Southern Dixiecrats.  
They said that on the basis of returns from the 1944 presidential election, the GOP might capture at least a couple of southern states if the rival Democratic factions split the Democratic vote about evenly. Those would be states where the 1944 Republican vote approached or bettered 50 per cent of the Democratic vote.  
At least three southern states where Dixiecrats will be on the November ballot — Virginia, Tennessee and North Carolina — fall into that category.  
The 1944 count in those states was: Virginia, 242, 276 Democrat and 145,243 Republican; Tennessee, 308,707 Democrat and 209,511 Republican; and North Carolina, 527,399 Democrat and 263,

## ATTORNEYS AGREE COURT HAS NO JURISDICTION IN VOTE CASE

ALICE, Tex., (UP) — Attorneys for both sides agreed today that the Jim Wells County District Court had no jurisdiction in a disputed ballot injunction case brought by Senatorial Candidate Lyndon B. Johnson, but from that point on their arguments differed widely.  
Johnson sought a temporary injunction against his opponent, Former Gov. Coke E. Stevenson, the Jim Wells county Democratic Executive Committee and others, seeking to prevent a re-certification of the official vote in their senatorial race.  
Johnson's attorneys maintained today in arguments before District Judge L. Broeter that only the Travis County District Court, in which Johnson's petition originally filed, had jurisdiction in the case.

Attorneys for Stevenson charged that no court, has the authority to issue an injunction restraining the 202 alleged illegal votes.  
Meanwhile, County Clerk C. H. Holmgreen denied that he had notarized a statement by Stevenson alleging that fraud and irregularities occurred in the election.  
"I did not see Stevenson when he was in Alice Friday," he said. "The only affidavit I have notarized were those presented by Kelly Dibrell last Wednesday, who showed proof that he was attorney in fact for Stevenson."  
The fight, the first court action in their bitter senatorial race, centered in precinct 13 of the county.  
Stevenson, returning to Austin from a trip here, said that "it will be shown beyond a reasonable doubt that the complete returns published in the newspapers in Jim Wells county the total vote cast in precinct 13 in both the U. S. senatorial race and the only other race on the ticket, was 292 votes fewer than the vote announced a week later.  
"We have evidence to show that these 202 illegal votes were added after the polls had closed," the former governor said. "When

### Tobin Denounces Taft-Hartley Bill

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 13, (UP) — Secretary of Labor Maurice J. Tobin said today the Taft-Hartley Labor Act paves the way for "rugged individualist employers" to bust unions and cut wages in depression times.  
In an attack on the labor law, Tobin said the act's "evil effects" has just begun to become apparent outside of the labor movement.  
He told the annual convention of the Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (AFL) that the latest ruling made by the National Labor Relations Board, in interpreting the act, poses a "serious threat to effective union operations."  
Tobin cited the NLRB finding that under the act it had to rule that employees who are on strike for wages or other "economic" reasons, cannot vote in a board election.  
He said the freedom of unions also had been impaired particularly by provisions of the act permitting an "almost indiscriminate use of injunctions and court actions against unions."  
"I do not refer here to the special injunctions authorized in instances where the public health and safety are involved," Tobin said, "but to the provisions for crippling damage suits, the reckless injunction actions brought by employers or by the uncontrolled and irresponsible general counsel of the National Labor Relations Board."  
President Truman, who recently appointed the former Massachusetts governor to the cabinet post, has obtained several injunctions under the Taft-Hartley Act to forestall strikes, notably against John L. Lewis.

BULLETIN FORT WORTH, Tex., Sept. 13, (UP)—Van M. Kennedy, secretary of the State Democratic Executive Committee, told a canvassing group today that on the basis of official returns as certified from all 252 counties which held elections, Lyndon B. Johnson had 87 more votes than Coke Stevenson. His tabulations showed Johnson with 494,191 votes, Stevenson 494,104.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Sept. 13, (UP)—The Democratic State Executive Committee, after keeping U. S. Senatorial candidate Coke Stevenson waiting for more than an hour, took the first step today towards determining the winner of a hectic Aug. 28 runoff primary — Stevenson and Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson were among an estimated 350 persons in the Blackstone Hotel ballroom when State Chairman Robert W. Calvert called the meeting to order at 10:47 A. M.—47 minutes late.  
Stevenson had been there an hour and two minutes. Johnson was among the late arrivals. They sat in the main section, but three rows of chairs separated them and neither appeared to be aware of the other's presence.

### Kelly Released By Mexican Gov.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 13, (UP)—John Kenneth Kelly, 34-year-old New York industrial designer, said today that Mexican authorities "just apologized and let me loose after he had been held a week on suspicion of attempted extortion of \$5,000 from Virginia Hill, the late Bugsy Siegel's number one girl.  
Kelly spent five days and nights a prisoner in Mexican secret police headquarters and two days in the federal penitentiary.  
"Finally," he said, they checked with the FBI. When they got all clear, they apologized and let me go."  
Kelly said the charges were "silly business" and repeated his previous accusation that Mill Hill's current Mexican boy friend is trying to "frame" her other boy friends.  
"And I was only a good friend," he complained.  
He said the affair put a hitch in his plans to marry a Mexican girl.  
"I was engaged to marry a nice girl until this thing came up," he said.  
"Her father read about it in the papers yesterday and gave her such a chewing she wouldn't even talk to me over the phone after I got out of jail."

Withers, grandson of A. H. (Shanghai) Withers, inherited the 90,000-acre ranch his grandfather developed in Wharton and Matagorda counties. He moved to Chicago two years ago because of ill health.

## ROYALL SAYS RUSSIA HAS FOUR MILLION MEN IN MILITARY FORCE

ASHVILLE, N. C., Sept. 13 (UP)—Army Secretary Kenneth C. Royall charged by implication today that Russia is maintaining a military force of more than 4,000,000 men for aggressive purposes.  
At the same time, he said this country must have adequate military forces for defense and "the protection of our rights."  
"In the troubled world of today, other nations must know that we have these forces," Royall said in a speech read for him before the American Legion state convention. "Thereon rests our hope of national safety and thereon rests our hope of peace."  
Royall was scheduled to appear personally before the legionnaires but his appearance was cancelled because of what the Army said were circumstances beyond his control.  
Without mentioning Russia by name, but obviously referring to her, Royall said: "At least one nation boldly announces its intention that Communism shall cover the face of the earth... this same nation has more than 4,000,000 men under arms."  
"This military might can hardly be for the purpose of defense, since that nation is not threatened from the north, south, east or west. And it is hard to believe that the soldiers and armament are just for good clean fun."  
Warning that "totalitarianism" since World War II has spread over more territory than the Nazis ever conquered, Royall said "there is nothing in recent events to en-

FORT WORTH, Tex., Sept. 13 (UP)—A movement was under way today to unseat Wright Morrow of Houston as Democratic national committeeman from Texas and replace him with Byron Skelton, Temple lawyer.  
First indication of the movement came from the Temple Telegram, which said that a "movement among loyal Texas Democrats to put Skelton in line for that important post is being conducted quickly but apparently with considerable strength throughout the state."  
Skelton, attending the state Democratic Convention here, said that he knew there was such a movement underway.  
Morrow brushed off comment on the reports, and said he had "made my position clear before" and he had nothing to add. He did not amplify his statement.  
Gov. Beauford H. Jester backed Morrow for his present powerful post. A spokesman high in the Jester faction of the party termed the Morrow situation "the number one embarrassment of the Jester ad.istration."

### Say Fruit Prices Will Drop In 1949

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13, (UP) — The housewife may find fruit prices down a little next year.  
The Agriculture Department made this forecast in its monthly report on the fruit situation. It said this year's large citrus fruit production would continue and possibly increase next year, keeping prices down. Non-citrus fruit output will probably increase, it said, leading to a drop in prices.  
The only 1948 fruit crops likely to be smaller next year are apricots, sour cherries and cranberries, which are very large this year.

NEW YORK—(NEA)—What's wrong with Robert William Andrew Feller? That was the question baseball was asking before the Iowa farm boy's most recent start against the Yankees.

Feller supplied the best answer. "I've lost more than I've won," he said. "That's my only trouble." And it looked that way as Rapid Robert demonstrated to the Bronx Bombers that they still have him to contend with in the mad dash for the American League pennant.

It was a bit early to be counting out Feller at that. He's only 29. It was only a year ago last June that the great Cleveland fireballer turned in one of his more brilliant performances, and his difficulties date back to that night at Shibe Park, when his spikes caught in front of the mound and he pitched forward on his face.

Feller struck out nine of the first 11 Athletics who faced him, and the accident happened when he broke off a curve to Barney McCosky for the ninth strikeout. He jammed up his pitching hand, twisted and skinned his knee, had to be removed in the seventh.

Connie Mack and the A's said they never saw Feller faster than he was that evening. He was so swift they simply could not get the bat around.

A 29-year-old pitcher who takes perfect care of himself couldn't be too bad one short year after a performance like that, yet there were too many times this season when Feller looked like anything but the daddy of all handoff kings.

**Little Expected Of Big Four Meet**

PARIS, Sept. 13 (UP)—Representatives of the Big Four foreign ministers met at the Quai D'Orsay—the French foreign office—today for what the western nations feared would be only many hours of argument resulting in continued disagreement on the future of Italy's former colonies in Africa.

The western powers called the meeting a council of foreign ministers, although French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman, who was host, was the only one of the four foreign ministers attending. The Russians said it wasn't a council meeting, because the ministers were not present.

Already the United States has abandoned all hope of agreement with Russia on disposition of the colonies, and was prepared to insist that the problem be placed on the program of the United Nations General Assembly meeting beginning here next week.

Johnson appeared to be the winner by less than 200 votes. The canvassing committee was composed of W. B. Simmons of Orange, Mrs. Claude Hudspeth of San Antonio, Alvin Wirtz of Austin, Alma Lee Holman of Taylor, Mrs. Joe B. Ferris of Daisetta, Gen. Albert Sydney Johnson of Dallas, and Holford Russell of Denton.

Wirtz is not a member of the state executive committee, but he was appointed to the canvassing subcommittee as a replacement for Jerome Sneed, Jr., of Austin, who was stricken in the Blackstone lobby and removed to a hospital only a short time before the committee met. His condition was said to be serious from a reported stomach ailment, but not critical.

Wirtz and Mrs. Holman were the representatives of candidate Johnson on the canvassing panel. Mrs. Hudspeth and General Johnson of Dallas represented Stevenson. Calvert appointed two other committees—one to canvass results in district elections, and a second to study procedure for tomorrow's Democratic state convention here. Then the full executive committee recessed until 2 p. m., and the subcommittees began their work.

The senatorial canvassing subcommittee remained at work in the ball room, and Calvert told interested spectators they could remain to observe the going-on so long as order was maintained.

Earlier, the executive committee recommended that all certified delegations be seated. This action included the sealed states rights groups from Harris, Harrison, Tarrant and Dallas counties, and the Loyalist delegation from Stephens county.

It also recommended to the executive committee that Brazoria county's delegation be seated despite the fact "such delegation is under specific instruction to work to remove the names of Truman and Barkley from the Democratic ticket."

The credentials committee went down the line in accepting the certifications of the county Democratic central committee. Meanwhile, the executive committee was expected to hand down its findings today in Texas' hottest political fight in history; whether Lyndon Johnson or former Gov. Coke Stevenson will be the party's

## nominee for Texas' new U. S. Senator. The nomination is that amount to election.

### Winds Near Hurricane Force Around Bermuda

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (UP)—Winds and seas are increasing at Bermuda and should reach hurricane intensity "very soon," the weather bureau reported today.

The severe 140-mile-an-hour hurricane was expected to change course and "pass close to Bermuda about noon," a 6:45 A. M. ERT advisory by the weather bureau said. At that time the storm was reported 120 miles south of the British resort.

Residents of the island were warned by the bureau to complete all precautions against hurricane winds and high tides "at once."

The bureau wanted all ships north and north-east of the "severe" storm to exercise "extreme caution." The Coast Guard reported that several ships were in the path of the hurricane.

The storm was described as moving between north-northwest and north at a speed of 18-miles-an-hour. The bureau said that the highest winds of 140-miles-an-hour.
