Farmers State Bank president resigns

Jim Purcell has announced his resignation as president of the Farmers State Bank of Hart, effective July 16.

Purcell will assume the presidency of the North Texas Bank and Trust of Gainesville, a newly chartered organization.

"I certainly hate to leave," Purcell commented, but added that the new job was an opportunity "I can't afford to pass up."

A San Jon, N.M. native, Purcell graduated from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, majoring in finance and ag business and minoring in accounting.

After working in a Dalhart bank for six years, he moved to Hart in September 1980 to become the president of the Farmers State Bank.

He is a member of the Hart School Board and president of the Hart Lions Club.

'Good chance,' Hance believes

Congressman Kent Hance said here Tuesday that he feels there's a good chance Panhandle-Plains farmers will get disaster relief payments for their hailed-out and washed-out crops, despite the Administration's tight-money policy.

"I am very optimistic," he said in his Town Hall Meeting here at noon Tuesday. "The law is very specific on disaster designation, and the money is in the budget for it, so there would not have to be a new appropriation."

He said USDA officials who surveyed the hail damage in the area last week were "shocked at what they saw."

Hance said he and other farm-state congressmen are to meet with Secretary of Agriculture John Block again Monday to seek disaster designation and payments for the weather-beaten areas.

"Also, I met with Dave Stockman (director of the Office of Management and Budget), because his office will have a lot to say. It (the disaster relief appropriation proposal) will go to his office if Block approves it, which I think he will," Hance said.

Even so, disaster relief payments won't be enough to save some of the area's financially plagued farmers, Hance said.

"If we get this disaster program, three out of 10 farmers in our area will go out of business," Hance said. "If we do not get it, five out of 10 will."

Hance's Town Hall Meeting in his hometown Tuesday was one of 21 he is holding in a six-day period. Eighty-two attended, compared with audiences of 40 and 45 earlier at Friona and Hereford.

Hance also measured the chances of resurrecting the Farm Crisis Bill which he helped write. He said he plans to attach it to the catch-all Reconciliation Bill, and said it has "at best a 50-50 chance" of passage.

The Farm Crisis Bill calls for additional diversion payments, a nationwide referendum of farmers on a set-aside program with increased loan rates, a billion-dollar Agricultural Credit Revolving Fund, additional loan funds for construction of on-farm storage facilities, release of \$600 million in the Economic Emergency Loan Fund, and increased governmental study toward solving agriculture's long-range problems.

The Farm Crisis Bill died in the House Agriculture Committee when a motion to refer it to the House floor resulted in a 21-21 tie vote. Ag Committee members basically split along party lines, with all but one Republican member voting against it (including three of the bill's Republican co-sponsors), and all but three Democrats voting in favor.

"Secretary Block and other members of the Administration worked very hard to defeat the Farm Crisis Bill," Hance said, adding that the National Cotton Council and the American Farm Bureau Federation also lobbied against it.

Hance chided the Farm Bureau for its stand on the bill, and wondered aloud whether the national FB lobby really represented the views of its members across the country.

"The Farm Bureau said farmers weren't smart enough to have their own referendum," Hance said. "Since the Farm Bureau had always advocated local control, I was amazed at their stand."

He urged local Farm Bureau members, "If you don't agree with the national organization, let them know."

Hance discussed US policies regarding the Falkland Island

City hires police chief

Donald Franklin, 28, of Edmonson, will take over July 20 as Dimmitt's new chief of police.

The Board of Aldermen voted to hire Franklin Tuesday night in an executive session.

Franklin is currently employed as a deputy sheriff with the Hale County Sheriff's Dept. He has worked there 12 months, and previously worked almost five years with the Hockley County Sheriff's Dept. as a deputy, and two years with the Levelland Police Dept.

He earned a bachelor of science degree in law enforcement

at Wayland Baptist University, and an associate degree at South Plains College. He received his basic certification from Central Texas College and his advanced certificate from the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement.

Measuring 6-4 in height, Franklin is married and has two children.

Mayor R. L. Fleming said that 12 applications were received, and that five of the applicants were personally interviewed before Franklin was selected.

City shows \$191,000 gain

Figures from the 1981-82 audit "tell a pretty good story for the City of Dimmitt," Kaci Jones of Brown, Graham & Co. told the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen Tuesday night.

"The city is \$191,000 better off than it was thought it would be when the 1981-82 budget was prepared," Jones said, adding that revenues were higher and expenditures were lower than budgeted.

The city's cash on hand increased more than \$60,000, certificates of deposit increased by more than \$150,000, and liabilities decreased about \$50,000.

A net income of \$144,000 was registered for the utility department for the year ending in April 1982.

Jones said the audit shows "good fiscal responsibility." He said he recommended a change in the handling of meter deposits, and he commended City Manager Paul Catoe for instituting the purchase order system.

The board voted to accept the audit report.

Catoe said that the city's liability insurance agent, Keith Lowe, had informed him that the city airport is excluded from the general liability policy which the city recently purchased. The board voted to extend its bodily injury and personal property loss coverage to include the airport for an additional \$754 per year through Keith Lowe's Dimmitt Insurance Agency, Inc.

Gary Matthews of the Burroughs Corp. presented information on the merits of a Burroughs B90 computer system, compared with the L9000 accounting machine, which is similar to the L5000 machine the city is presently using.

Although they tabled the matter for further study, the

aldermen agreed that the present system does need replacing, and also agreed with Administrative Supervisor Jo Hamilton that the L9000 would be "a bad investment for the city."

Alderman David Hays said he felt the city should look into the possibility of going in with other government entities here on the purchase of a computer system. However, Mayor Fleming said he felt the city should fully own its own system and be able to "do what we want, when we want," and possibly sell time to other entities.

Bill Williams, owner of A-1 Mechanical, asked the city for formal approval of his business's continued use of a base radio antenna placed atop the city water tower in downtown Dimmitt.

He said a verbal agreement with former City Manager E. B. Noble allowed him to keep his antenna there in exchange for electrical maintenance on the control building at the base of the tower.

Alderman Wayne Collins said he felt the city should charge Williams a fee comparable to the local going rate for rental of antenna towers, and include whatever type of insurance coverage that might be required.

The board agreed that some sort of written agreement is needed, and tabled the matter until more information is obtained on rental fees and what insurance might be needed, or the possibility of drawing up an indemnity agreement between the city and Williams.

After an executive session that lasted 1 1/4 hours, the board announced the hiring of Donald Franklin of Edmonson as the new chief of police. Franklin will start work July 20.

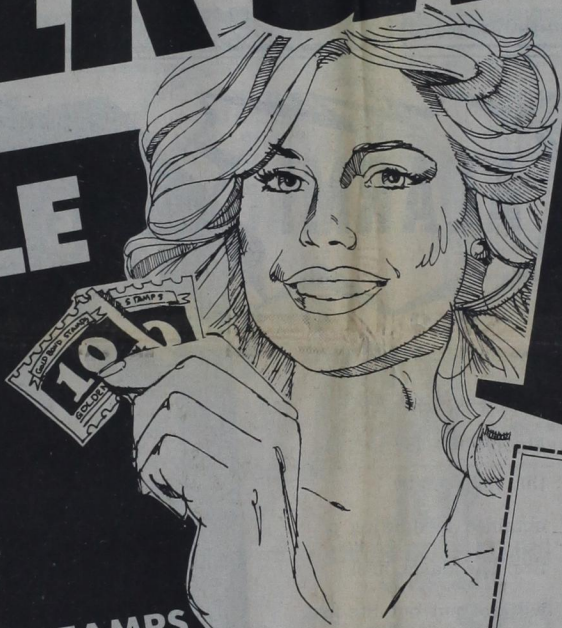

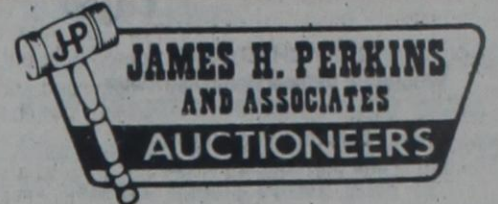

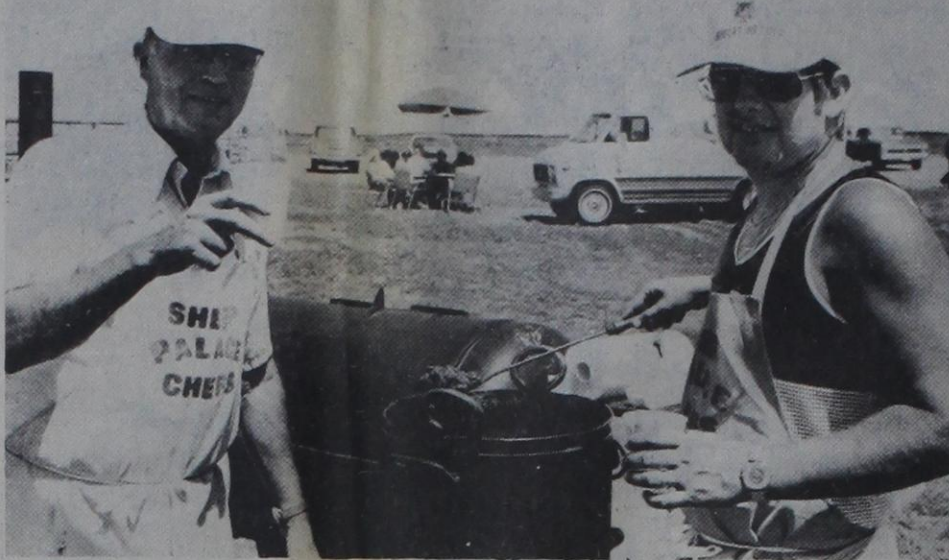
Local ministers plan a special collection

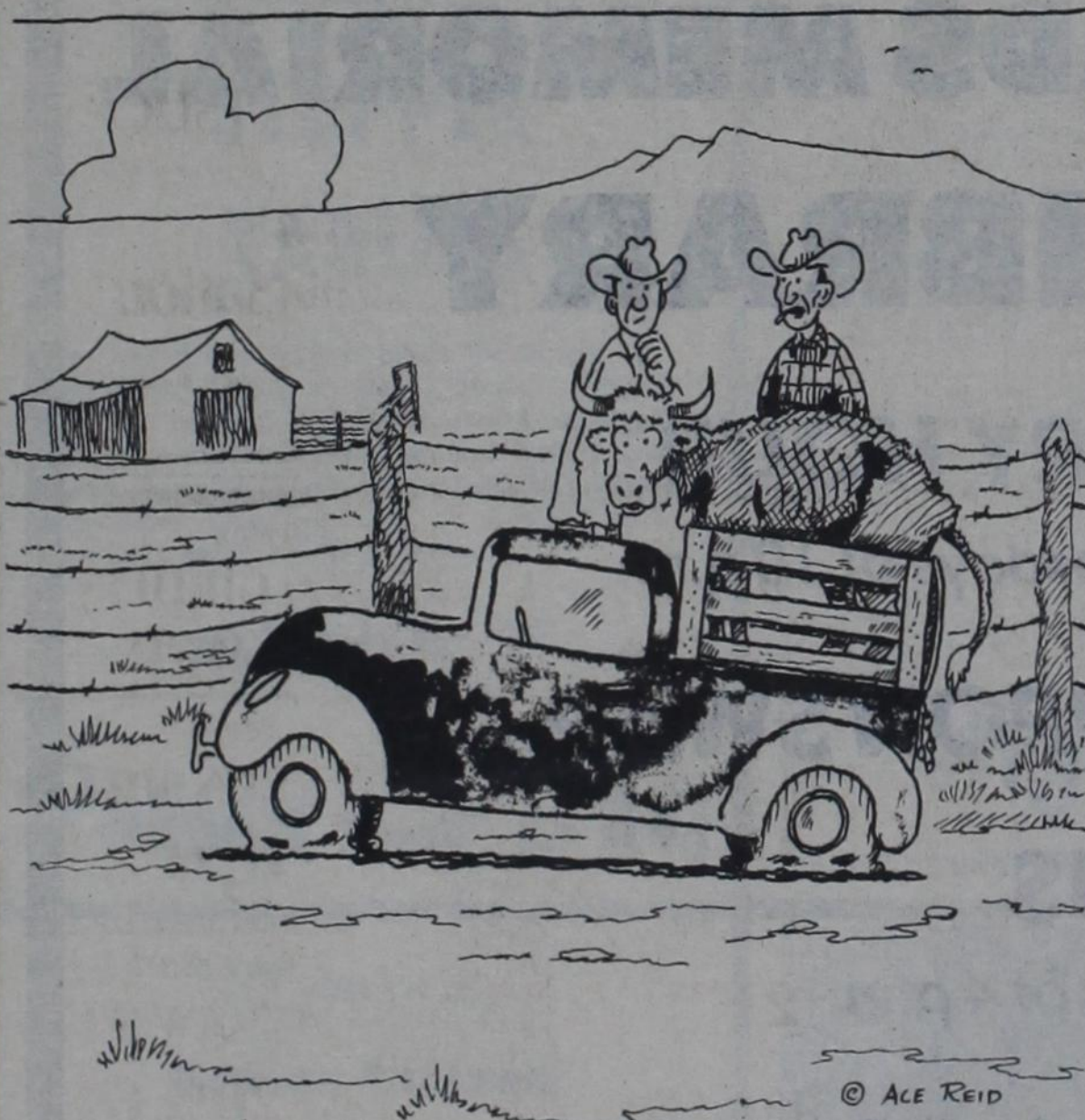

August 1 will be the last day to certify

Whether they participate in the acreage reduction program or not, farmers have until Aug. 1 to report their 1982 planted acres to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Program participants are required to report crops and acreages planted, the uses to be made of these crops and cropland acres to be devoted to conservation uses. "Non-participants need to certify their crops for future programs," Charley Hill, C.E.D. said. In addition to history purposes, the acreage reports are also necessary for proven yields. ASCS will randomly check farms to verify that acreage reports are accurate and will

have aerial photographs available for farmers to identify their fields. To be sure of planted acres, farmers can request measurement service. For a fee of \$9, a farmer can request that his planted crops be measured prior to reporting acreages. The fee covers the cost of the farm visit and the measuring of one area. Each additional area measured while the reporter is on the farm is \$3. "This is a valuable service not only to producers participating in the acreage reduction program, but to any farmer who desires an accurate acreage for any reason," Hill said. Crop certification is necessary before the farmer can receive the benefits of price support, deficiency payments and other program benefits. Spring seeded crops may be certified at any time between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. "We hope that farmers will not wait until the Aug. 1 deadline," the ASCS official added. Almost all qualities of cotton stapling an inch or less and grading low middling light spot, strict low middling spot, middling spot or above will be discounted less this year than last. However almost all cotton stapling 1-1/32nds inch or longer and grading below the strict low middling base will show greater discounts, and qualities above the base grade will receive smaller premiums than in 1981. Cotton rates show increase

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. of Lubbock recently learned that the 1982 base cotton loan rate at High Plains warehouse locations would be 57.2 cents per pound, basis strict low middling 1-1/16th (41-34), 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire.

That's 12 points (.12 cents) above the national average 1982 loan rate of 57.08 cents announced earlier. When applicable discounts are applied the High Plains rate translates into a loan value of 47.4 cents per pound on the mid-range High Plains quality of strict low middling light spot 31-32nds inch (42-31), 3.4 micronaire.

The loan rate at various US warehouse locations is adjusted each year to reflect differences in freight costs from different areas to mill sites and ports. Last year's High Plains rate of 52.5 cents was only four points above the US average.

Most all qualities of cotton stapling an inch or less and grading low middling light spot, middling spot or above will be discounted less this year than last.

However almost all cotton stapling 1-1/32nds inch or longer and grading below the strict low middling base will show greater discounts, and qualities above the base grade will receive smaller premiums than in 1981.

Micronaire discounts in all groupings above and below 3.5 to 4.9 show an increase over last year, from 35 points on 3.3 and 3.4 to 65 points on 2.6 and below.
