Watching wire news come in hour after hour is a fascinating business and makes one realize how closely in touch we are with the great wide world.

Minutes after news breaks, it's on those wires and a running account of it is kept up all day. And you keep watching to see what's happening next.

The complete coverage given news has been clearly shown in the yards and yards of type that have come over wires in the past months relative to the coming elections. And we'll have to admit that it has become monotonous following every little move of presidential candidates and others running for office.

Now what after the elections? We don't know but we'll bet on the news hounds digging up something that'll keep the public interest geared.

Guess, however that so long as we keep letting the Russians push us around there'll be something to keep us with our eyes glued to the wires.

Now here Stalin is today accusing the United States and Britain of a "policy of aggression" and if the facts we get are true, there can be no doubt about who's doing the aggressing and it ain't us.

Like we always say, get those Russians in a tight spot and just about fenced in and they start squealing "It's the United States and Great Britain." A clever way they have of trying to turn the tables. And they do it every time, too.

Talk about aggression! Why they've got the U. S. and Britain bottled up in Berlin that they can't squirm and all of the time evidence points to the fact that Russia is getting ready to do just what she's already done to other sections of Europe.

Yes sir, we're on General Arnold's side. Let's just run that blockade, call their bluff and do a little of the "double-dog-daring" ourselves.

Incidentally, speaking of the Russian boat, one of the best ways in the world to miss the boat or anything like it in this county is to exercise your right to vote in the general election November 2, next Tuesday.

Statistics show that in 1896 83 per cent of the potential voters cast their ballots; in 1916 71.5 per cent exercised that right and in 1944 only 56 per cent of the potential voters exercised that great American right.

If any person in America thought actually, that there was any threat to the privilege of voting in this country, he'd rise up in arms. But the figures just above are a greater threat to that American right, than any outside influence. The surest way to inactivate a privilege and finally kill it for good, is just not to make use of it.

There're more issues in this election that just voting for the president of the United States or for Lyndon Johnson or Jack Porer. There are amendments to be decided upon, and the legalization of beer to be voted upon.

Remember, like we always say, if you don't vote, don't holler.

## AIR-HOPPING RUSSIAN STAYS DEEP MYSTERY

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 28 (UP)—A 29-year-old Russian who gave police an hour's merry chase after jumping from an airplane limousine and then reportedly asked to be taken to jail was scheduled to tell U. S. immigration officials his story today.

So far, the youth, identified as Mathieu Tolstoy, has told police officials very little. Other details also are scanty.

It was known that Tolstoy arrived here about midnight Tuesday night via an American Airlines plane from Mexico City. An official of the airline, Al Garcia, accompanied him in a limousine bound for a San Antonio hotel. Tolstoy was advised by Garcia that he would have to report to immigration officials and the young man fled shortly afterwards by jumping from the car.

He was arrested within an hour and transferred—reportedly at his request—to the Bexar County jail. It is customary for air-

line passengers challenged by immigration authorities to be held in hotels.

Authorities declined to disclose the Russian's destination. Tolstoy told immigration officials on arrival that he had a diplomatic passport and it was not determined why his credentials were questioned.

Airport authorities do not request to see diplomatic passports. Such passports are examined by immigration officials.

Local officers could not learn whether the youth is related to the late, famed Russian novelist, Leo Tolstoy.

## MORE FUEL FEEDS HOT SENATORIAL RACE FIRE

More fuel to the burning Democratic senatorial battle was provided today for the heated controversy raging since second primary of Aug. 28.

Some of the fire was literal. It was disclosed yesterday—a day of sensational developments—that Duval county ballots and all other official records had gone up in smoke.

And in Austin, Gov. Beauford H. Jester broke his silence on the charges and counter-charges that the August voting was fraudulent. He said he would recommend that the next legislature revise the Texas law "to give complete assurance that our selections shall be honestly and fairly conducted."

In Washington, a Senate elections subcommittee ordered Democratic second primary ballots in 13 counties impounded. Former Gov. Coke Stevenson, a candidate for the Democratic nomination by 87 votes, had asked for an investigation in Starr, Jim Wells, Jim Hogg, Zapata, and Duval counties. To the list, by request of Democratic Senatorial Nominee Lyndon Johnson, were added the counties of Brown, Dallas, Harris, Galveston, Clay, Eastland, Wharton and Chambers.

Another unusual aspect to the general senatorial picture cropped up last night when it was disclosed that Mrs. R. A. Thompson of Goliad, a sister of Duval county political boss, George Parr, would support Jack Porter, Republican candidate for the Senate seat. Mrs. Thompson previously has been active in politics, being a former vice-chairman of the

Democratic state executive committee.

An explanation of the burning of the Duval county ballots was obtained by Claude Ramsey, United Press staff correspondent.

Duval Democratic Chairman Campbell King and Assistant County Clerk Francisco Aleman said veteran courthouse janitor Epifanio Betacourt burned the ballots in broad daylight on Oct. 19.

Duval county, they explained, was to loan 28 old battered ballot boxes to Jim Wells county, which faced a shortage because its boxes were tied up by litigation. Betacourt inadvertently emptied not only the old ballot boxes—which had been out of use for a long time—but the 11 new ones which contained 11 August ballots and records, they said.

The decision to hold the meeting was made at a meeting Wednesday morning of the directors of the Retail Merchants Association.

However, the meeting Monday is not for members of the association alone but for all Ranger merchants and every one is urged to attend.

It is hoped that at the meeting all plans for the season can be completed and immediate action taken toward carrying them out. It was pointed out that this meeting is for the benefit of the merchants themselves and a full attendance is urged.

## Contracts On Nearby Roads Let Wednesday

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 28 (UP)—The Texas highway Department ended a two-day road letting yesterday in which it took \$687,027 in low bids on a total of 33 projects.

In the final round yesterday, contractors presented bids amounting to \$2,613,718 on 16 projects. The proposed construction calls for 170 miles of farm-to-market roads and 80 miles of primary and state highway projects.

Included in yesterday's low bids were:

Stephens County—L. Bury Brownwood, \$106,708, grading, structures, flexible base and single asphalt surface treatment, on farm roads 578 and 701, from Crystal Falls South of Junction with State Highway 6, 5.5 miles north to Breckenridge and from intersection, east road, 5.3 miles south of Eliaville south to Junction with state highway 67, 8.5 miles northeast of Breckenridge. Totaling 8.738 miles.

Parker County—L. H. Lacy Co., Dallas \$589,767, underdrains structures, roadbed treatment and concrete pavement on U. S. 80, from 2.5 miles east of city limits of Weatherford to Tarrant County line, 11.71 miles.

**Rain Spreading From Panhandle**

Light showers moved into the Texas Panhandle during the night and early today were spreading southward down over the south plains.

Amarillo's .86 inch of rain was the heaviest reported to the U. S. Weather Bureau in the 24 hours ending at 4:30 A. M.

Other measurable amounts included .12 inch at Big Spring, .11 at Lubbock, .06 at Midland and Salt Flat, .01 at Midland and Salt Flat.

The day dawned cloudy for most of the state and the forecast called for showers in parts of both east and west Texas during the day.

Temperatures this morning ranged from 46 at Guadalupe Pass to 47 at Galveston. The high yesterday afternoon ranged from 83 at Brownsville down to 68 at Marfa.

## SOVIET PREMIER BLAMES FAILURE TO SETTLE BERLIN CRISIS ON WEST

### Governor Urges Rotarians To Be Loyal To Club

"One of the mottoes of this organization is 'Service Above Self,'" he emphasized and urged the Rotarians to make this their guide in community and international service.

### Fire Rages After Oil Tank Explosion

DRUMRIGHT, Okla., Oct. 28 (UP)—Fifteen gasoline storage tanks at the Tide Water Associated Oil Co. Refinery near here exploded today and windows in homes two miles away were shattered.

Four hours after the series of explosions began at 6 A. M., 100 employees of the refinery were fighting fires which raged within 200 feet of the petroleum distillery itself.

Superintendent L. M. Jagou of the refinery said no injuries had been reported. He estimated damages at \$150,000.

## FIVE BEER ELECTIONS SHOW WETS LEAD TOTAL

Whether Eastland county remains dry or authorizes the sale of beer in the county will be decided in the November 2 election.

Records of the last five beer elections in the county, beginning with 1936 and running consecutively through 1940, show that the county cast 9,085 votes for legalization of beer and 7,246 against the legalization of beer. Twice in those elections the county went wet and three times it went dry.

MOSCOW, Oct. 28 — (By Telephone to London — (UP) — Premier Josef Stalin today accused the United States and Great Britain of seeking a new war through a "policy of aggression."

Replying to a questionnaire from the Russian official newspaper Pravda, the Communist leader said the British and Americans declared "null and void" an agreement reached in the Kremlin conferences Aug. 30 which would have settled the Berlin crisis.

He charged that the Western Powers put on a "display of aggression" in United Nations Security Council debate on the Berlin question, and once again at that time rejected an agreement with Russia which would have resulted in lifting of the Soviet blockade of Berlin.

Today's reply to the Pravda questions was Stalin's first important statement of Russian policy since May 17.

At that time, he endorsed a program outlined by third party presidential candidate Henry A. Wallace as a "good and fruitful basis" for discussion and settlement of differences between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Stalin often takes advantage of questionnaires submitted by press agencies and newspapers to make major policy pronouncements. The last such was on Oct. 28, 1946, when he replied to 31 questions submitted by Hugh Bailie, president of the United Press.

Stalin's replies to Bailie disclosed that Russia then had 60 divisions in Western Europe, she did not have the secret of the atomic bomb, she still was interested in a loan from the United States and she did not believe the veto had been overworked in the United Nations.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28, (UP) — A congressman who recently toured western Europe today attributed Josef Stalin's war mongering charge to worry over success of the European Recovery Program.

Rep. Omar Burleson, D., Tex., said the Russian premier "sees his hope of European domination glimmering."

Stalin charged that the Western Powers fear "most of all" to reach any agreement with the Soviet Union.

"The thing is," told Pravda, "that those who inspire the aggressive policy in the United States and Great Britain do not consider themselves interested in agreement and in cooperation with the U.S.S.R."

"What they want is not agreement and cooperation, but talk about agreement and cooperation, so as to put the blame on the U.S.S.R. by preventing agreement, and to 'prove' that cooperation is impossible."

He said that what "the war investigators trying to unleash a new war are afraid of most all is reaching an agreement and cooperating with the U.S.S.R. because a policy of concord with the U.S.S.R. undermines the position of the investigators."

Stalin, in reply to a question as to whether an agreement had been reached on the Berlin question at any time, said the agreement was decided upon in conferences at the Kremlin between envoys of the Western Powers and his Soviet officials.

This agreement was reached on August 30 this year, he said, on the basis of simultaneous lifting of the Soviet blockade of the western sectors of Berlin and establishing the Soviet-sponsored East German mark as the sole currency in the German capital.

It was this agreement, Stalin said, that Britain and the United States declared "null and void," and which they returned by their "display of aggression" to accept at the Paris United Nations meeting.

He was referring to conferences held at the Kremlin over a period of about a month, during which U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith, British Special Envoy Frank Roberts, and French Ambassador Yves Chateaugay met a number of times with Soviet foreign minister V. M. Molotov and Stalin himself.

The Western Powers sought in these conferences to reach an agreement for ending the Soviet blockade of Berlin which now is more than four months old.

## \$100,000 Damage Suit On Trial In 91st Court

The case of Patsy Nance et al. vs. Wesley Isenhower et al. went to trial before Judge Geo. L. Davenport of the 91st district court Wednesday morning.

This morning the plaintiff was taking testimony having called their second witness. Most of Wednesday was taken up in getting a jury to hear the evidence.

The case is a damage suit in which \$100,000 is sought for personal injuries. The parties involved reside in Cisco.

Patsy Nance was injured on November 28, 1947, when the car in which she was a passenger and one driven by Wesley Isenhower were in a collision on the streets of Cisco.

## Rep. West Dies

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (UP)—Rep. Milton H. West, former Texas Ranger and Democratic congressman since 1933, died today in Walter Reed Hospital after a long illness. He was 60.

West had been hospitalized at Walter Reed since last May, suffering from glandular disturbances.

The congressman held the seat vacated by John Nance Garner when he became vice-president. He was born at Gonzales, Tex., but made his home at Brownsville, Tex., where he practiced law for many years prior to his election to Congress in 1933. He also served two terms in the Texas Legislature.

West was a graduate of West Texas Military Academy, San Antonio. He became a member of the bar after studying law in the office of Judge James B. Wells.

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## BRITAIN PETITIONS COUNCIL TO REMOVE ISRAEL MILITARY

PARIS, Oct. 28 (UP)—Britain asked the United Nations Security Council today to order a withdrawal of Jewish troops in the Negev and to consider imposing economic sanctions against the infant state of Israel if the order is not obeyed.

China joined Britain in presenting the resolution and four other members—the United States, Canada, France and Belgium—announced they would support it. Russia asked for a delay to consider the proposal.

Soviet Delegate Jacob Malik said it was premature to take such drastic steps now because quiet has been restored to the Negev as a result of the UN's cease-fire order.

The British-Chinese proposal won the support of a majority of the Security Council. But a vote was delayed until tomorrow at the request of Russia and the U.S.S.R.

At the same time other sources disclosed some of the far-reaching implications of the long range western strategy to halt Russia.

They said the North Atlantic security pact was sufficiently advanced so that it might be signed next spring.

This pact will link the United States, Canada, Britain, France, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg into an unprecedented peacetime military alliance.

Its future potentialities are so great as to bring a major portion of the non-Communist world into line against the Soviets and their satellites.

Through other treaties and associations of the members states, he pact may eventually include the Western Hemisphere, the British Dominions, the eastern Mediterranean, North Africa, Scandinavia and the Pacific area.

NUENBERG, Oct. 28 (UP)—Eight German military leaders were convicted by an American court today of carrying out Hitler's criminal orders for murder and ill-treatment of prisoners and civilian populations in countries overrun by the Nazi Wehrmacht.

They were: Gen. Hans Reinhardt, 61, Panzer division and corps commander on both the east and western fronts.

Gen. Hans Von Salmuth, 59, Invasion planner for Hitler.

Gen. Karl Holldt, 58, invasion planner for the Nazi Eastern campaigns.

Let. Gen. Karl Von Roques, 58, army group commander in Russia.

Let. Gen. Hermann Reinecke, 50, military member of the dead people's Court. Tribunals and controller of prisoner-of-war affairs.

Let. Gen. Walter Warlimont, 54, Hitler's personal envoy to the Spanish civil war and one time German army artillery observer at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Let. Gen. Otto Woehler, 54, army group commander in Russia.

Let. Gen. Rudolf Lehman, 57, judge advocate general of the German army.

All will be sentenced later today.

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## Ex-Minister Leads Revolt In Peru

LIMA, Peru, Oct. 28 (UP)—Five regiments of army troops have revolted in southern Peru, seized the country's second city of Arequipa and proclaimed a provisional government, the Arequipa radio said today.

The broadcast said the revolution was commanded by Gen. Manuel Odría, 51, a former cabinet minister and chief of staff of Peruvian forces in the 1940 war with Ecuador. He was credited with bringing victory to Peru.

Odría was a member of the Peruvian general staff as recently as last month. He was reported to have been confined to his home by illness about a month ago and has made no official appearance since then.

The government of Dr. Jose Luis Bustamante Rivero admitted a rebellion had broken out in southern Peru. The government said troops had been rushed south from Lima and other northern and central points to quell the uprising.

### National Guard Recruit Quota Is Increased

The Texas National Guard, under its present authorized strength is permitted to recruit one additional man for each two men now in the Air National Guard, and one additional man for each five now in the Army National Guard, compared to the national average

of one man for three in the Air and one for eleven in the Army National Guard, the Adjutant General's Department has announced.

With provision for enlisting young men 17 to 18 1/2 years old, and veterans with short Federal service, the National Guard confidently expects to reach full authorized strength on schedule. It is planned to have five thousand recognized units in the United States by June 1st, 1949.

The National Guard has accomplished all of the goals set forth by the Departments of the Army and Air Force, and is a force-in-being ready for its "M-Day" mission. Six of the eighteen M-Day Divisions planned by the Army are National Guard Divisions. One of the six is Texas' own 49th Armored Division.

Recently the limitation on strength quotas was raised for certain units of the Air National Guard. Several hundred additional men will have the opportunity to fly in National Guard planes as pilots or passengers. All Air Training Command courses are open to Guardsmen, where they may go to school and learn radar and radio, mechanics, photography, weather observation, and many other subjects of value in civilian pursuits. They get clothes, board and room free, and receive pay and allowances of their grade.

For the first three quarters of 1948, gross revenue was \$22,544,289, while the net profit amounted to 80 cents a share. In the third quarters of this year, the 1 w o pipe lines earned a net income of \$1,380,364.

Of unprecedented size and length, the pipelines were laid during the war to move gasoline and fuel oil to the east coast. Texas Eastern Transmission, who bought the lines since the war, uses them to deliver gas to the east.

The president of the company, R. H. Hargrove, said he believes the pipes will have a delivery capacity of 500,000,000 cubic feet a day by Jan. 1, 1949, including tie-in lines now under construction.

# Gas Line From Texas To New York Planned

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (UP)—A natural gas pipeline from Texas to New York is planned by the Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line Corp., Dallas, the Securities & Exchange Commission has been notified.

The line, to be completed early in 1951, will cost \$130,000,000.

The company offered yesterday for registration 265,000 shares of cumulative preferred and 265,000 shares of common stock. The underwriters of the offering will be White Weld & Co. and Stone & Webster Securities Corp., both of New York. The stock will be offered in units of one share on preferred and one share of common.

In addition, Transcontinental will offer to present holders 2,250,000 shares of common stock at \$10 each. Present holders will be allowed to purchase three new shares for each one share now held.

Further, the corporation will offer \$148,000,000 of 5-8 per cent two-year first mortgage pipeline bonds next June 15, to institutional investors.

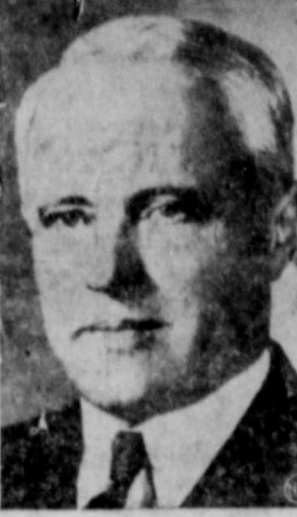

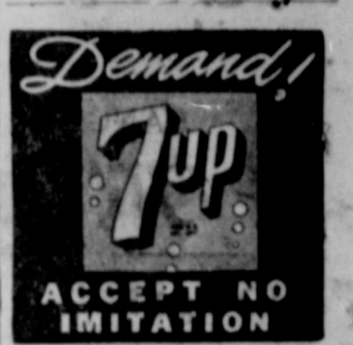

## RANGERS HAMPERED BY INJURIES BUT RATE EVEN CHANCE FOR WIN

In a battle that won't affect their conference standing but could give them the impetus to sweep through to the zonal crown, the Rangers will tee off with the Navarro Junior College Bulldogs tonight at 8 P. M. at Bulldog Stadium.

For the Rangers it will be the fifth outing of a season that has seen Coach Boone Yarbrough's team capture three out of four decisions. Only Kilgore, the number one junior college team in the nation, has beaten the Rangers — by a 34-14 count. The locals have successively beaten Texas Military College, Cisco and Clifton.

Navarro has a similar record, dropping their first game to Corpus Christi and then roaring to take five straight over a variety of opposition — both good and bad.

Yarbrough will field a team minus a half dozen first string performers. Starting guard Jack Townzen is sidelined for the year while Ben Blitch, Lee Ligon, Claude Neeley, Edwin Crum and Bill Spivey also are slated for limited if any action.

But boasting an able gang of reserves Yarbrough and the Rangers should be set for the prime effort of the year. The Ranger offense that powered through Kilgore for two early touchdowns is a smooth, heady unit that hasn't been stymied thus far.

To lead that aerial attack the Rangers have one of the best in the conference. Quarterback Junior Arterburn has pitched in with a steady if not spectacular air arm and right below Junior is Jackie Wright who can fling in any league.

No individual star highlights the Ranger running game. Jimmy Crawley and Frankie Ford carry the mail on most of the outside plays with the hard-hitting fullback Bailey Woods relegated to powerhouse plays.

The forward wall, an alternating of offensive and defensive unit has clamped the gate on scoring since the Kilgore defeat. Only Cisco has scored on Ranger — and that came on a disputed pass play. Season mainstays of that airtight line have been defensive end Charley Sullivan, a 210-pound rock that can be moved only when he trots off the field for halftime. Bob Herrington, a small but beefy tackle, Johnny McClendon, the shattering spark-plug center and Billy Townzen.

Navarro's offense, a T-formation all the way, centers on two fleet backs who must be stopped if the Bulldogs are to be stopped. Chief cog is the undersized signal caller, Reed who weighs in at 134 pounds but who can spray his rifle shots all over the chalk marks.

The other half of the one-two punch is halfback Davis — an 156-pounder who runs with speed and most of the time in a forward direction.

Although not too high in the pounds department the Bulldog line will hold a weight advantage. The starting guards, Prestige and Bradley weigh 193 pounds apiece while tackles Carrington and Phillips move the scales to 170 and a chunky 208 pounds respectively.
