United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, Nov. 16. (UP) - The United Nations Security Council today called on the Arabs and Jews to negotiate a permanent armistice in Palestine and again ordered the Jews to leave their recently-Seized territory in the Negev.

Acting in the face of fresh Arab and Jewish diffance. the Security Council took four votes to approve the armistice plan in sections.

By a vote of 8 to 0 with Russia, the Ukraine and Syria abstaining it adopted two parts of the armistice plan. By a third vote of 8 to 1 with Russia and the Ukraine abstaining it adopted the part calling for the armistice.

Syria voted against the armistice clause. The Jews welcomed the call for armistice negotiations

as the first step toward a formal peace settlement. But their refusal to leave the Negev, even temporarily, confronted the Council with new troubles, even before the resolution was passed. The council order called or the Arabs and Jews to negotiate forthwith, either directly






