United Press Staff Correpondent PARIS, Nov. 17 (UP) - Top United Nations leaders appealed again today to Russia and the Western Powers to settle the Berlin crisis with "the least possible delay."

Their new appeal came in a statement issued only a few hours after the Big Three western nations had blamed Russia for the continuing Berlin dispute and had rejected Union until the blockade of the German capital is lifted.

The United States, in its note, said that direct negotiations under durers of the blockade would "endanger the peace of the world" by compromising the UN charter principle that force "shall not be used for attainment of national objectives."

But UN secretary-general Trygve Lie and Geenral Assembly President Herbert V. Evatt were not dismayed by American, British and French negative replies to their · letter suggesting "immediate"

the Berlin crisis. Believing that their letter had started a "chain of events" which

might soon lead to at least a truce in the cold war, they issued a pro-mpt statement in which they not-ed "with satisfaction" that all the great powers in their replies "indicate in one form or another their desire to reach a settlement of the Berlin question.

"The president of the general assembly and the secretary-general hope," their statement said. "that this common desire will find expression with the least possible delay in further attempts to find a solution acceptable to all parties."

Indicating that, as had been ex pected, the next attack upon the problem would be made through UN Security Council, which still has the question on its agenda, Lie and Evatt again urged in their statement that the four powers give "full and active support" to the efforts of Security Council President Juan Bramugh ia of Argentina to mediate the

The brief Lie-Evatt statement promised "further comment" later on "certain asports" of the replies received from Russia and the Western Powers.

Western Powers took the concert-

formula behind which Lie and Evatt apparently now are prepar ed to throw their weight. White Bramuglia's plan still was being modified from hour to hour in minor details, it was known to call for simultaneous lifting by introduction of the Soviet ponsored eastern mark as the only currency in Berlin.

The use of Soviet currency in the entire German capital is the main Russian demand in the dis-

## **POLIO RELIEF EFFORTS CURBING DREAD DISEASE**

By Barbara Bundschu United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK, Nov. 17 Mrs. R. O. Pearson, a tall, blueeved 40-year-old housewife from Abilene, Tex., with a tight boil of blonde braid around her head, took a course in mercy.

She learned how to administer not packs to children suffering from Poliomyelitis, how to feed them and take their temperatures, and when to call a nurse.

But it was always something that happened to somebody else. Mrs. Pearson said today.

Then infantile paralysis came to Texas-1,612 cases where there had been 185 the year before, and to Abilene-49 children hospitali ed at one time where there had been six at the height of last year's "season."

We had a very sinking feel-Mrs. Pearson said of herself and the 23 other polio emergency volunteers in her community. Seven suddenly

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
