It was raining as the secretary's big plane touched down at National Airport at 10:05 A. M., EST after a flight from Paris where he attended the United Nations General Assembly meeting.

President Truman, who drove out to the airport to meet Marshall, was the first to greet the general.

Marshall said it would be "inappropriate" to say anything about United Nations' affairs at this lime. Then he

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


