Approves Over 2,000 Pardons

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 2 (UP)—Of 3,040 recommendations submitted to Gov. Beauford Jester by the board of pardons and paroles during the last fiscal year, the governor approved all but 213, it was reported today.

In its first annual report, covering the period from Sept. 1, 1947, through Aug. 31, 1948, the board said that it considered 9,008 cases.

Of this number, 3,040 were submitted to the governor for action. He approved 92 per cent of them. During the year there were 17 death cases. However, four of the sentences were commuted from death to life imprisonment. The other 13 inmates were executed.

A total of 629 inmates were released as the result of board action.

The report, signed by Abner L. Lewis, chairman, and Walter C. Strong and R. A. Smoot, members, showed that the greatest number were between 21 and 25 years old.

A total of 194 were in this age group. In the 17-20 bracket, 119 inmates were released; 26-30 years, 128; 31-40 years, 118; 41-50 years, 44; 51-60 years, 71 and over, 3. There was also one man released whose age was not known.

Urges Military Aid To Europe

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (UP)—Defense Secretary James Forrestal believes the United States should give generous amounts of military equipment to Western Europe to end fear of aggression.

"It will avail us nothing to cherish trust in their ability to defend themselves," Forrestal said last night. "It is westward—to us—that they look for help and for substance that will enable them to face the future with assurance, an assurance equal to their courage."

The defense secretary spoke at a dinner of the English-Speaking Union of the United States, at which Sir Oliver Franks, the British ambassador, was guest of honor.

## Oil and Gas News

### Sam Roosth, Oil Operator, Looks This Field Over

A man who arrived in the United States and began work as a baker today is one of the most successful independent oil operators of Texas.  
He is Sam Roosth of Tyler, who has been in Eastland to observe the revival of oil activities in this and with the idea of getting into the play.  
Medium height and stocky in build, Roosth has heavy grey hair which sweeps back and he has a thin mustache and carries a cane. He is friendly and courteous and he gives an impression of alertness at all times.  
Roosth was born in Russia. He came to the United States in 1907 and went to work in a bakery at Marshall. Two years later, he had saved enough from his wages to open a small bakery in Gilmer, where he did all the baking himself, with one assistant. After several years, Roosth sold out and established a bakery in Tyler.  
The Tyler bakery has grown until it represents an outlay of perhaps \$125,000.  
The way that he got into the oil business was that some operators had a 30-acre lease in East Texas with a drilling contract. They were going to have to start a well right away or lose the lease so they offered Roosth 10 acres out of the 30, if he would drill. He had three days in which to start a well in order to hold the lease. The well was started within the time limit but there was considerable trouble and delay, so it took 60 days to drill the well. Its operators, Ed Margolis and Neut and Dave Stearns, have filed suit in federal court charging Continental with being a monopoly in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

Bureau Dispute Snares Truman

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (UP)—President Truman appeared caught in the middle today of a bureaucratic dispute over preparation of standby plans for war mobilization.

The dispute centers around the national security resources board, a top-level planning agency headed by Arthur M. Hill and including representatives of the state, defense, labor and four other government departments.

Hill was understood to favor a controversial plan to make the agency a sort of peacetime "war production board." Under the plan, it would have sweeping power to

direct other agencies how to map plans for such things as rationing, allocation of materials and mobilization of man power.

Several of the cabinet representatives, however, objected strongly to giving the board such administrative or refereeing powers contending it should remain only a central advisory and planning agency.

White House sources indicated Mr. Truman would settle the argument by ruling against Hill. The President may have something to say on the subject at his news conference this afternoon (4 P. M. EST.).

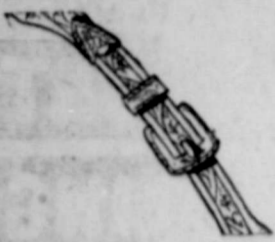

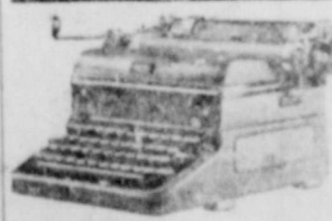

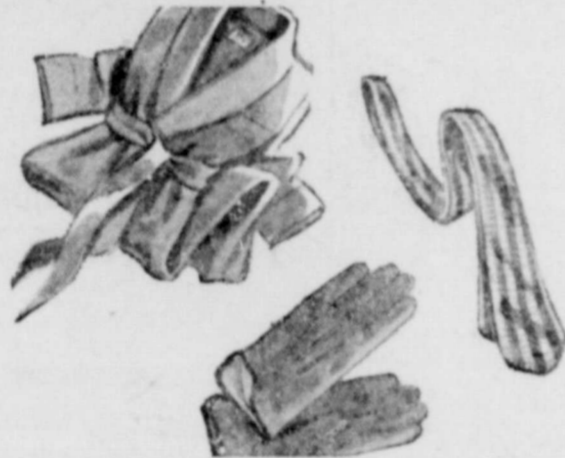

## URGE COOPERATION WITH DAIRY PROMOTION SET-UP

If farmers and local business men respond to a proposal by the Texas and Pacific Railway Company, it won't be long before before farm boys in the territory served by the railway own registered Jersey heifers. Success of a dairy promotion program recently inaugurated by the railroad depends largely on the cooperation of business and agricultural leaders within the country, according to J. J. Finegan, assistant to the president of T&P Dallas.

To vocational agriculture teachers, bankers, county agents and merchants in T & P territory, the railroad makes this offer: T & P will provide one Jersey heifer for some 4-H or Future Farmer boy, provided local leaders will raise the funds to secure nine others. The program, a long range one covering a period of years, is designed to upgrade dairy stock. The heifers will be awarded with the understanding that their first calf is to be "ploughed back into" the program — given to some other boy who will, in turn do the same thing.

First takers of the T & P offer are the agricultural and business leaders of Wood County. Under the leadership of the Mincola Farm market there, plans have already been made for placements of the heifers and fun raising to procure the other nine animals is underway. Mr. E. A. Spacek, Wood county Agent, and vocational agriculture teachers will supervise placement of the cattle.

C. B. Senter, agricultural agent for T&P, points out that much of the area served by the railroad from Texarkana to El Paso is located in one of the greatest natural dairy sections of the nation and that dairying should contribute more to the economic life of the section than it now does. Mr. Finegan voiced the company's viewpoint — "Dairying is a growing industry in the Texas and Pacific Southwest. Emphasis must be placed now on pasture building and quality milk-producing cattle. T & P considers this program the nucleus of what may well become the basis for general upgrading of dairy cattle throughout the Southwest. It should become a permanent program, with young farmers cooperating."

### Jones Cautions Foreign Spending

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 2 (UP)—Jesse Jones was back at home today after spending the summer and fall in New York state, where he and Mrs. Jones vacationed on the Thousand Islands in the St. Lawrence River. He had a few words to say on the international situation, and mainly expressed the hope that the people of Europe, getting voluminous aid from this country, would not lose their initiative to help themselves. "... I am firm in my belief," Jones stated, "that we will not and must not go beyond our depth in our efforts to help people of other countries who are not willing to work to help themselves."
