## WTCC TO PUSH DOMESTIC WATER RIGHTS PROGRAM

ABILENE, Jan. 5.—Protection of the domestic water rights of West Texas today was termed by John Mitchell of the Texas Chamber of Commerce as the most important task of the First National Bank conference in Abilene for conference with General Manager D. A. Bandeen.

"We are launching on all fronts a very comprehensive and constructive program as worked out by our executive board, eight district meetings and board of director action during October and November," Mitchell said.

"Our first and most important task is to protect our municipal and domestic water rights now being seriously threatened by legislation requiring that all big power dams be first filled with water before our West Texas towns can get water.

"My town of Odessa would be foolish to participate in a \$12 million tri-city water project if our water supply on the Colorado is first dependent on the big power dams around Austin being filled before we can have water. The same applies to all West Texas towns."

To assure action on this before the legislature the Municipal Legal Rights and Defense Committee meeting has been called for Amarillo 10 a.m. Monday, Jan. 17, in the office of Mayor Lawrence Hagy, who is co-chairman with Charles South of Coleman of this important committee. Other members are Preston Kers, manager of the Odessa Chamber of Commerce secretary; Charles E. Coombs, Stamford, legal consultant; Mayor C. M. Davis, Rotan; Mayor A. C. Humphrey, Stamford; Mayor A. F. Little, Jackboro and R. M. Wagstaff, Abilene, who was one of the authors of the WTCC-Wagstaff-Woodward act which is the law which now gives domestic users prior rights to water.

Proposed new legislation would place a vested right to water that falls on West Texas water sheds with present appropriation holders which include power dams, thus depriving municipalities of their rights to recapture this water.

er for domestic use, under the present law, according to Mitchell. At the same time he pointed to the importance of another committee, which will meet in San Angelo, Jan. 10. This is the legislative enactment committee of the Soil Conservation Commission, and is headed by W. R. Casenberry of Sonora and Wendell Mayes, Brownwood. Other members are Paul Counts, Fort Stockton Chamber of Commerce manager, secretary; Sterling Williams, Snyder; Judge L. M. West, Channing; Judge Robert Herring, Breckenridge and J. Walter Hammond, Tye.

It is the duty of this committee to assist in passage by the 51st session of the legislature an enabling act prescribing terms and conditions of use by the respective counties of the state general fund ad valorem as constitutionally diverted to the counties. Under this bill the counties are assured the maximum of local self government in the expenditure of these funds within the counties for soil conservation, farm-to-market roads and water conservation purposes.

## Texas Petition Goes To Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UP)—The Senate rules committee today was expected to receive a petition, signed by some 2,000 Texans asking the senate to investigate the disputed Texas runoff before seating "any Democratic nominee" from the land of tangle-gate hats.

The petition referred to Sen. Lyndon Johnson, who took the oath of office Monday. He defeated former Governor Coke R. Stevenson by 87 votes in a bitter battle of the ballots. Later, he easily defeated GOP nominee Jack Porter in the Nov. 2 general election.

Stevenson, who later supported Porter in the general election, contested the balloting in federal courts, thus holding up Johnson's certification as the party nominee. Johnson got on the ballot only after a U. S. Supreme Court ruling.

# Truman Asks Congress For Increased Revenue

## C OF C ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

Joe N. Graham was re-elected president and J. A. Bates made vice president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce at the annual election of officers held Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the directors.

W. F. Creager was named treasurer and R. V. Galloway re-elected secretary-manager.

Graham who had served an unexpired term as president, after re-election, expressed his appreciation to members of the Chamber of Commerce and to the directors for the fine spirit of cooperation which they have shown during the last term.

Gaston Dixon, E. F. Arterburn and A. W. Warford were installed as new directors.

An article appearing in the Ranger Daily Times edition Tuesday relative to improvement of city water supplies was unanimously endorsed by the directors who also passed a resolution offering their wholehearted moral support to the city commission in their efforts to meet the water situation.

During the business session, directors voted to have the derick at the intersection of Main and Commerce streets painted; to change regular meetings to once a month, with the regular meetings to be augmented by called meetings; voted to hold the annual banquet sometime early in the spring endorsed a movement to sponsor a representative at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth; authorized an audit of Chamber of Commerce books.

Members went on record as favoring a change in the city charter to call for city election every two years. Under the present provision all commissioners are elected to office at the same election every two years.

After a report by Arterburn, president of the Quarterback Club the directors voted to back the football banquet being sponsored by the club and which will be held January 18. Blair Cherry, head football coach at the University of Texas, and one-time coach at Ranger, is to be the principle speaker.

Morris Newnam represented the Junior Chamber of Commerce at the meeting.

Funeral services for James Collins of Cisco were conducted this morning at 10 o'clock at Holy Rosary Catholic Church in Cisco with the Rev. Augustus Merkel, priest of the parish, officiating, interment was in Oakwood cemetery in Cisco. Rosary was said Tuesday night at 8 o'clock.

Mr. Collins died at the Graham Sanitarium in Cisco January 3, 1949. He was born in Newport, England July 31, 1886 and went to Cisco from Cardiff Wales in 1905. He had served two years as grand knight of the Ranger Council of the Knights of Columbus and was very active in all Catholic activities in Cisco. ## Rail Settlement Sought To Aid Waterless City

WICHITA FALLS, Tex. Jan. 4 (UP)—Conferees of state, railway and union officials were to continue here today in an effort to resume operation of the strike-bound Wichita Falls & Southern Railway to haul water to drought-stricken Archer City.

Archer City now has little more than a 10-day supply of water left in its city lake. The severe water shortage grew out of last year's drought.

Mayor John Fall of Archer City said use of rail tank cars appeared to be the only means of hauling the 80,000 gallons daily necessary to meet the town's needs. The WF&S is the only rail line serving Archer City.

Orrval Bullington, WF&S board chairman, offered to lease three tank cars and an engine to Archer City to be used on the Lake Olney-Archer City water haul. However, railway brotherhoods would not agree to operate the trains on the water mission although they expressed sympathy for Archer City's plight.

Brig. Gen. C. P. Kerr, sent here from Austin by Gov. Beauford Jester, said no settlement was reached in yesterday's talks with Bullington and with union officials. However, conferences were to continue today.

The rail strike started Dec. 17 after union officials said management refused to grant their request for a \$3.92 per day wage increase. The line operates 169 miles of track from Wichita Falls to Dublin, Tex.

## FREEZING WEATHER ADDS MISERY TO STORM TORN ARKANSAS TOWN

By Robert Brown United Press Staff Correspondent WARREN, Ark. Jan. 5 (UP)—Freezing weather multiplied the suffering in this grief-stricken town today as dazed residents began the long job of cleaning up after a tornado that killed at least 54 and left hundreds injured.

As if the howling, killing twister that tore up some 250 homes were not enough, the elements continued to plague this broken community.

Hail and heavy rains followed the hop-skip tornado Monday night. Thunderstorms and a heavy downpour kept up all day yesterday.

Last night the skies cleared, but the temperature dropped. By early today, weary cleanup crews battled freezing weather to get this once-busting lumber town back to "normal."

The furious, whirling tornado rushed across 100 miles of north-west Louisiana and Arkansas late Monday leaving wreckage and injured in its wake everywhere, but this town near the end of its

BY LYLE C. WILSON United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UP)—President Truman today asked the new Democratic Congress to hike federal taxes by \$4,000,000,000 (B) and to authorize limited price and wage ceilings.

In his annual message to the state of the union, he also proposed that the government make loans for any necessary expansion of plant capacity in such industries as steel where production is critically short. If private industry refuses to build the plants, Mr. Truman said the government itself should build them. The plan is bound to raise cries of "socialism."

The proposed \$4,000,000,000 (B) new taxes would lie heaviest on corporations but the president did not say whether by an excess profits levy or otherwise. Some new revenue would come from higher estate and gift taxes. Mr. Truman said Congress also should consider raising tax rates in the upper and middle personal income brackets.

He delivered his "fair deal" message in person before a joint session of the 81st Congress in the chamber of the House. Most of Mr. Truman's cabinet and the justices of the Supreme Court were among the distinguished and largely friendly audience.

"We have rejected the discredited theory that the fortunes of the Nation should be in the hands of a privileged few," the president said. "We have abandoned the 'trickle-down' concept of national prosperity."

"Every segment of our population and every individual has a right to expect from his government a fair deal." With that as a text, Mr. Truman fired at the new Congress which his party controls the long list of recommendations which the old Republican Congress had ignored and on which he based his successful presidential campaign.

The message was heavily weighted with anti-inflation recommendations, short on specific foreign policy and national defense proposals and long on costly projects to conserve natural resources and improve the lot of the poorer people.

Mr. Truman said he was happy to report that the state of the union is good. But he called the roll of shortcomings and said Congress and the President with the cooperation of all elements of the people must combine to overcome them.

He asked again for Universal Military Training, restoration of the Reciprocity Trade Agreements Act to full effectiveness and an open door without unfair discrimination to displaced persons.

The President said the American people had been creating a society of new opportunities for all in the past 16 years.

"The recent election," he continued, "shows that the American people are in favor on this kind of society and want to go on improving it. The American people have decided that poverty is just as wasteful and just as unnecessary as disease."

He laid before Congress some of the most bitterly controversial issues of our time, including racial, medical, insurance, civil rights, repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act and re-enactment of the Wagner Labor Relations Act.

But he qualified this repeal and re-enactment proposal by asking amendment of the Wagner Act, as follows:

"Jurisdictional strikes and unjustifiable secondary boycotts should be prohibited. The use of economic force to decide issues arising out of the interpretation of existing wage contracts should be prevented. Without endangering our democratic freedoms, means should be provided for settling or preventing strikes in vital industries which affect the public interest."

## Group To Consider Election Changes

AUSTIN, Tex. Jan. 5 (UP)—Gov. Beauford Jester's committee studying proposed election law changes will meet Friday to study revisions suggested by John Sheppard of Gladewater.

Sheppard's proposals call for a two-party system, with primaries to be held in April and May instead of July and August and for shortening the ballot by holding separate elections for county and precinct officials.

An Eastland quintet that was showing its wares for the first time provided just the ticket to the more experienced and another Bulldog five last night at the Recreation Building as the local lights waited to a 47-17 victory.

Better than seven minutes had passed before the uncertain Maverick squad could notch a basket—by Len Quarles and by that time the Bulldogs were nine points to the good. Ranger had an overwhelming 25-5 advantage at the half.

The newly instituted fast break paid off finally for the Bulldogs. Controlling the backboard the Bulldogs maintained a lightning tempo which threw R. C. Smith and Ronald Williams free under the hoop, time and again.

The Mavericks showing the need for heavy practice sessions couldn't crack the Ranger zone—being forced to take hurried pot shots from the out side. Only against a varied array of Ranger second stringers did the Mavericks put on any scoring drive. They tabbed eight points in the final quarter to raise their final count to fairly respectable proportions.

Despite the fact that the opposition was questionable the Bulldogs flashed one of their better efforts of the season. Those schoolboys misses under the basket that had been plaguing Coach Sam Aill's team weren't repeated. Big Ronald Williams looked as if he had found himself—dispatching his under the basket chores in good fashion.

The driving R. C. Smith plunk

ed in seven field goals to lead his mates while Kenneth Williams and his namesake Ronald added nine points each. Little Tommy Velasco, the hard working Maverick forward dropped three field goals which took away scoring honors for the Eastland Club.

Both club will travel to Comanche Friday for a bit of tournament action. Thus far the Bulldogs have played and defeated two conference foes—DeLeon and Eastland—both warm-up affairs. Regular conference activity doesn't get under way until January 14 with a single round robin schedule.

## Basketball Ace Nips Bribe Try

NEW YORK, Jan. 5. (UP)—A war hero college basketball star was credited today with trapping four men charged with attempting to bribe him with \$1,000 to throw a game at Madison Square Garden.

District Attorney Frank Hogan said Dave Shapiro, 25, co-captain of the George Washington University basketball squad, had been working with New York police for four months to gather evidence against the four who were arrested last night.

The accused quartet, three men from New York and one from Florida, will appear this afternoon in felony court to answer charges that they offered Shapiro, co-captain of the George Washington University basketball squad, \$1,000 if his team would lose last night's game to Manhattan College "by 18 or 19 points."

Instead of losing, George Washington trounced Manhattan, 71 to 63, and Shapiro, a Battle of the Bluge veteran, was given unqualified praise by Hogan for trapping the four men.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 5. (UP)—The Southwest Conference basketball championship race began last night with a distinct bang as Texas Christian upset heavily-favored Southern Methodist, 58 to 52.

TCU trailed 33 to 25 at the half but smooth ball handling woe the chips were down around the Frogs victory in the last two-and-one-half minutes of play.

Julius Dolnick, a 29-year-old center, was the Frogs' big gun, scoring 21 points. The Southwest Conference's oldest cager, Dolnick tallied four more points than SMU's sophomore ace, Jack Brown.

The victory assured TCU of at least as good a season as they have had the past two years when they won single conference clashes.
