





Meat roll-ups: a variation of the scrap of leftover meat or chicken and make a delicious supper en tree. Another variation is the apple pancake dessert which provides a hearty ending to an other-wise light supper of soup and salad. Corn griddle cakes, new and different, will please all the family no matter what hour of the day they are served.

Corn Griddle Cakes (Makes 12 to 15 griddle cakes)

One and one-half cups sifted ture, made by mixing together 15 four, 31/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, 1½ teaspoons sait. ¼ teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1 egg, well beaten, 1 cup milk, 1 cup cooked or canned corn, 2 tablespoons melted shortening. Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, pepper and sugar and sift again. Combine egg, milk and corn. Add to flour mixture, add shortening, then mix only enough to dampen flour. Bake thoroughly on hot, greased griddle. Serve hot with butter and mapleblended syrup.

Meat Roll-Ups (6 servings)

Use your favorite pancake recipe. Spread each paneake with pie-shaped wedges and serve at about 2 tablespoons of meat mix-once with maple-blended syrup.


