ANGUS CALLED TO DUTY BUT WILL REMAIN IN COMMISSIONER'S RACE

Herschel E. Angus, police and fire commissioner of Ranger, stated today that he has been called to active duty with the infantry reserve and must report for duty on Monday, March 14. He said that contrary to rumor, he is not withdrawing from the race for re-election to the office of police and fire commissioner and that if he is re-elected will be back in May to take up his duties.

Angus reports as a lieutenant colonel for duty at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, Monday. His assignment will last until May 20. Angus served five years with the Armed Forces and is a veteran of the famous Battle of the Bulge. He came out of the service as a lieutenant colonel.

Angus said that he regretted very much that receipt of these orders necessitated his absence from Ranger at this particular time, in as much as he is a candidate for re-election to a second term as police and fire commissioner. However since the choice was his, it is his hope that he shall be able to contact as many of the citizens as possible before the date of his departure.

Warmer Weather Due For Texas

West Texas and the Panhandle had sub-freezing weather early today but temperatures did not fall as low as expected and a general warming up was in prospect for the next 24 hours.

Clarendon reported the low of 27 degrees; it was 28 at Wichita Falls, 30 at Amarillo and Childers; 31 at Mineral Wells, and 32 at Lubbock, Abilene and Ft. Worth. Temperatures as low as 22 had been forecast for the Panhandle.

The forecast indicated fair this afternoon and tonight in East Texas with scattered frost in the northeast portion, but warmer Friday, and for West Texas partly cloudy during the next 24 hours with rising temperatures.

Yesterday's high was 84 degrees at Brownsville which had a low of 57 this morning. The coastal area reported minimums this morning in the 40s.

Rainfall reported during the last 24 hours included .89 inch at Houston, .37 at Galveston and .27 at Beaumont.

The Weather Bureau said, in connection with last night's chilly temperatures, that the coldest weather of last winter came on March 11. It was 12 degrees that day in Dallas and considerably lower in the Panhandle.

LEADER HOLDS LITTLE HOPE OF STOPPING CHINESE COMMUNISTS

NANKING, March 10 (U)—Retiring Premier Dr. Sun Fo said today that he saw little hope of preventing Communist domination of China and its alignment with Russia in the East-West cold war.

He chiefly blamed Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's failure to make peace with Communists in the Marshall mediation days immediately after the end of World War II for China's present plight. The developing East-West cold war and "vacillating United States policy" in China also played a part, he said.

Sun, son of Sun Yat-Sen, the founder of modern China, received this correspondent in his Nanking office while waiting for acting president Lo Tsung-Jen to appoint his successor as premier. Sun and his cabinet resigned early Tuesday, but agreed to carry on until a new government can take over.

He said that even a temporary agreement with the Communists during the Marshall mediation attempt would have helped the Nationalists to rebuild China's national economy and military strength.

Now, he said, there appeared little hope of fighting off Communist

TRAIN ROBBERS TAKEN IN WASHINGTON GUN BATTLE

WASHINGTON, March 10 (UP)—The two gunmen who held up a Baltimore & Ohio streamliner in West Virginia were captured by police here today after a gunbattle in which one was shot and wounded critically.

Police said both confessed they held up and terrorized the B&O railroad passenger train before fleeing it last night near Martinsburg, W. Va.

Police said that loot taken in the daring train robbery was recovered. The bandits took about \$1500 in cash from the terrorized passengers, some of whom were gun-whipped by the desperadoes.

Police listed the names of the gunmen as:

Luman Ramsdell, 23, of Youngstown, O., who was shot and critically wounded below the heart.

George Llewellyn Ashton, 21, also of Youngstown.

The name of Ramsdell was found in a wallet which had been dropped in a West Virginia nightclub to which they fled after holding up the passenger train.

The youthful gunmen slipped through roadblocks thrown around West Virginia roads last night and early this morning and came to the capital on a Greyhound bus.

They were captured, and one was shot, in a pawn shop within five blocks of the White House. Apparently the men attempted to pawn some of the loot in the

pawnshop when Police Officer Elmer G. Lomax arrived on a tip. Ramsdell went for his gun and Lomax fired. Ramsdell was hit just below the heart. Ashton covered back and gave up.

Ramsdell was taken to Gallinger Hospital in serious condition and was not expected to live.

ISRAELI TROOPS REPORTED ON MOVE TOWARD TRANS-JORDAN PORT

Two Teen-Agers Public Invited May Face Charges To Junior Play Of Car Theft

BROWNWOOD, March 10 (UP)—Two Austin teen-agers who say they fled their home town to escape the threats of older boys probably will be returned there to face car theft charges.

Brown County Sheriff Otis Shaw said the youths had signed statements admitting they stole a 1949 Ford convertible Tuesday in Austin, then "tore out like a bunch of maniacs" in a wild, 24-hour drive into Oklahoma, back to Austin, then to Brownwood.

The boys, one 16 and the other 17, were captured yesterday in a Camp Bowie maneuver area by Highway Patrolmen Aubrey Crockett and W. D. Lawler, Jr., who wrecked their squad car in the chase.

Seven cars of officers and two planes from Brownwood had converged on the Camp Bowie area after the youths bought gasoline at Brady, and drove off without paying.

The teen-agers, when arrested, had in their possession a small arsenal including a shotgun, two rifles and ammunition. They dropped their weapons, however, when the patrolmen overtook them on foot.

The confessions failed to bear out the story of Phillip Waters, 16, who initiated the manhunt by telling authorities the accused youths had "kidnapped" him at gunpoint. He said he was released unharmed late Tuesday near San Saba.

The youths said they were enroute to Oklahoma again to seek employment when arrested in the stolen auto, which Sheriff Shaw said belongs to Mrs. Susie Landris of Austin.

The Sheriff said the younger boy would be returned to Austin for juvenile court proceedings, while a warrant has been issued for the older boy.

Arlington Woman Burned In Fire

ARLINGTON, Tex. March 10 (UP)—An Arlington woman was critically burned early today in a gas explosion that lifted the roof of her home.

Three other persons escaped injury from the blast which shattered windows and knocked doors from their hinges at the C. A. Sutton home.

Mrs. Sutton was taken to Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, where doctors said 80 per cent of her body was severely burned. Dr. Sutton, pastor of the First Methodist Church here, escaped injury, as did a son, 10, and an elderly woman, described as a friend of the family.

Arlington firemen said the blast occurred about 3:10 A. M. and apparently was caused by a leaky gas stove. It occurred when Mrs. Sutton struck a match to light a bathroom heater.

Soil Conservation Bill Given Boost

AUSTIN, Tex. March 10 (UP)—Legislation appropriating \$10,000,000 for state soil conservation work jogged forward another step today.

Members of a Senate finance sub committee, hearing testimony on the measure yesterday, voted to report the bill back next Monday.

However, hope for final passage of the full appropriation dimmed in the light of a \$22,000,000 downward revision on the state's estimated income for the next two years.

R. M. Boswell of Kenedy, a director of the State Association of Soil Conservation Supervisors, pressed the argument in support of the measure.

Boswell, posing the threat of compulsory federal conservation warned:

"If the states don't do it, then the federal government will take it (Soil Conservation Work) over and administer it on a socialistic basis. We've set this up, (the proposed bill) upon a Democratic basis where we can run our own business."

Israeli troops were reported on the march in southern Palestine today within 35 miles of the Trans-Jordanian port of Aqaba, defended by a British garrison.

There still was no confirmation of a Trans-Jordan defense ministry announcement last night that units of Trans-Jordan's Arab Legion had clashed with the Israeli troops at a point about 32 miles northwest of Aqaba.

Israeli officials at Tel Aviv denied there had been a clash. But they did not deny Trans-Jordan's claims that two Israeli columns have started to move through the southern Negev at the southern tip of Palestine toward Aqaba.

British military sources in Cairo said the bulk of an Israeli force about 1,000 strong, had reached Burj El Muleila, 35 miles northwest of Aqaba. Advance patrols may have penetrated farther south, they said.

The British said they did not believe the Israelis had crossed the Palestine border into Trans-Jordan, nor that they intended to attack Aqaba.

Rather, the British said, the Israeli advance appeared aimed at controlling the highway from the Trans-Jordan border into the Negev and occupying the strategic Negev triangle bordered by Trans-Jordan on the east and Egypt on the west. Aqaba lies at the head of the Gulf of Aqaba just inside the Trans-Jordan border opposite the tip of the Negev triangle.

The southern tip of Negev is still in dispute and Trans-Jordan forces may be inside it. Its future pending a formal peace treaty is being discussed at Rhodes by Israeli and Trans-Jordanian armistice delegations.

Other foreign news included: Berlin—Authoritative sources said the U. S. Military government has completed a letter rejecting Soviet demands that a restitution mission be permitted to enter the U. S. Zone of Germany to hunt for Soviet property stolen by the Nazis. The letter was expected to be signed late today by Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. Military governor.

London—The British cabinet was reported to have approved principle of the draft of the proposed North Atlantic Security pact. No details were available.

Rangoon, Burma—Rebel Karen Tribesmen captured the central Burma town of Maymyo after heavy street fighting. Maymyo is 30 miles northeast of Mandalay.

Sydney, Australia—Eighteen passengers and three crewmen were believed killed when an airliner crashed and burned shortly after taking off for Brisbane.

Investigation Of Three Rivers Incident Opened

THREE RIVERS, Tex. March 9 (UP)—A legislative committee today was to begin digging into a racial controversy which caused a Latin-American soldier to be buried in Arlington National Cemetery instead of in his home town.

"We'll let the chips fall where they may," said Attorney Cecil Storey of Longview, head of the five-man House committee. Storey said the investigation would be confined to charges that a Three Rivers funeral home director had been reluctant to accept the body of Felix Longoria, who was killed in the Philippines in World War II.

He said the committee would accept only testimony which has a bearing on "things we are authorized to investigate by the House resolution."

Storey had a list of 20 witnesses who were expected to be subpoenaed.

aed. First witnesses were to be called shortly after 9 A. M., when the committee was to convene at the Three Rivers Rotary Club building.

A court interpreter was on hand to translate testimony of the Spanish-speaking witnesses. Longoria's father and Doctor Hector Garcia of Corpus Christi, an official of the League of Latin American citizens, were expected to testify early in the proceedings. Deadline for the committee's report to the state legislature was March 15.



Jury Deadlocked Over Axis Sally

WASHINGTON, March 10.—(UP)—A deadlocked Federal court jury resumed deliberating today whether Mildred (Axis Sally) Gillars is guilty or innocent of treason.

The seven men and five women of the jury returned to Federal Court at 9:40 A. M. EST to resume weighing the evidence.

In 10 and one-half hours of study yesterday, the jury was unable to decide whether the American-born defendant was guilty of being a traitor to her country by broadcasting over the Nazi radio during the war.

Miss Gillars, dressed in the same black dress she has worn through most of her six-week trial, was brought to court from district jail in a bus loaded with other prisoners.

If convicted by the jury, the sultry-voiced siren of the Nazi radio faces a sentence ranging from five years imprisonment to death. But the United States has never executed a traitor in peacetime.

The members of the jury spent last night at a hotel.

LAST YEAR DESPITE PRICES FARM INCOME HIGHER THAN

WASHINGTON, March 10 (UP)—Farm income is running higher than last year, although farm prices are averaging about 10 per cent lower, the agriculture department reported today.

The department said farmers during the first quarter of 1949 probably will get \$330,000,000 (M) more from the sale of their products than they did in January-March, 1948. That's an increase of about five per cent.

A substantial boost in marketings and quantities placed under government price support loans has more than offset lower prices, the department said.

The boost in marketings resulted from last fall's record high harvest. Furthermore, farmers who took government loans on crops got more cash that way than the current market price would bring them.

This was especially true for corn. The cash market price has been averaging little more than half as much as last year, the department said.

The department gave this estimate of January-March marketing

receipts: Livestock and products—\$3,800,000,000 (B) or slightly less than last year, with meat animal receipts about the same. Larger meat animal marketings offset lower prices.

Crops—\$2,800,000,000 (B), or nearly one-fifth above last year despite a drop of about 13 per cent in average crop prices.

Only 5,000 of the 12,000-plus options offered for public sale by the Fair were taken up, Thornton said.

Using the same tactics to rattle their favored opponents the tall, red-shirted Razorbacks from Arkansas and the smaller, but speedy wildcats from Arizona knocked Rice and Baylor, respectively, out of the running in opening games of a four-game playoff last night.

Arkansas, playing in the final game of the night before 3,700 fans with towering center Bob Ambler, pulled away from a 21-18 halftime lead to eliminate Rice 50-34.

Arizona came from behind to eke out a 26-24 halftime lead over Baylor, then breezed in front 35-47.

Despite the closeness of the first-half scores in both games, there never was much doubt as to the ultimate winners being in command of their games.

With ambler out of the lineup because of a slugging incident in the first three minutes, lanky Ken Kearns, a guard, took over the offensive spotlight with a 15-point performance.

Bill Tom, Rice's sparkplug, was throttled almost completely by Mike Schumchuk until the final minutes when he managed to rack up enough points to wind up as second high man with 12.

Leon Blevins, the slickets ball

handler seen on a Dallas court this season, stole the show in the opener as Arizona baffled the Southwest Conference Baylor team that knocked the wildcats out of the playoffs last year. Blevins scored 25 points, but continually kept Baylor off balance with his faking and pass interceptions.

SNOWSTORM IN MISSOURI TAKES LIVES OF FOUR

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. March 10 (UP)—A snow storm that blanketed an area for 75 miles in all directions around this southwestern Missouri City today had claimed four lives and disrupted highway travel in the Ozarks.

The snowfall had stopped this morning after a fall of about four inches, but the temperature remained below freezing. Marooned motorists had been rescued from slick pavements, but highways were still hazardous.

The storm, carried on strong northerly winds, caused a flurry of minor collisions in city streets and marooned hundreds of motorists on slush-slick highways.

Fred Robertson, 64 of Ozark, Mo., was killed and three other persons injured in a head-on collision on a steep hill on Highway 123, five miles south of Nixa.

J. C. Joslin, 85, Springfield, was killed instantly when his car struck a truck headon near Mount Vernon, Mo., last night.

Mrs. Fay Hendrix, 52, Fairview, Mich., and Mrs. Bessie Mae Fisher, 45, Pruet, Ill., were killed in an automobile mishap on highway 66 near Waynesville, Mo.

At the height of the storm last night, city police said as many as seven calls a minute were received at headquarters reporting minor collisions on slick streets.

A school bus full of children skidded off into a ditch on Highway 65, 12 miles north of here, but there was no injuries reported.

A highway patrolman radioed that his scout car and some 85 other vehicles were stuck near Cedar Gap, south of here. At the James River bridge approach on Highway 60, about 160 cars were stranded on the incline.

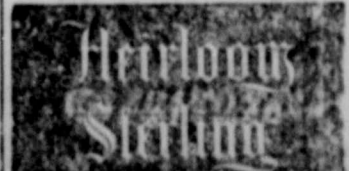

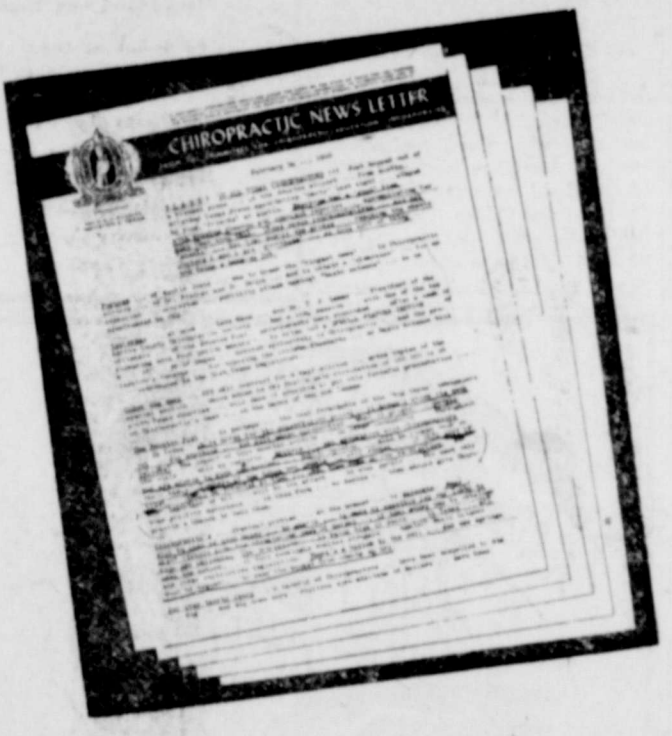

An 8-page "Special Edition" appeared in the Houston Post on Feb. 28th. It was a paid "Special Edition," packed with misrepresentations. However, it was written to look like a real news section so that its misrepresentations might appear to be legitimate. It was an obvious attempt to smokescreen the merits of the Minimum Standards Bill, which already has been recommended for passage by Public Health Committees of both the Texas House and Senate.

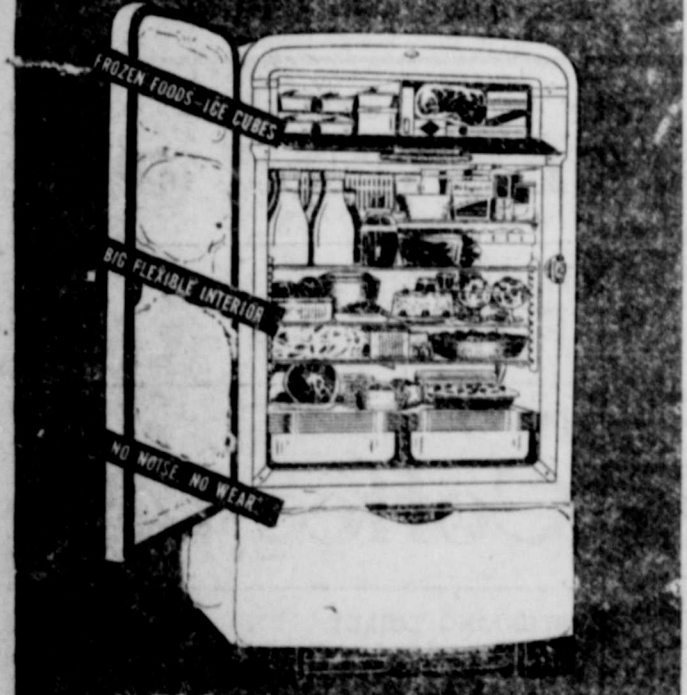

1. Is the bill against chiropractors? In tacking the Minimum Standards Bill, the doctors of medicine are not opposing chiropractors or any other branch of the healing arts. In fact, doctors of medicine have even recommended that the legislature license qualified chiropractors. The only stipulation made is that chiropractors—like all other licensed professions—agree to meet minimum standards before an impartial board of examiners. Any person who has been practicing a healing art in Texas for a year or longer and who has lived in Texas for two years, is NOT required to take the Minimum Standards examinations.
 2. Would the examination be fair? Yes—for two reasons. First, all branches teach these basic sciences—in many cases from the same text. Thus, the sciences covered are those which are basic to all branches. Second, examiners would be chosen by a body, not by some Texas State agency. There is no way to tell whose favor they would be given.
 3. What are the examining board to be? Yes! A board of six science teachers would give the examination. They would be appointed by the Governor from the staffs of our leading Texas colleges and universities. No practitioner from any branch may serve on the board. What could be fairer?
 4. Would the examining board be qualified to give the examinations? Yes. Who is better qualified to give a scientific examination than the man who teaches the subject? These are the same people who teach your boys and girls in our colleges and universities.
 5. What are the basic sciences? They are six sciences—Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Bacteriology, Pathology, and Hygiene and Public Health. Why object to an examination in sciences so important to healing that all branches agree that they must be taught?

HOLLYWOOD, March 10 (UP) — Professional Texans, who'll fight for their home state at the drop of a Panhandle, are feuding again—this time with a lady warbler named Jo Stafford and a songwriter who says he thought the Alamo was a river.
These expatriate "Sons of Texas," as they call their society, are bellowing with rage over Miss Stafford's new record, "On the Alamo."
They claim Isham Jones who wrote "the blasted thing," doesn't even mention James Bowie or Davy Crockett. They claim, and this is what hurts, that Jones rhymes their revered Alamo with "to and fro" and "I love you so."
Now every loyal Texan, says Society President William Brad-

en, knows 'tain't fitten' to sing love talk about the heroes of the Alamo, which fell 113 years and four days ago to the Mexican, Santa Anna.
"They're using our sacred shrine for a commercial song," Braden rants. "It was bad enough when the danged thing came out in 1921. But they didn't have juke boxes then."
"Nowadays, it's all I hear. I declare it's an insult."
He says it makes the Alamo sound like a lover's lane, instead of the most famous fort in all Texas history.

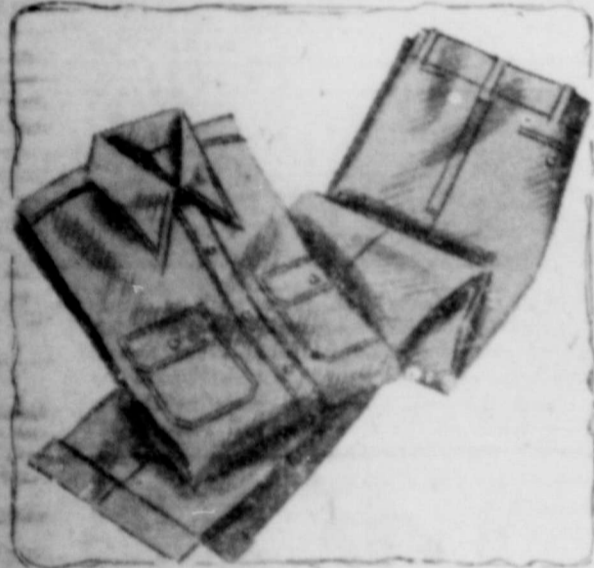

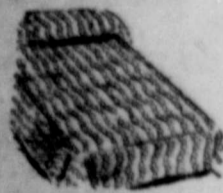

Would Transfer RFC To Treasury

(UP) — The Hoover Commission proposed today that three major lending and guarantee agencies, including the RFC, be transferred to the treasury department as part of a general reorganization along functional lines.
At the same time, it urged

that Congress take away from treasury three non-fiscal functions — the Coast Guard, the Bureau of Federal Supply, and the Bureau of Narcotics — and place them in other departments where they could function more effectively.

The agencies which would be brought under treasury would be the Reconstruction Finance Corp., the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., and the Export-Import Bank.
