## Pact Hailed As Insurance Against Red Aggression

### RUSSIA CLAIMS TREATY MEANS WAR AGAINST THE SOVIET UNION

LONDON, March 19.—(UP)—Russia declared today that the Atlantic Pact means "war on the Soviet Union" but British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin hailed it as the west's means of escape from destruction by the Kremlin. All other nations of Western Europe, fearful of the Soviet menace, hailed article five as a provision of the pact which has placed them at long last under military protection equal to that of Russia and her satellites. Article five states that "the parties agree that an armed attack against one or more of them in Europe or North Africa shall be considered an attack against them all." "This pact means war on the Soviet Union," said Radio Moscow in an English language commentary, the first Russian reaction to be heard in the west. In the broadcast, however, Moscow avoided giving details of the North Atlantic treaty. In addition to denouncing the pact in familiar ideological language, Moscow

### RUSSIA TOLD TO WATCH HER STEP WITH WESTERN POWERS

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(UP)—The State Department today cautioned Russia against misjudging the determination and ability of the western powers "to take united action" against any attack. "The document sought to dispel 'serious misconceptions' prevalent in the minds of leaders of the Soviet Union" about the overall power and democratic ideals of western civilization. In effect, it cautioned Russia against repeating Hitler's mistake in underestimating the democracies. The white paper implied that the present "precarious world security situation" is similar to that of the late 1930s. And it made clear its belief that Nazi Germany's aims of world conquest are shared by Russia.

## Mystery Train May Outdo Streamliners

BERWICK, Pa. March 19, (UP) —The American car and foundry company refused today to divulge further details of its "streamlined caterpillar train" which may revolutionize the modern streamliner.

The secret of the speedy, 16-car train got out yesterday when it struck a car at a grade crossing. Powered by a 1,000 horsepower diesel locomotive, it had aroused the curiosity of residents along a 20-mile stretch of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad as it flashed by on trial runs. ### Strike Hits Hard Coal Supplies

PITTSBURGH, March 19 (UP)—The week-old holiday of John L. Lewis' coal miners hit anthracite consumers in eastern Pennsylvania today where home heating supplies dwindled in a late winter cold snap.

Bureau of health officials and the American Red Cross in Wilkes-Barre directed that the remaining supply of hard coal be sold only to purchasers with doctor's certificates.

Except for one small steel producer, Western Pennsylvania Mills continued full production schedules, drawing from "ample" soft coal stockpiles on hand when the 463,000 miners quit Monday for their two-week memorial layoff.

The one curtailment announcement came from the Sharon Steel Corp., which said that coke shortages would compel it to close one blast furnace and four open hearths, probably by next Wednesday. Some 200 to 300 men will be affected, but the company said work schedules will be staggered to avoid unemployment for the steel workers.

#### Gravediggers Gets Check From Church

NEW YORK, March 19 (UP)—All 250 gravediggers who recently struck at two Catholic cemeteries received \$65 checks today from Cardinal Spellman who led seminary students across their picket lines to dig graves.

The checks, equivalent to a little more than a week's pay under terms of the settlement, were accompanied in the mail by a personal note from the Cardinal.

"The period of unemployment has caused you and your families many hardships," the Cardinal wrote. "I am therefore enclosing a gift check of \$65 to help in relieving this situation. Praying God's blessing upon you this Easter and always, I am devotedly yours in Christ."

### Strike In Hands Of Government

ST. LOUIS, March 19 (UP)—Settlement of a strike that has shut down the Wabash Railroad is "entirely in the hands of the government," Wabash President Arthur K. Atkinson said today.

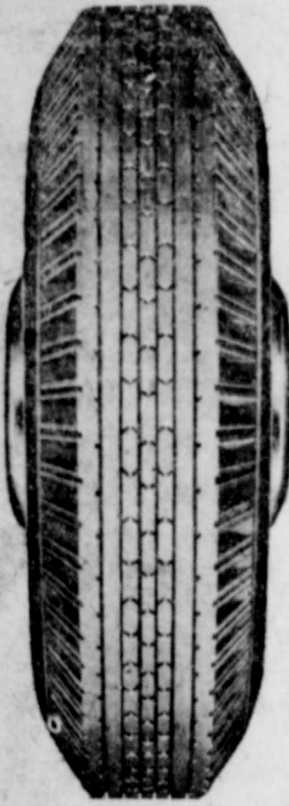

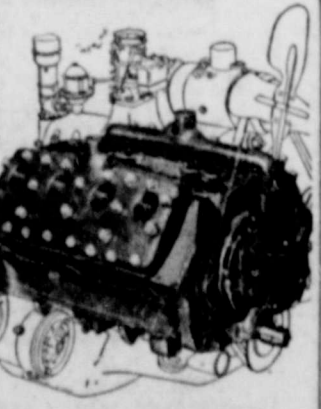

Excess strip shown as State of Texas, no abstract number found, or so much of such territory as the Legislature finds will be benefited by the improvements to be made by the district.

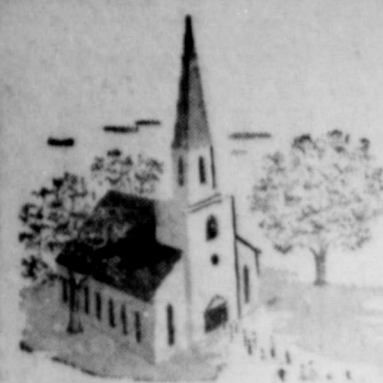

## ★ WEEKLY BIBLE COMMENT

### Jesus Gave Apostles Thorough Schooling

BY WILLIAM E. GILROY, D. D.

JESUS was a great Teacher, though He conducted no school in the ordinary sense of that word. A famous adage described the ideal college as a log with Mark Hopkins, eminent college president, at one end and a student at the other. That conception would be very inadequate in our day of great scientific laboratories and observatories, equipped with expensive equipment. But it stressed a necessary quality of all true education, no matter on what a scale, or how complicated it becomes. That is the fact that knowledge must become personalized.

The school of Jesus had that basic quality. It was mostly a school in the out-of-doors, a school of companionship and personal contacts, a school in which the Teacher taught by constant example and in which He encouraged every success in emulating that example. It was a school, too, in which the Teacher had infinite patience, as every true teacher must have.

BUT it was a school of strict discipline and high standards as well. Poor pupils, even in a good school, may be content just to pass or "get by," but Jesus had called His disciples for high purposes. They needed training. The late Dr. A. B. Bruce, an eminent Scottish churchman, wrote a book on what he called "The Training of the Twelve."

WANT to stretch your meat? Here's an answer:

## Braised Hamburger Stew (Serves 3)

One-half pound ground beef, 1/2 cup bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons milk or catsup, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1/2 teaspoon onion and celery salt, 2 medium potatoes, cut in quarters, 4 medium carrots, sliced or whole, 3 slices Bermuda-type onion, 1 cup bouillon.

Mix meat, bread crumbs, milk or catsup and seasonings. Shape into 3 patties. Brown patties on both sides. Place slice onion on top of each patty. Arrange carrots and potatoes around patties. Cover with bouillon. Cover and simmer 45 to 50 minutes or until vegetables are done. Place meat and vegetables on platter. Thicken gravy with flour and pour over meat.

## Savory Lamb Stew

Two tablespoons fat, 2 pounds lamb stew meat, 1 medium onion, sliced, 4 medium potatoes, boiling water to cover, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 1 teaspoon marjoram, 1/2 teaspoon celery salt, 1 bay leaf, 6 carrots, 1 cup peas. Brown lamb and onion in fat.

## MONDAY'S MENU

**BREAKFAST:** Blended tomato and grapefruit juice, griddle cakes, butter or fortified margarine, fried toadina slices or crisp bacon, syrup or jam, coffee, milk.  
**LUNCHEON:** Cream of potato soup, crackers, ham and lettuce sandwiches on rye bread, cheddar cheese, fruit bowl, cookies, tea, milk.  
**DINNER:** Tomato, beef curry (made with leftover pot roast) or braised hamburger stew with vegetables, poppy seed rolls, butter or fortified margarine, celery, green pepper, grated raw carrot and radish salad, coconut custard pie, coffee, milk.

Add water and seasonings. Cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours. Add quartered potatoes and halved carrots. Simmer 20 minutes. Add peas and simmer 10 minutes longer. Gravy may be thickened with flour if desired.

## Lamb Pot Pie

Place stew in greased baking dish. Top with baking powder biscuit dough seasoned with 1/2 teaspoon curry powder to 2 cups flour mixture. Bake 15 to 20 minutes in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.).

## Lord Slayer Held Without Bond

CLEBURNE, Tex., March 19—(UP)—Young Arthur Clayton Hester was held without bond today after re-enacting for authorities the fight in which he fatally beat Dr. John W. Lord, 70, noted educator who was his legal guardian and benefactor.

Sheriff Houston Walling returned yesterday with him from Los Angeles, where the 19-year-old boy was arrested a week ago for the murder of Lord, dean of the Texas Christian University

graduate school.

Walling took Hester at once to nearby Burleson, where Hester and Lord had lived in a lonely farm house for approximately a month prior to the murder.

Without emotion, Hester re-enacted for Walling his fight with Lord. Then, unhesitatingly, he led the sheriff to a weed patch and pointed to a 24-inch steel rod, about a half-inch in diameter.

"Is that what you hit him with?" asked Walling.

"That's it," said Hester.

A few strands of gray hair were held fast on the rod by clots of blood.

Later, Hester penned his name to a four-page statement in which he admitted slaying the 70-year-old educator. A Johnson county grand jury was expected to be summoned March 28 to investigate the case.

improve our local conditions would end because money and materials would not be available. For example, we all know that we need an improved water system. Without such a system we face hardships for the people we already have and the possibility of taking care of the demands for water for new people and new industries is nonexistent. I do not know what can be done in that regard. But I assure you that if I am elected I will devote much time and personal funds, if necessary, to find out what can be done and how to do it. Any program of that type requires more than the desire to have it. It requires study and information. It requires leadership by someone willing to contact experts in law and engineering and other communities with similar experience. Such information and work cannot be obtained by our leaders simply meeting for a few hours one night each week and then dismissing the problem until the following week. 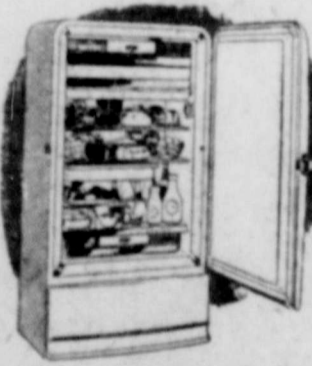
