Mrs. P. M. Kuykendall of Ranger, active Red Cross worker, on hearing of the storm immediately reported it to Matthews and also gave the first report of the storm to the St. Louis office of the Red Cross. In the first hours after the storm, she made numerous calls to Gorman for people in Ranger who had relatives in the stricken

area. Dr. Kuykendall notified the Gorman hospital that all available facilities at the West Texas Hospital in Ranger were at the disposal of the stricken people and that if necessary nurses would be sent from the Ranger hospital to the area. He also offered his services. It was stated Saturday that the hospital at Gorman had been able to handle the situation without outside aid.

Earl Conner, chairman for the current Red Cross drive in Eastland County, Saturday reported that the Red Cross is spending over \$10,000 in relief at Desdemona alone and pointed out that Eastland county's quota for this drive is only \$6,000.

The work that the Red Cross is doing for our stricken neighbors right here in our own county, should be an incentive for more generous giving on the part of the county people," Conner said. He urged that the various communities speed their efforts in the drive.

**SERVICES FOR EX-GOVERNOR
STERLING IN HOUSTON SUNDAY**

HOUSTON, Tex., March 26 (UP) — Former Tex. Gov. Ross Shaw Sterling who led the state through the darkest days of the depression, will be buried Sunday afternoon.

Sterling died yesterday in a Fort Worth Hospital where he had been under treatment since last September. He was 74.

The George H. Lewis & Son Funeral Home said a time for the rites Sunday had not been set, but that the body would arrive by train from Fort Worth this afternoon.

Though Sterling's "horatio-alger-like rags-to-riches" rise to fame was a colorful one, the most action-packed years of his life came during the early 1930's when he reached his political zenith as governor of Texas.

He left the state highway commission in 1930 to walk into the governor's mansion at Austin after defeating another equally colorful political figure, Mrs. Miriam A. (Ma) Ferguson in a bitter race.

Three years later he had lost his governorship to Mrs. Ferguson as well as the fortune he had accumulated.

Sterling's death was attributed to diabetic complications of a heart ailment. His wife and three daughters were at his bedside when he died.

His condition became critical shortly after plans had been made to move him to his Houston home. Early this week he had been given nasal oxygen.

Sterling founded the Humble Oil Co., which became one of the biggest in the industry. In 1925 he sold his holdings for several million dollars.

He became a Houston civic leader and worked for improvements that eventually made the city's port one of the nation's leaders.

Sterling also built a railroad from Dayton to Goose Creek and bought a newspaper, the Houston Post Dispatch (now the Houston Post). His publishing venture ended during the depression.

As governor, Sterling was credited with "pulling Texas out of the mud" with his road-building program.

He resented wastage of oil so keenly that he dispatched troops into four counties to enforce his conservation law.

This proved a turning point, as the courts finally ruled he had exceeded his authority in declaring martial law.

Sterling contested Mrs. Ferguson's election and later refused to ride with her in the 1933 inauguration parade, leaving his office an hour before the ceremonies.

Survivors include his widow, a son, Norman; and three daughters, Norma, Ruth and Mildred. Norma married Celo Miller of Corsicana, Ruth married Winston Wheeler of Wichita, Kans., and Mildred was to wed Wyatt Hedrick of Fort Worth.

Another son, Ross Shaw Sterling, Jr., died at the age of 17.

Gov. Beauford Jester said "Texas must remain grateful to Ross Sterling because of his leadership in the establishment of the modern plan of highway department operation . . ."

Texas, Oklahoma Lashed by Storms

DALLAS, Tex., March 26 (UP) — Tornadoes and savage winds whipped through Oklahoma and Texas today, leaving at least two dead and 48 reported injured.

Twisters struck at Crowder, Okla., and Springtown, Tex., in

the pre-dawn hours. One person was killed and 25 reported injured in Oklahoma and another four were injured at Springtown.

Winds gauged at 75 miles an hour and a tornado at Desdemona, Tex., late yesterday had taken one life and injured 19 persons in nine nearby communities. Albert Allen Avery, 36, died at El Paso when he fell from a roof he was working on in high wind.

The Oklahoma highway patrol reported that Mrs. Jane Colburn, 45, of Crowder died in a McAlester Hospital, where 25 other persons had been taken by a fleet of ambulances dispatched to the small community after the storm struck around 4 A. M. Four of the injured were reported

in critical condition. First reports said three persons were dead at Crowder and nearby Canadian, but the patrol reported later that there was no definite information. Telephone lines were down and the only contact was through the highway patrol radio from McAlester to Oklahoma City.

Babich May Take Lie Detector Test
MILWAUKEE, March 26 (UP)—Milton Babich, 19, will be asked to take a lie detector test today in connection with the murder of his wife's sister, beautiful Patricia Birmingham, 16-year-old high school girl.

Capt. Aloph Kraemer, chief of detectives, said he had "no doubt" Babich would agree to the test. Kraemer said Babich had made an important alteration in his story concerning his whereabouts and activities on Feb. 10 the day Patricia disappeared while walking home from school. She was found last Sunday in the Milwaukee river. She had been shot to death.

During questioning that lasted until past midnight, Babich admitted that he saw Patricia walk past him as he sat in his car near her home. But he said he did not speak to her. Previously, he had denied seeing the girl on the day she disappeared.

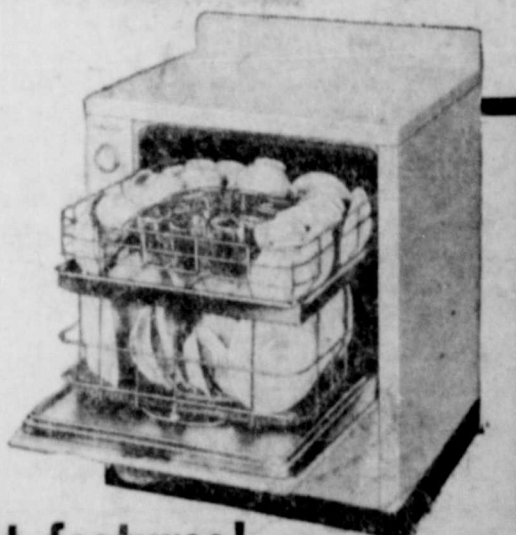

when their home in Desdemona was wiped out by the storm. Mrs. Roy Watson of Desdemona found a purse belonging to Mrs. Joiner and returned it with better than \$100 in it to the owner.

Besides the many homes that were crumpled by the twister, severe damage was suffered by the Magnolia plant at Desdemona and all operations at the plant were halted. The Radco plant which was not in operation was also badly damaged.

In downtown Desdemona a blacksmith shop owned by Albert Clark had the roof blown off pinning Clark beneath the wreckage and breaking his leg. He is in the Gorman hospital. The storm skipped over the remainder of the business district and then struck again in the northeast section of town.

Homes that were struck were literally splintered, with debris from them scattered over a wide area. Families searched in the wreckage for anything that remained of that was whole, but very little was retrieved.

The Clark family at Desdemona was hardest hit with six homes in the family reported destroyed. One of the Clark men stated that there was a water tank sitting in his front yard and where it came from and who owned it were still a mystery to him.

One bed mattress with springs was wrapped around a telephone pole and other mattresses were sprinkled over trees giving the appearance of spring blossoms. Unopened mail was picked up at the W. O. McCallum home in the destruction of which Mrs. Craig was injured. Mrs. Craig, said to be the mother of 11 children, was sitting with the two McCallum children while the parents were away. Mrs. Craig's children were in the school which was untouched.

Ernest Ott, employe of the Premier Oil Refining Company at Desdemona, stated that he had just lain down on the bed, when the storm struck. He has a vague recollection of floating around in the air after grabbing for a brand new hat that was lost in the shuffle. His first clear recollection was of holding onto a tree by the vacant lot where his home once stood.

The Texas Electric Service company suffered considerable damage to lines and equipment in the area and soon after the storm had a crew of 55 men working in the area.

Observers estimated that the storm covered an area about eight miles long and one quarter of a mile wide, in a hit-and-miss pattern. Some said that the storm looked like a giant whip lashing first one spot and then another.

large incorporated limits, it has been and must necessarily continue to be no small problem to bring sewer facilities to homes that are more or less isolated, for the reason that in some cases it is necessary to run a sewer extension for several blocks to reach a single home, which of course makes the cost to the City per connection very high, and it shall be my policy to work with the property owners in such cases and endeavor to make some solution that will not be prohibitive from the city standpoint, and at the same time enable outlying homes to have the advantages of the more densely populated sections, which as taxpayers, and residents residing inside the city limits they have every right to expect.

As stated in his statement above, Williams has been a resident of Ranger for many years. He has been a member of the First Baptist Church of Ranger for thirty years, having served as deacon for twenty-seven years, and served seven years as treasurer. 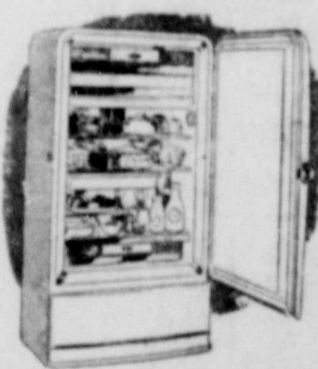
