Several other persons of national and international importance in the highway and construction fields will address the convention or participate in discussions.

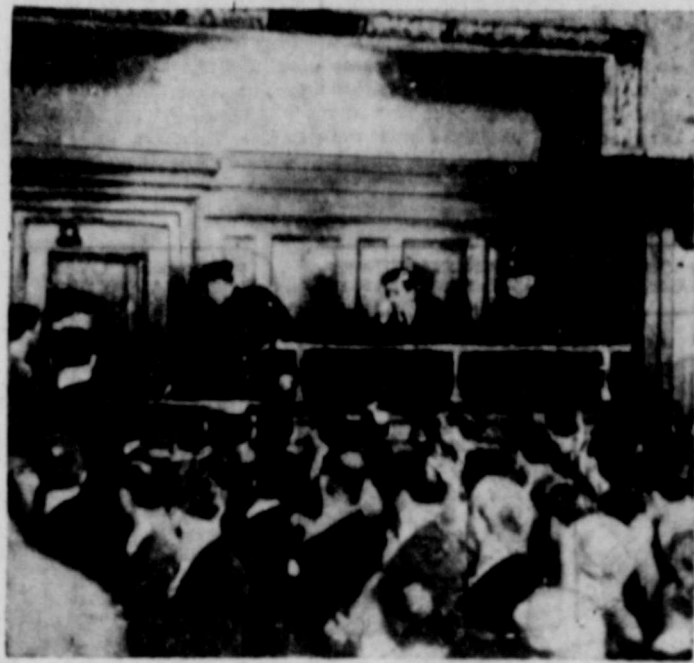

### FUNERAL SERVICES HELD SUNDAY FOR C. E. MAY

Last rites for C. E. May were conducted Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Methodist Church with Dr. Claude P. Jones of Cisco and the Rev. Cecil Ellis officiating. Interment was in Evergreen cemetery with Morris Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. The Ranger Masonic Lodge participated in the services at the cemetery.

Mr. May, for over 50 years a business man and civic leader in Ranger, died at his home Saturday, October 8, 1949. He was born in Desdemona October 21, 1879, the son of the late Dr. T. H. May and Mrs. May. He came to Ranger while still in school age and attended the Ranger schools.

He had been very closely associated with the development of Ranger and was one of the 15 men who drew up the original charter for the city of Ranger. He was prominent in Masonic circles, Democratic party activities in the county, and was a Rotarian with a 28-year perfect attendance record up to the time of his illness. He had been in the banking and drug business and at the time of his death was in the insurance and real estate business. He was secretary-treasurer of the Federal Savings and Loan Association, an active member of the Chamber of Commerce and had been closely associated with Boy Scout work in Ranger.

In 1911 he was married to Victoria Harrison in Ranger and she with a son, C. E. May Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. James Hay of Dal-

las, survive him. A brother, H. L. May of Westbrook and a sister, Mrs. Iola Farrell of Whit, also survive.

Palbearers were E. E. Crawford, J. E. Matthews, Willard Swaney, Dr. Ross Hodges, F. P. Brasher Sr., B. A. Tunnell, E. H. Mills and Dr. G. C. Boswell.

His friends were named honorary palbearers by his family.

### County Youth Heifer Program Is Organized

The Administrative Committee for the Eastland County Youth Dairy Program was organized in a meeting held at the office of the Chamber of Commerce in Eastland with the following officers being elected:

T. B. Lamb of Eastland chairman.

T. D. Wheat of Eastland, vice-chairman.

J. D. Lauderdale of Cisco, secretary-treasurer.

The committee is composed of business men from the various towns in the county, as follows: Geo. L. Lane, T. B. Lamb and T. D. Wheat of Eastland; J. D. Lauderdale, G. C. Rosenthal and S. H. Nance, of Cisco; J. W. Elder and P. T. Smith of Ranger and C. R. Tyler and Jack McCarty of Rising Star.

The purpose of this committee is to obtain sponsors for high-bred Jersey heifers, and placing these calves in the hands of responsible farm boys who will be required to raise the animals and breed them according to the rules and regulations laid down by the committee. Each boy receiving one of these calves will be required to turn back the first heifer calf born to his animal to the committee for presentation to another boy.

The first requirement on the boy receiving one of these calves is that he be enrolled in an FFA of 4-H Club in Eastland county. Boys interested in securing a calf in this program, can secure application blanks and further information from the county agents or their vocational agriculture teacher.

The committee will meet again on Oct. 19, at Eastland at which time further plans will be made for carrying on the program.

### Police Prevent Suicide Attempt

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 10 (UP)—Police used encircling tactics Sunday night to prevent a 59-year-old housewife from jumping from a bridge into swollen Buffalo Bayou.

Radio Patrolman J. B. Elkins said he found the woman sitting on the bridge railing. He pleaded with her to come down, but she threatened to leap if he came near.

While Patrolman Elkins talked with her, members of the Harris county emergency corps slipped from the other side and dragged her from the bridge.

The woman said calmly that she wanted to die. She was released to the care of her husband and two sisters.

### Scripps-Howard Top Editor Dies

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (UP)—George B. Parker, 63, editor-in-chief of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, died today at an emergency hospital.

Parker was stricken last Wednesday.

Death resulted from an internal hemorrhage.

Parker's son, George B. Jr., and his daughter, Mary, were at the bedside when death came.

Parker, a newspaper man for 40 years, was a famed editorial writer. In 1936 he was awarded a Pulitzer prize for distinguished editorial writing.

Most of his career as a newspaper man was with the Scripps-Howard organization in Oklahoma City, Houston, Tex., Cleveland, New York and Washington.

In 1924, Parker was named general editor executive of the Scripps-Howard newspaper.

He had served as editor-in-chief of all Scripps-Howard newspapers since 1927.

Mrs. Parker died last June.

The governor was scheduled to spend the night at Abilene, where tomorrow morning he will be honored at a breakfast, address students at Abilene Christian College and inspect the Abilene State Hospital.

He will return to Austin early in the afternoon.

### BODIES FOUND BY NEIGHBORS

FORT WORTH, Tex., Oct. 10 (UP)—Four members of one family were found shot to death in their beds today.

Police identified the dead as Mrs. Elizabeth Finch, 33; Mrs. Finch's son and daughter, Penny, 8, and Allen, 6, and Mrs. Finch's mother.

The bodies were discovered by a neighbor who stopped at the home to take the Finch children to school.

Mrs. Finch and her daughter were in the same bed in a front bedroom, authorities said, and the boy was in another bedroom. The grandmother was in bed in her bedroom.

Neighbors said Mrs. Finch and her husband, Richard G. Finch, had been separated all summer. A suit for divorce was filed by Mrs. Finch Sept. 16 in 96th District Court.

The divorce petition said the couple was married Dec. 8, 1935, and lived together until June 12, 1949.

Police said that all of the victims had been shot through the head with a .22-caliber weapon.

Mrs. Finch's mother was identified as Mrs. Edith Walker, who came here about two months ago from Palm Beach, Fla., because of a heart ailment.

Neighbors said Finch, a chinchilla breeder, formerly was a pilot for American Airlines, but had been on sick leave recently. During World War II, he served as a colonel with the armed forces in India, they said.

## FOUR KILLED, MANY HURT IN ROCK ISLAND WRECK

MEADE, Kan., Oct. 10 (UP)—A speeding Rock Island passenger train plunged through a washed-out roadbed three miles east of here early today, killing at least four persons and injuring an estimated 75.

Mayor Ted Gardner of nearby Fowler, said four bodies were recovered from the tangle of seven cars of the eastbound Rock Island Imperial, which was en route from Los Angeles to Chicago.

Fowler, a tiny community of 750 population, immediately threw open its school buildings as an emergency receiving ward for the injured.

"I believe about 75 persons required medical treatment," Gardner told the United Press. "Several of the injured persons were in critical condition."

Capt. Tom Glascock of the Kansas Highway Patrol told the United Press that the cars and

the rear unit of a two-unit diesel engine "just piled into that big hole."

Glascock said ambulances rushed to the scene from Dodge City, Meade, and Liberal, Kan., and from Oklahoma, some 20 miles to the south.

The injured were removed by volunteers in a scene which Mayor Gardner described as a "madhouse" of people who were "running around in their night clothes screaming."

The accident occurred about 1:30 A. M., Glascock said.

R. E. Johnson, assistant general manager of the Rock Island, said in Kansas City the train was carrying approximately 130 passengers.

Gardner said a fireman from the train crew walked most of the way to Fowler to seek aid. A volunteer crew of some 60 persons rushed immediately to the scene of the wreck.

The train plunged through the rails about 75 miles from U. S. highway 54 which the railroad parallels, Glascock said.

The wreck occurred in level country, but last night's sudden storm and deluge turned the area into a string of shallow lakes. It was the rain which undermined the roadbed and weakened it.

At places in the vicinity of the wreck, Glascock said, "water washed over the highway in waves eight to ten inches high."

The forward section of the big diesel locomotive rested near the highway, Glascock said. The other

cars were "in the hole," at least three of them badly twisted.

Gardner took time from rescue work to say that besides those rescued first, "others were begging for us to help them. Our volunteer workers used their car lights, flashlights and lanterns to light the ghastly spectacle."

Gardner said the rescue workers labored as "feverishly" as possible.

The small Epworth Hospital at Liberal, Kan., 40 miles southwest of Meade, reported it had received 14 persons from the wreck "and we believe more are on the way."

Mrs. Larry Ling, Seward County nurse, said she feared "several of our patients are in critical condition."

Mrs. Ling said Epworth did not have room for the emergency patients, "but we're making room in a hurry."

She said the Red Cross was flying nurses and plasma to Liberal from Wichita, Kan.

Mrs. Ling confirmed that other

injured were being cared for at Fowler, Garden City, and Bucklin, Kan.

CAPE GIRADEAU, Mo., Oct. 10 (UP)—An ol' hound dog nursed a scratched nose today, the only casualty of a dunking contest between 72 dogs and four raccoons which was violently protested by the St. Louis Humane Society.

The coons came out the undisputed winners. And none of them were hurt either.

They were placed one at a time on a log 30 feet from shore. Then the dogs were released singly to swim to the log and given two minutes to dunk the coon. Only two dogs were able to jerk them into the water.

Al Sander, president of the Coffee Drinkers and Friendship Club of Cape Girardeau, sponsors

of the event, said the \$1,200 collected in admission would be used for charity. About 2,500 spectators watched the event.

The Humane Society denounced the spectacle and even appealed to Gov. Forrest Smith to stop it. But the governor, an old Missourian, did not intervene.

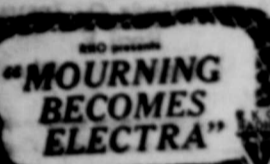

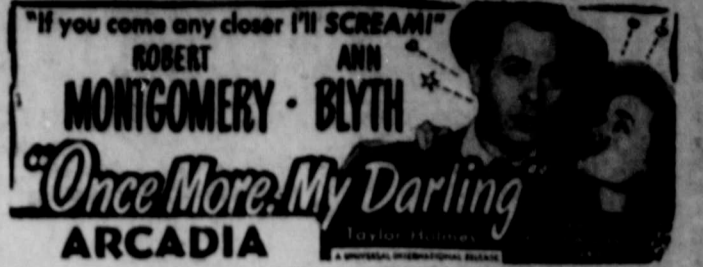

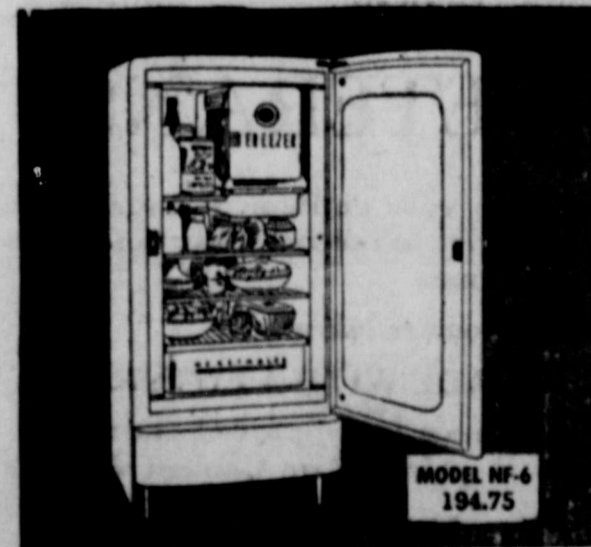
