
# County Backs Cartwright, McLain, Eggers, Yarborough, Joy; Defeats All Propositions

To name a few, the first planting of milo is already leafing out, you can see cotton from one end of the row to the other in a few fields, sugar beets are growing, also carrots, onions, etc. This has been a fine spring for early planting, and everything indicates a fine crop year. And please bear in mind that I am better known as a crop forecaster than I am a political predictor. Senator Kennedy collected a few more votes than did either of the other two candidates in the Indiana preferential primary. According to some observers this places Senator Kennedy, without a doubt, in the White House. I am inclined to agree with President Truman when he declared that presidential preferential primaries don't mean a thing. Of course he used a little stronger language when expressing his views than we deem advisable to use in this column. I am sure, however that the ex-president will support Vice-President Humphrey in his race for the presidency.


### **Migrant Health Project Receives** Grant of \$46,520

Breeding disease resistant into tomatoes is no overnight job, Dr. A. L. Harrison of the Plant Disease Experiment Station in Yoakum says. The Yoakum facility is a unit of the Texas Agricu'tural Experiment Station.

"NEMATEX," the nematode resistant variety of tomato, took more than 20 years to develop and release, according to Dr. Harrison, a plant pathologist.

Basically the same procedure is used in breeding disease resistance into any tomato. It is first necessary to find a source of resistance. Fortunately, the tomato has many wild counterparts which are resistant to certain diseases. In the case of "Nematex," a horticultural type tomato was crossed with a wild tomato that did not resemble the horticultural type, but had resistance to nematode root knot. The cross resulting from the horticultural and wild types was analyzed and screened for the resistance passed on from the parents.

A valid passport will admit the purchaser, any number of times, to all designated federal recreation areas collecting entrance or admission fees. It will also admit all those who accompany the purchaser in a private, non-commercial vehicle to designated federal recreation areas where entrance fees are usually charged. Vacationers planning to visit a specific site need not necessarily buy the \$7 passport. Most sites have a daily 50-cent per person admission fee or a \$1 daily carload permit. Also available is the \$3 to \$5 permit, valid for a specified time not to exceed nonths. However, the \$1 daily permit and the \$3 to \$5 permit are good only at the area for which they were purchased.


