Truman Ask Excise Cuts, More New Taxes

SUGGESTIONS MADE IN SPECIAL TAX MESSAGE TO CONGRESS TODAY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (UP)—President Truman today called for some excise tax reductions, coupled with higher levies on corporations, gifts and estates to give the government a net increase of \$1,000,000,000 in revenue. Mr. Truman in a special tax message to Congress proposed no changes in individual income taxes. He recommended a selective reduction in excises—only to the extent that the loss in revenue can be made up by closing what he called "loopholes" in other tax laws. He said the corporation, gift and estate tax increase, the exact amount of which he left to congress, should raise the overall government revenue by about \$1,000,000,000 a year. The president once more criticized the 80th Congress for what he called "short-sighted tax reduction" on individuals as well as some other cuts. Mr. Truman said "drastic increases in tax rates . . . might prove to be self-defeating." But, he said, he was recommending adjustments "to dice present inequities, to stimulate business activity and to yield about \$1,000,000,000 in net additional revenue."

Prominent Waco Resident Dies

WACO, Tex., Jan. 23 (UP)—The career of one of Waco's prominent citizens was at an end today. Allan D. Sanford, former mayor of Waco and the city's oldest practicing lawyer, died in a hospital yesterday after a short illness. He was 80. Sanford settled in Corsicana in 1890, after moving to Texas from his native Covington, Tenn. Three years later he was graduated from the University of Texas. He moved to Waco in 1895 and remained here until his death. He was a onetime president of the Texas State Bar Association. Waco's first street paving was done during Sanford's term as mayor in 1904. Sanford was known as Waco's foremost historian. He was a co-author of a history of the city and contributed considerable material to the Waco Tribune-Herald's centennial issue last Oct. 30.

Urges Press To Aid World's Return To God

VATICAN CITY, Jan. 23 (UP)—Pope Pius told 15 American newspaper editors and publishers today that the press could play a responsible part in the "great return of the world to God through Christ." The Pope received the executives and two officials of the European cooperative administration in private audience. He spoke with them in English. "This year," he said, "we fondly hope and pray, will mark a great return of the world to God through Christ, and this return, if accomplished, is going to be along the path of truth. "Can you advance this noble enterprise? Assuredly yes because truth needs a voice. And the most potent voice reaching the general public today is still that of the press. "Who does not know that a journalist can deliberately falsify facts, or by lifting them out of their context can distort their true meaning, or can suppress truth that in justice clamors to be heard? "And the net result is that the masses are misled, human tragedy is incurred, and civil strife and even wars are engendered, simply because an unworthy member of your profession for one reason or another has been recreant to his grave responsibilities to truth." The responsibilities of the press the Pontiff said, have never been "more exacting than today, when communication has become so easy and far reaching, and the ordinary citizen is being felt more and more in the governments and nations."

Big Three To Start New Talks

LONDON, Jan. 23 (UP)—America Britain and Belgium will begin talks in Washington Jan. 30 on matters of mutual interest in connection with atomic energy, the foreign office announced today. The talks were expected to center around uranium production in the Belgian Congo, now earmarked entirely for the United States. A foreign office spokesman declined to discuss the possibility that Britain was asking for a share of the congo production. Belief that the talks would revolve around the congo uranium was strengthened by the fact that Canada will not take part in the talks. The spokesman would not say on whose initiative the talks were scheduled. He said they would be held on the "ambassadorial level."

Miners Defy Lewis' Back To Work Order

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 23 (UP)—Embittered rebel miners defied John L. Lewis back-to-work order today and sent pickets into the coal fields to idle thousands of United Mine Workers. Protesting the UMW's three-day work week the strikers continued their two-week "no contract, no work" drive for a showdown. Resistance to Lewis' work edict centered in Western Pennsylvania, Northern West Virginia and Ohio. At Jones and Laughlin's Vesta No. 5 mine in Washington County, Pennsylvania, 1,500 miners entered the pit. Moving pickets moved in and shut down the tipple. The mine closed. Pickets also were active in the Riverside, W. Va., area, closing three mines. At other mines in Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio the angry miners refused to report. "It looks pretty tough," a spokesman for the Western Pennsylvania Coal Operators Association said. "It looks like there'll be more striking than there will be working in our area today." There are 50,000 miners in the district. Observers regarded the strikes, which had idled 90,000 last week, as a protest against the UMW's three-day week policy, rather than against Lewis. However, Lewis' lieutenants fought hard to break up the walkouts. They told miners' meetings during the week end that Lewis wanted them to work. But the rebels refused, declaring the time had come for a showdown in the eight-month battle for a 95-cent-a-day wage boost and a 15-cent-a-ton increase in the 20-cent welfare fund royalty.

Three Killed, One Injured In Plane Crash

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 23 (UP)—Three fliers were killed and another was severely burned yesterday in an airplane collision apparently caused by a mix-up in landing procedure. Dead were Charles Louis Farley, 30, of Salem, Va., L. W. Hodges of Roanoke, Va., and Fred W. Reese, Miami. George Lohr, 25 year old Navy veteran from Miami, was burned about the legs when he tried to pull the three men from the burning wreckage. He was thrown clear in the collision. Witnesses said the plane being flown by Hodges was following the standard Civil Aeronautics procedure of approaching to land in a left turn pattern. Hodges seemed unaware of the sunny south air port practice of landing from the right to keep from "buzzing" nearby homes, they said. Reese's plane came in from the right, the wings hit and the planes fell "end over end" to earth, according to witness John B. Coffey.

One Dies, Four Injured In Crash

ROSENBERG, Tex., Jan. 23 (UP)—One person died and four others were hurt, one critically in a head-on automobile crash on the Brenham highway near here last night. Mrs. Susie McNeil, 62, of Alvin, died in a hospital shortly after the collision. Her husband, Acie Clyde McNeil, 67, was reported in "very critical" condition from internal injuries. The accident occurred on Highway 36, one mile west of here. The car driven by McNeil met head on with one driven by Eddie Garner, 42 year old negro. Garner, his wife, Myrtle, 38, and their year old son, Charles Eddie, suffered less serious injuries. All of the injured were hospitalized in Fort Bend county hospital here. Mrs. McNeil's body was at a local funeral home, pending completion of arrangements.

SPEED PILOT SETS RECORD

NEW YORK, Jan. 23 (UP)—Speed Pilot Mantz claimed a new cross-country flight record for propeller-driven aircraft today after spanning the 2,650 miles in less than five hours. His converted Mustang fighter plane, averaging better than 500 miles an hour at about 30,000 feet flashed across the continent from Burbank, Calif., to New York, in 4 hours, 52 minutes, 58 seconds. The dapper Hollywood stunt flier bettered the old mark by 7 minutes and 7 seconds. Pilot Joe Debona set the official mark of 5 hours and 5 seconds last March in the same type of plane. Mantz' time will remain unofficial until the National Aeronautical Association, whose representatives clocked the take-off and arrival, enter it in the records. Mantz took off at the Lockheed Terminal at Burbank at 10:13:19. (EST). He buzzed the control tower at Laguardia Field at 3:06:17 P. M. (EST), according to the official NAA timer. Mantz, winner of three Bendix trophy races, climbed into his red-nosed F-51 fighter declaring "I'm just going to get to New York as fast as I can." A 91-mile per hour tailwind pushed him up to 580-miles-an-hour between Omaha and Chicago his best burst of speed for the trip, Mantz said. He said he rode mostly clouds at the 30,000-foot level, but clouds he encountered coming into New York delayed him possibly four minutes.

Car Used For Smuggling Seized

LAREDO, Tex., Jan. 23 (UP)—Laredo police today impounded a 1949 model automobile which had been used to smuggle counterfeit U. S. bills into Mexico. The automobile, which carried a Michigan license, was seized yesterday after police were informed that several men had been arrested in Nuevo Laredo, across the Rio Grande in Mexico, after authorities had seized \$400 in bogus bills from one. Two Laredo policemen found \$310 in counterfeit money in the upholstery of the driver's seat. They also reported finding four suitcases of new clothing and paraphernalia used for injecting narcotics. No narcotics were found, however.

Screen Star Alan Hale Dies

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 23 (UP)—Big, blustering, Alan Hale, whose screen career stretched from silent picture days to modern colored films, died last night of a virus infection at Hollywood Hospital.

He was 57. Dr. Victor Herman pronounced him dead at 8:10 P. M., of a liver ailment complicated by an infection and pneumonia. At his bedside were Hale's wife, Gretchen, a son, Alan Jr., and a daughter, Karen.

The six foot two inch actor contracted a cold during a recent trip to Montana for the premier of a picture in which he appeared. His condition became worse after he returned home, and he developed pneumonia. He died less than 24 hours after entering the hospital. Hale was in the movies for nearly 40 years, surviving periods of ups and downs and jumps into other professions.

He once turned to inventing to supplement his movie income when he was not working. His special prizes were a sliding theater seat to make it easier for late-comers to get into their seats, and a "greaseless potato chip" which did not prove successful.

At various times he turned his hand to writing, singing, acting and directing. He once did newspaper work, and he studied to become an osteopath before entering movies.

His real name was Alan McKahan. Hale was born Feb. 10, 1892 in Washington, D. C. His father, James McKahan, was a fairly well to do patent medicine manufacturer. He married Gretchen Hartman, his leading lady in early films at Biograph Studios, where he made one-reel movies for D. W. Griffith.

The awards were set up in 1948 by Irving Geist, New York business man and philanthropist in cooperation with the newspaper Guild of New York for editorial material appearing in New York City newspapers.

The judge said that Mrs. Roosevelt's column effectively revealed and contended against discrimination of all kinds, exemplifying the "American democracy spirit and temper at their best."

Testimony Begins In Smithwick Trial

BELTON, Tex., Jan. 23 (UP)—Testimony began today in the murder trial of Sam Smithwick, ex-deputy sheriff of Jim Wells County, charged with shooting to death his severe critic, W. H. (Bill) Mason.

A jury to hear the case in Judge Wesley Dice's District Court was completed Saturday night, after six tedious days of questioning veniremen.

Smithwick is accused of shooting to death newscaster Mason as he sat in his parked automobile at the outskirts of Alice last June 29.

The murder occurred one day after Mason had broadcast charges, in his regular nighttime news show over an Alice radio station, that Smithwick had an interest in a night club of bad reputation.
