Truman To Face Decision On Hydrogen Bomb

By GEORGE E. REEDY, JR. United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (UP)—President Truman today faced one of his greatest decisions—to build or not to build the hydrogen bomb.

A rash of statements from people associated with—but not directly connected to—the atomic energy program urged him to say yes. But the president made it clear that the fateful decision was his and his alone.

Sen. Styles Bridges, N. H., top-ranking Republican on the Senate armed services committee, said military officials were unanimously in favor of its production. He described it as a weapon so dreadful that "it might be the instrument for stopping all wars."

"Every responsible military official I have talked to feels very definitely that for our own self-preservation, the only thing we can do is make the decision, go ahead with it and go ahead without too much delay," Bridges said. "What that, I concur."

Thurs. far, no administration official has been used the phrase "hydrogen bomb"—a hydrogen-fueled "thermonuclear" atomic weapon many times as destructive as present plutonium a-bombs. But Sen. Brian McMahon, D., Conn., chairman of the congressional atomic energy committee, removed any doubts that it is being considered.

Following a closed meeting of his committee yesterday with atomic energy commissioners, McMahon faced a battery of reporters and said:

"We have been discussing plans for advances in the technological improvement of atomic weapons and I anticipate your questions by saying that this includes all types of weapons that can be...no, just leave it weapons, period."

In some quarters, McMahon's statement was interpreted as a board hint that three are plans underway already for building the hydrogen bomb. But a committee member who was present at the meeting said:

"I am positive that Sen. McMahon did not intend to go that far." Bridges, who is also top-ranking Republican on the senate appropriations committee, said the costs of the bomb would be "tremendous." They have been estimated at from \$100,000,000 (M) to \$2,000,000,000 (B).

FORT WORTH, Jan. 28 (UP)—A 31-year-old Wise County pipeline worker was crushed to death beneath the wheels of a bulldozer laden trailer truck last night near Watauga, a few miles north of the Fort Worth city limits.

State highway patrolmen said the victim, E. A. Cage, of Alvord, was thrown from his pickup truck into the path of the other vehicle when the two collided. Cage's death was the third traffic fatality of the year for Tarrant County.

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Two Killed In Gas Explosion

KERRVILLE, Tex., Jan. 28 (UP)—A butane gas explosion shattered a ranch house near Medina last night, killing two persons and injuring three others. One of the three—Mrs. Margaret Null, 35, Houston—was in critical condition at a hospital here today.

The dead were her son, Donnie, 6, and Mrs. E. W. Minear, about 40, who lived near Rosenberg. Sheriff Earl Garrett said the tremendous blast appeared to have occurred under the foundation of the Nulls' ranch home. "The only thing left standing was the chimney," Garrett said. The ranch house was 6 rooms of wood and stone construction.

Besides Mrs. Null, whose legs were mangled badly, the other injured were H. H. Null, 43, her husband, and their daughter, Carolyn, age 4. The girl was in serious condition. Null was not believed in danger.

Garrett said he believed a leaking connection under the foundation of the house caused accumulation of gas. The butane tank, setting a short distance away from the house, did not explode.

SOAK LAKE, Wash. (UP)—Something new in promoting good will has been started by the Soap Lake chamber of commerce. An unstamped letter shows up in the mail, the chamber pays the postage, plus a message stamped on the envelope telling the addressee that the stamp comes with the compliments of the chamber of commerce.

Airmen Search For Missing Transport Plane

WHITEHORSE, Y. T., Jan. 28 (UP)—Airmen of two nations flew over rugged mountains and Marshlands today, searching for a U. S. Air Force transport plane missing with 44 persons aboard.

Royal Canadian Air Force planes Canadian Air Force 400-mile stretch between here and Fort Nelson, B. C., and U. S. Air planes from Alaska were to join the search today.

Ground crews patrolled the Alaska highway.

The C-54 vanished on a flight from Anchorage, Alaska, to great Falls, Mont. In addition to military personnel on furlough, it carried a woman and a 3-1/2 year old boy.

Among the many reports flooding operations bases were those of ground signal flares sighted by a U. S. Air Force pilot and unconfirmed reports of an explosion and billows of smoke.

Almost 30 planes flew under the flickering Aurora Borealis last night but R. C. A. F. wing commander J. M. Sutherland said "nothing was seen resembling a downed plane."

The missing craft's last message said it had cleared the Lofly St. Elias mountain range and was headed southeast towards the 10,000 foot peaks of the northernmost Rocky Mountain range.

"If the plane crash-landed and all aboard are alive, no one should suffer from cold or hunger," an Air Force spokesman said. The plane carried 800 pounds of emergency rations and arctic survival gear.

The area where the plane disappeared has been the "ice-box" of western Canada for more than a month. Temperatures hung more than 30 degrees below zero.

The Watson Lake region lies near the border of British Columbia and the Yukon territory, 225 miles east of here. The area has 10,000-foot peaks rising in a saw-toothed row from heavily-timbered snow-packed terrain.

The plane, which was based at El Paso, Tex., was last reported seen over snag, Y. T. 200 miles northwest of Whitehorse. It was thought the plane might have followed the Alaskan highway.

The C-54 left Anchorage at 1:21 P. M. Thursday after picking up 34 passengers. Two other passengers boarded the plane earlier at Fairbanks. Eight crewmen were aboard the plane.

Death Of Sailor Investigated

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 28 (UP)—A Navy board of inquiry will convene Monday to investigate the death of a Dallas, Tex., sailor during a fight with a fellow seaman.

Authorities said seaman Paul D. Suprenant, 23, of Attleboro was being held as "defendant" in the death Thursday night of electrician's mate 2nd class Reginald R. Syverson Jr., 24.

The brawl occurred in a barracks at Fort Banks in nearby Winthrop where the two sailors were part of an eight-man team being quartered by the Army while repairing piers at Fort Dawes in Boston Harbor.

Suprenant, a Navy veteran of five years' service, was to have been discharged next week.

Two other sailors, Norman P. Dignard, 23, of Leominster and Robert F. Keating, 19, of Arlington, have been ordered held as witnesses to appear before the Navy board which will convene at South Boston Naval Base.

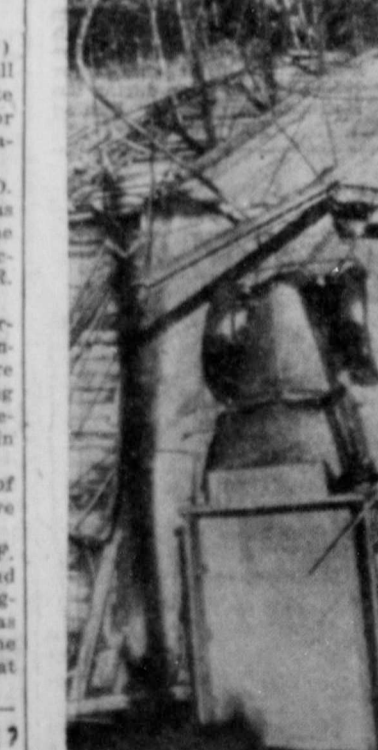
Dwight Greer, Commission member, said a decision could be made at the next commission meeting, date of which has not been set.

Moad Case Expected To Go To Jury Saturday Afternoon

The State rested at 10 o'clock Saturday morning in the trial of Mrs. Elva Moad, 37, in 91st District Court here on a charge of murdering her estranged husband, Emory — E. Moad on Sept. 4, 1949 in Cisco, without calling Rev. James W. McClain, rector of the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church of Eastland, to the stand.

Special Prosecutor Frank Sparks had earlier indicated he might possibly call Rev. McClain as a rebuttal witness. Rev. McClain said he would refuse to testify regarding an alleged conversation with Mrs. Moad, following the slaying of her husband, on the grounds of clergy immunity.

Warmer Weather Forecast Today

A mixture of fog, drizzle and warmer weather today replaced the cold front which gave Texas a taste of real winter temperatures for two days.

Fog covered the coastal area and extended southward from Dallas through Central Texas to Bryan. Early morning drizzle was reported at Galveston, Brownsville, Corpus Christi, Waco and Bryan. Lufkin had light rainfall.

Only one sub-freezing mercury reading was recorded in the state at 5:30 A. M. that was 31 degrees at Lubbock.

Elsewhere, lows included 33 at Mineral Wells, 34, Dallas, 37 at Amarillo and El Paso.

Thermometers were expected to rise gradually during the day, warmer weather being forecast for both west and east Texas.

Bridge Collapse

The 91st District, which has been packed for the last three days of the sensational trial, was even more jammed for the night session called by Judge Floyd Jones. Spectators spilled over the rail with at least three dozen crowding around the lawyers' tables and the judge's stand.

Many brought sack lunches. Others went without dinner so they wouldn't lose a place to sit after the judge called an evening recess at 4:30 p.m.

Mrs. Moad gave a year-by-year review of her married life in which she told of 35 different instances in which Moad abused her. It was not until 4 o'clock in the afternoon that she got around to details of the shooting.

She shot her estranged husband, she testified, because he had threatened to kill her. She declared the beating she received from Moad were "caused by him being over-sexed."

Moad was fatally wounded about 12:30 noon as he sat in his car in front of his estranged wife's residence.

The defendant said she was baking a cake when her phone rang about 12:20. She answered and it was Emory. She quoted him as saying:

"How's the old b—this morning? . . . You are still denying being out with Joe Lee Moore, aren't you?" Mrs. Moad said she was, that she had not been out with Moore. (State witnesses had testified they had seen her with Moore, a druggist, the night before.)

"I'm going to come up there and kill you," Moad said, the defendant testified. Then he cursed her, she said.

"I was scared to death," Mrs. Moad sobbed. "I got the gun and started to the police station. When I got to the corner I saw Emory coming . . . He stopped (his car) at the curb right in front of the sidewalk where I was walking. He said something about loving me ever since I was a little girl. Then he said, 'Are you going to tell me that you and that man were not in that car last night when Irene and Roy (Moad's brother and sister-in-law) saw you?'"

"Emory got mad and said, 'I'm going to get out of this car and kill you!'"

"He made an effort to get out

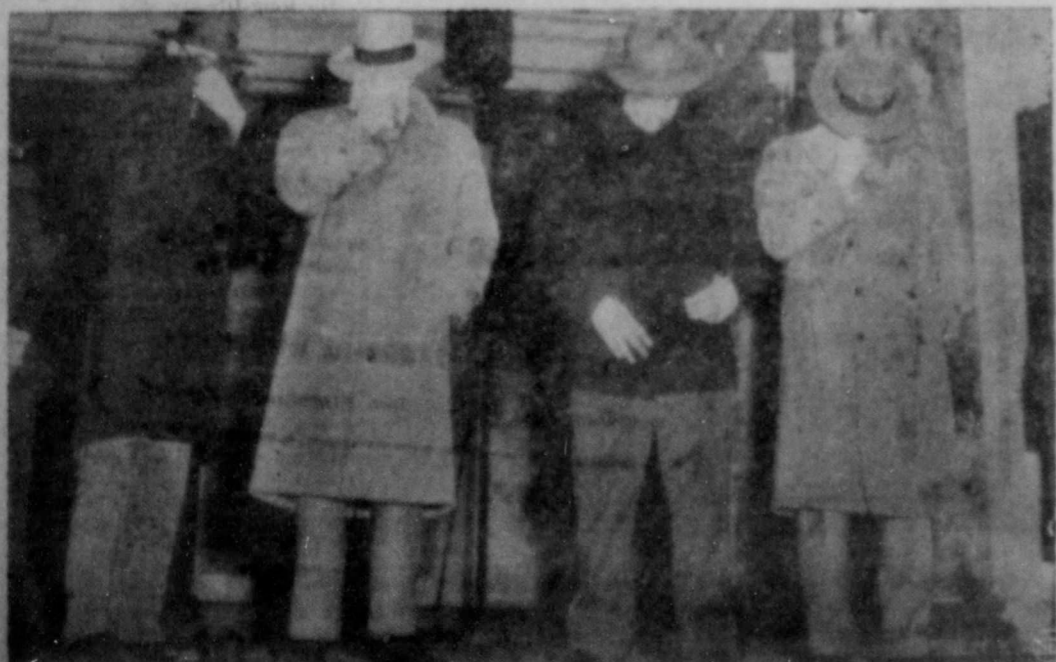

Road Projects Authorized Today

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 28 (UP)—Eleven road projects totaling \$493,780 were authorized for construction today by the State Highway Commission.
 They included:
BEXAR COUNTY—work of rip-rapping, sodding and improving drainage on U. S. 81 in Alamo Heights authorized at the estimated cost of \$9,000.
CAMERON COUNTY—pavement widening on U. S. 83 from Main Street east to South Parker Road in La Feria, estimated at \$7,100.
HARRIS COUNTY—posting of speed signs authorized on section of U. S. 59 north from Halls Bayou to just south of Greens Bayou, some 4.17 miles.
ELLIS COUNTY—base course and resurfacing on U. S. 77 on the abandoned sections of the Texas Electric Railway Company

roadbed from near the north city limit to near Main Street in Milford, estimated at \$50,500.
LUBBOCK COUNTY—appropriation of \$15,500 made to raise grade line across two wet-weather lakes on Farm Road 400.

LUBBOCK AND HALE COUNTIES—appropriation of \$22,580 made to cover widening, grading, base and asphaltic surfacing on U. S. 87 from south city limit to north city limit of Abernathy.

NACOGDOCHES AND SAN AUGUSTINE COUNTIES—continued use of Federal Forest Highway Funds authorized in construction of State Highway 103 through the Angelina National Forest. Next work to be construction of Attoyac River bridge and approaches, 1.7 miles to cost \$202,000.

KAUFMAN COUNTY—appropriation of \$5,000 made to additional surfacing on U. S. 80 in city of Terrell on section between the Southern Pacific Railroad and the east city limit.
OLDHAM COUNTY—Spur Highway designated from State 51 to Boy's Ranch totaling .6 miles of estimated cost of \$13,100.

Cattle Judging Coach Keeps His Luggage Handy

LUBBOCK, Jan. During the past two years Judging Coach Stanley Anderson at Texas Tech has traveled distances that would take him half way round the world as he led students to various livestock exhibitions throughout the United States.

Anderson, instructor in animal husbandry at Tech, says from early fall until the middle of spring he spends most of his time working with students in livestock pavilions or doing practice judging on a farm.

Tech animal husbandry majors compete in the shows at Kansas City, Chicago, Denver, Fort Worth and Oklahoma City each year. In addition, judging takes place on route to the exhibitions and at the smaller shows in West Texas.

Proof that hard work on the judging line pays off came recently when the Tech team took top honors at the Denver show.

Anderson came by his judging talent naturally. He grew up on an Aberdeen-Angus farm in Iowa and was a member of the 1947 Iowa State college team which won first place at the Kansas City and Chicago shows.

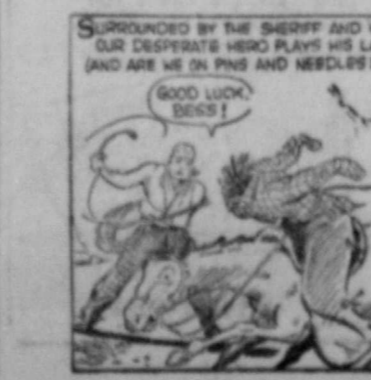

Ground Water Is Local Problem, Expert Declares

LUBBOCK, Jan. 28 —Ground water depletion in the United States has not reached an alarming rate, a ground water geologist has declared at Texas Tech.

R. M. Leggett, New York consulting hydrologist, told a campus audience that certain areas in America are in danger because of over-pumping. He said the situation was a local one and not a threat to the entire nation.

He also pointed out the misconception some people have about ground water. Ancient ideas that ground water was furnished by distant mountain sources or even ocean water are untrue, he said. Ground water is the product of local precipitation and nothing more, he said.

Leggett said research has shown that the movement of ground water through porous spaces tends to purify the water rapidly. In some cases, harmful bacteria have been removed in communities that lacked sewage facilities, merely through ground water percolation.

Leggett's lecture was sponsored by the American Association of Petroleum Geologists.
