### Ray Granted Execution Stay

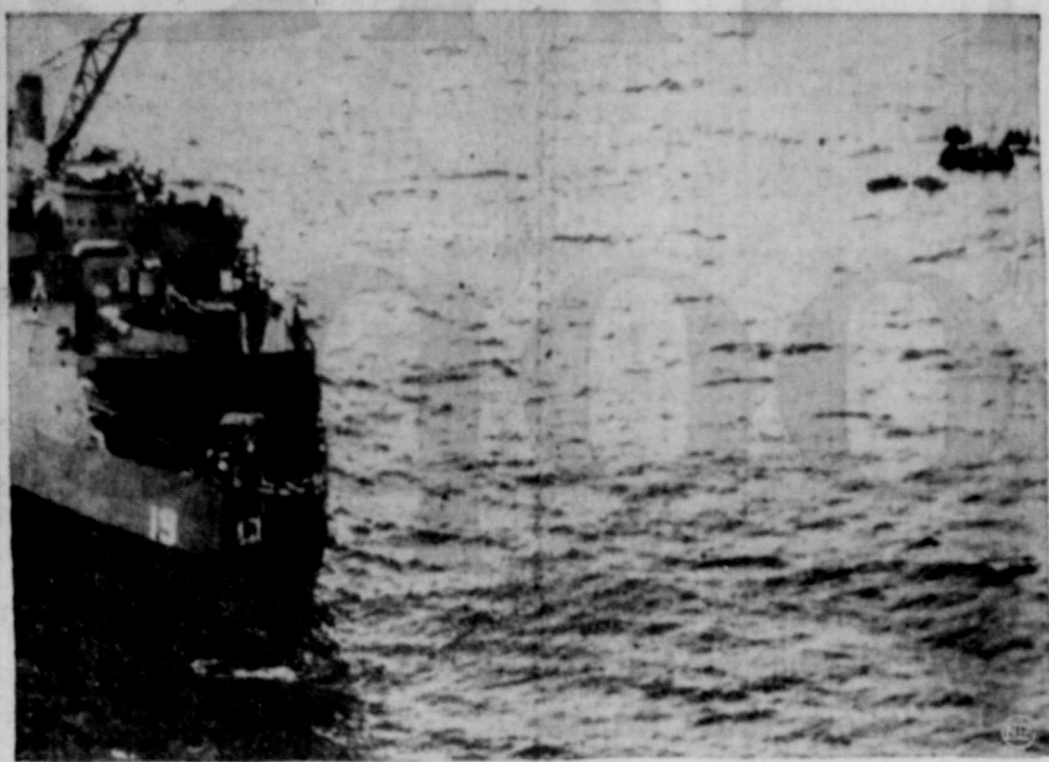

### April Allowable First Increase Since November

AUSTIN, Tex., March 21 (UP)—The April oil allowable of 2,088,722 barrels daily set by the Texas Railroad Commission yesterday will give oil men their first overall increase since last November.

The march output had been set at 1,948,346 barrels daily.

The commission left the number of producing days for April at 17 with the East Texas field retaining the same number of producing days as others.

A Railroad Commission spokesman said the increase reflected an indicated stepup in market demand.

The next statewide proration production in district 6, outside the East Texas field, some 4,790 barrels daily, while the East Texas field would have its production stepped up 7,933 barrels daily.

Texas' allowable for gasoline and distillates was estimated at 300,647 barrels daily, bringing the state's overall allowable to 2,389,369 barrels per day.

The next statewide proration hearing will be held April 14 at Austin.

### Blame Static Electricity For XC-99 Blast

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 21 (UP)—Static electricity apparently caused an explosion which damaged the XC-99, the world's largest military airplane, Air Force investigators said today.

The explosion yesterday left a gaping hole in the left wing of the giant six-engine ship at Kelley Air Base's maintenance and overhaul department.

Eight civilian mechanics suffered minor injuries but none needed hospitalization.

The monstrous plane-a counterpart of the Air Force's B-36 superbomber-has been at Kelley since last May for modification. The plane once lifted a record payload of 100,000 pounds on a test flight.

The blast occurred as the maintenance crew sprayed carbon dioxide into a 4,000 gallon fuel compartment on the left wing to dissipate gasoline fumes so the men could repair a fuel line leak.

Air Force officers said quick action by two Kelley firefighting units saved the plane.

The XC-99, like the B-36, is built by Consolidated Vultee Aircraft. It has a 230 foot wingspread, the same as the B-36's and the landing gears of the two planes are identical. However, the XC-99 is 20 feet longer, or 182 and one-half feet from tip to tail, and has a fatter, double decked fuselage.

### Dealers Urged To Demand End Of Auto Strike

DETROIT, Mich., March 21, (UP)—The nation's 10,000 Chrysler dealers were urged today to demand settlement of the 56-day Chrysler Corporation strike.

Dick Price, a Dallas, Tex., Detroit-Plymouth dealer, sponsored a full page advertisement in the trade publication, Automotive News, asking dealers to "organize" themselves into a pressure group.

"It appears that it is high time for us to organize and to demand that our investments and the interests of our employees be recognized," the advertisement said.

The demand was published as several industry sources indicated that a settlement this week might be a "possibility." Walter P. Reuther, president of the striking CIO United Auto Workers, and Robert W. Conder, Chrysler Industrial Relations Director, joined contract negotiations after being absent from several meetings.

Some 89,000 Chrysler workers have been on strike since Jan. 25 because of disagreement over administration of a \$100 monthly pension plan. The strike has idled approximately 150,000 workers.

### TEXAS MERCURY DUE TO DROP HERE TODAY

A mild cold front began moving out of Texas today, but the mercury was due to sink lower before "real spring weather" parades back into the state tomorrow.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Dallas said the front, extending southwestward from Beaumont to the gulf coast near Brownsville, would plod slowly out of the state.

However, the forecast called for cooler weather in both east and west Texas this afternoon.

The cool front moved into the state a few hours before spring made its entrance Monday at 10:36 p. m. Winds of 55 miles an hour preceding the front kicked up dust clouds in northwest Texas, cutting visibility to a mile or less at many cities.

No rain was reported in Texas today.

Winds ranging up to 25 miles per hour were reported in north central and west central Texas, but weathermen did not expect dust clouds to arise in rain-thirsty west Texas.

Overnight minimum temperatures ranged from 22 at Dalhart to 67 at Brownsville and Corpus Christi, with most readings in the 40's and 50's. Yesterday's maximums fell between 63 at Galveston and 88 at Presidio.

Clear skies were reported today today in the Panhandle and extreme west Texas. High clouds hung over north Texas, while low clouds were reported in east Texas.

The fog was expected to break up before noon, and the weather bureau said the clouds were breaking up somewhat as the cool front moved out of the state.

Other overnight minimum readings included Abilene 44, Amarillo 25, Austin 57, Big Spring 42, Dallas 49, El Paso 44, Houston 63, San Antonio 59 and Waco 53.

The program has the approval of medical societies of the state and county and is not a charity program it was pointed out today.

### New Charge Filed Against Dr. H. N. Sander

MANCHESTER, N. H., March 27 (UP)—The Hillsborough County Medical Society studied a new charge today against Dr. Herman N. Sander as two Catholic hospitals banned him for life.

Though the charge against the 41 year old Candia physician, acquitted of first degree murder in a "mercy slaying" trial March 9, was kept secret, each member of a three-man board of censors and Sander himself received a copy of the accusation.

It was believed he was enraged with conduct unbecoming to a physician in connection with the death last Dec. 4 of Mrs. Abbie Borroto, 69, a cancer-ridden Manchester patient.

Dr. Lloyd L. Wells, secretary of the county society with which charges were filed, said only that "a charge has been made against Dr. Herman N. Sander."

The charge was believed written by an official of either the Sacred Heart or the Notre Dame hospitals here which announced their bans against the controversial physician yesterday. It was learned several doctors signed the paper.

The three-man board of censors will study the charge for a minimum of 10 days or a maximum of six weeks before reporting to the 170 member county society with a recommendation. Dr. Sander will then face one of four decisions: No action, public or private censure, suspension or expulsion from the organization.

Catholic Bishop Matthew F. Brady of Manchester, who attacked mercy killing in a sermon Sunday, refused comment on the action by the hospitals.

During his trial, Sander was charged with hastening Mrs. Borroto's death to ease her pain by injecting air into her veins.

**Coaches Favor Reclassification Of TIL Divisions**  
 AUSTIN, Tex., March 20 (UP)—A majority of Texas high school coaches agreed today that the Texas Interscholastic League's divisions should be reclassified.

The poll, conducted by executive secretary, L. W. McConachie of the Texas High School Coaches Association, was answered by 960 mentors. Results were published in the March issue of the TIL's "Interscholastic Leaguer."

In addition, the coaches favored a 10-semester rule and a 19 year age limit.

On reclassification, 714 coaches voted favorably with 234 dissenting instead of okaying a suggested plan to form a class AAA division of schools with 1,000 or more attendance, the coaches, by write-in votes, supported that classification

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### Chicago After Horsemeat Ring

CHICAGO, March 21. (UP)—The government cracked down today on a ring suspected of selling horsemeat as high grade beef tenderloins over wide sections of

the nation. City, state and federal authorities cooperated in a full scale investigation which agents expected to reach into many of the big packing centers of the midwest and southwest.

About 12,000 pounds of mis-labeled horsemeat was seized in a southside warehouse here yesterday.

Agents said two men were known to have acted as leaders of the alleged ring but would not disclose their names. No arrests had been made as yet, it was emphasized.

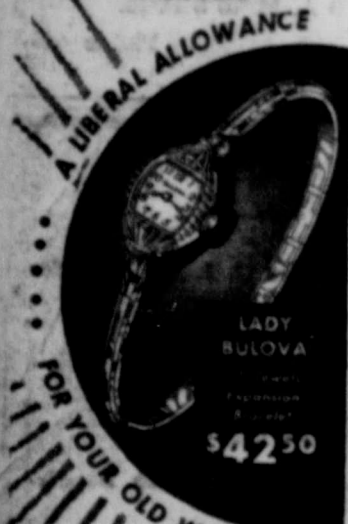
Officials said the horsemeat was shipped from Kansas City, Mo., labeled properly as "horsemeat tenderloins" but at South Bend, Ind., the meat underwent processing to remove the label. Then the meat was brought here labeled simply as "tenderloins" and the stamp as "beef tenderloins" was added in the warehouse where the meat was found.

The meat, officials said was owned by a Minnesota man. Details of the case were disclosed by Dr. O. W. Seher, in charge of government meat inspection in Chicago, and Dr. Herman Busness, president of the Chicago Board of Health.
