### ACCUSES BUDNEZ OF TESTIFYING FALSELY

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UP)—Earl Browder, former boss of American Communists, said under oath today that Louis F. Budenz gave "false" testimony when he said Browder had termed Owen Lattimore a Communist.

Browder, testifying before a Senate subcommittee, took direct issue with statements made by Budenz about Lattimore last week before the same committee.  
Asked by committee counsel Edward P. Morgan about Budenz' remark that Browder had told him "officially" that Lattimore was a Communist, Browder replied firmly:  
"I deny that categorically. It is false."  
Budenz was editor of the Communist Daily Worker before he renounced Communism in 1945 and rejoined the Catholic church. Lattimore, far eastern expert and Johns Hopkins University professor, has been accused by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R., Wis., of being a Communist spy.

### Rotarians Hear Talk On Threat Of Socialism

"Socialism is a greater threat to this country domestically than is Communism," L. R. Pearson told members of the Rotary Club at their regular meeting Wednesday at noon in the Gholson Coffee Shop dining room.

Pearson pointed out that the Communist population in the United States is very small but that the growth of socialistic trends in this country is alarming. He stated that socialism has invaded the financial structure of this country, has invaded the field of electricity and is making a bid for entry into the medical field. It will ultimately control the industrial field unless it is halted," Pearson said. He labeled Socialism a refined version of Communism.

Using Russia as an example of Communism and England as an example of Socialism, he pointed out that Communism had established itself in Russia through a violent revolution but the spread of socialism in England had been by the gradual and infiltrating method. This is the method being used in this country, he said. He concluded his talk with a paraphrase on the 23rd Psalm, substituting state in the place of "shepherd."

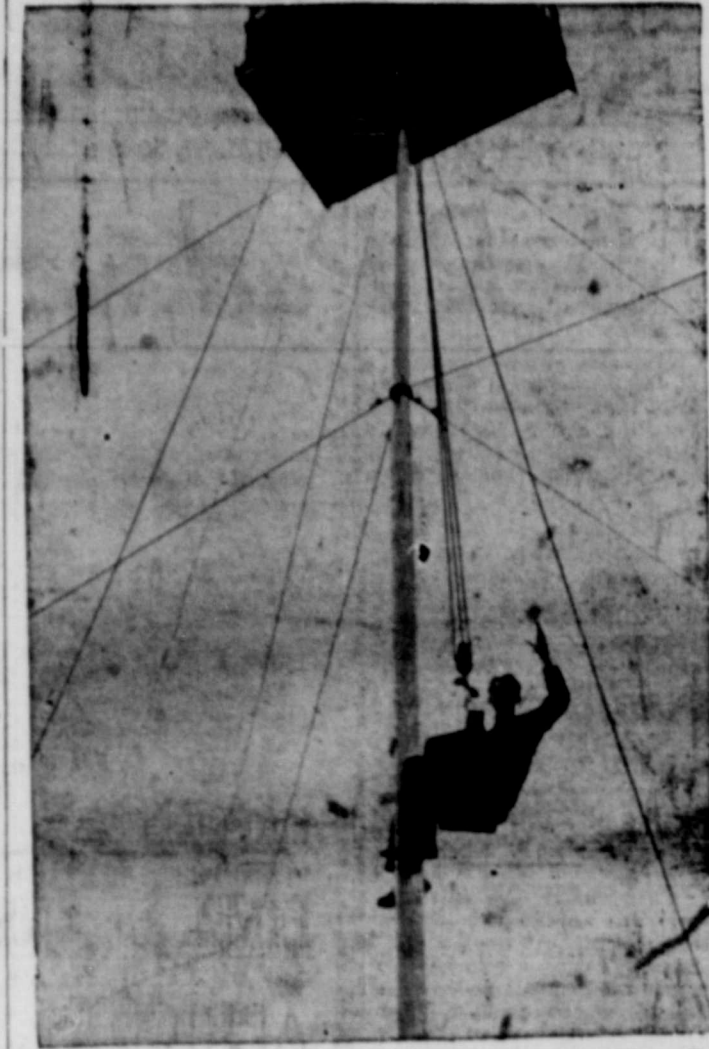

### Brothers To Face Charges Of Cattle Rustling

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., April 27 (UP)—Deputy Sheriff Marty Boyles left here today for Durant, Okla., to return two brothers to face charges of cattle theft.

The two were Norman Davenport, 23, and Chester Davenport, 28, both of Wichita Falls, who were picked up in Durant last week for investigation on a similar charge.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Bill Thacker said he was almost certain the pair would waive extradition. He said that charges of cattle theft had also been filed against them in Clay and Archer Counties.

A third man charged, Alford Pierson, of Tuscola, was scheduled to leave with two Texas Rangers today for Idabel and Hugo, Okla., and Duquesne, Hope, and Nashville, Ark., where, it is alleged, the stolen cattle were sold.

Thacker said the Rangers as well as Oklahoma officials would inspect some land near Garvin, Okla., which had been leased by the Davenport brothers. A second lease near Garvin, operated by another person thought to be implicated with the Davenports, was on the Ranger's itinerary.

The charges filed against the Davenports and Pierson were in connection with the theft of one head of cattle from the Fred Ebner ranch near Wichita Falls.

Thacker said his office had uncovered at least one other case of cattle theft in the county. He said charges against the Davenports in Archer County listed four head of cattle and in Clay County, two head.

**Says Family Food Bill Shows Drop**

WASHINGTON, April 27 (UP)—The cost of a week's supply of food for a three-person family has dropped about two dollars from the postwar price peak, the agriculture department said today.

It said the annual retail cost of the "family market basket" was \$612 in February. That's a drop of \$100 from the record high level in July, 1948. Preliminary figures indicate the cost dropped again in March.

**Color TV Sets To Show Surgery At Medical Meet**

FORT WORTH, Tex., April 27 (UP)—Color television will make its first Texas appearance here May 1-3 during the annual meeting of the Texas State Medical Association.

Color television cameras will be set up in an operating room at St. Joseph Hospital where, for four hours daily during the three-day meeting, Texas surgeons will be televised in color while they perform general surgery.

While they operate, the doctors will lecture on the techniques used and problems of each operation.

Six receivers will be set up in the Texas Hotel where the operations may be viewed by the 1,500 doctors expected to attend the meeting.

Dr. Hobart O. Deaton, Fort Worth, a member of the Association Committee arranging the television operations, said the doctors would be able to see far more than if they were in the operating room.

"The cameras will be trained over the operating surgeons' shoulders," he explained.

Several thousand pounds of color television equipment have been shipped from the Smith, Kline and French Laboratories at Philadelphia for the meeting. More than 2,600 pounds of the equipment arrived at Love Field in Dallas by American Airlines today.

The "market basket" contains the farm food eaten during a year's time by a family of three average consumers during the pre-war years (1934-39). But the actual cost of feeding such a family is higher than the figures indicate because people have been eating better in the postwar years than they did prewar.

**AUSTRALIAN MINISTER WANTS REDS OUTLAWED**

CANBERRA, Australia, April 27 (UP)—Liberal Prime Minister Robert Menzies introduced legislation today which would make Australia the first English-speaking country in the world to outlaw the Communist Party.

Menzies said in a speech to the Lower House of Parliament that the Communist were trying to "destroy Australia and the defenses of Democracy at a time when we are not, except in a technical sense, at peace."

Menzies said the bill does six "main things" to the Communists:

1. It declares the Communist Party unlawful, dissolves it and appoints a receiver for its property. Any surplus over liabilities will go to the Commonwealth government.
2. It permits the governor general to outlaw trade unions and similar organizations which clearly are dominated by the Communist Party. Any such group may appeal the decision to the Australian high court, but the burden of proof that it is not Communist lies with the group.
3. Officers and members of such illegal associations are subject to imprisonment if they do not cease their activities or if they try to enlist support for their cause.
4. The Governor-General may publish after May 10 the names of such persons.

5. Any person so declared a Communist will be barred from employment in the government of a government authority.

6. Such a person may be banned from holding a job in the "key" coal, iron, steel, building, transport, engineering and power industries.

To charges that his bill would drive the Communists underground Menzies said "the Communists are underground already."

"The Soviet Union has perfected peace demonstrations designed not to promote true peace but to prevent or impair defense preparations in Democracies," Menzies said.

**Negotiators Hope For Final Settlement Soon**

CHICAGO, April 27 (UP)—Labor negotiators appeared today to be working out settlements in the 93-day-old Chrysler strike and in the telephone dispute.

Federal mediators began meetings at Chicago in an attempt to head off a Fireman's strike against four railroad networks on May 10. At New York, leaders of the CIO Communications Workers of America said they hoped to "get somewhere on the wage question" today with officials of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The union, which called off a strike by 200,000 workers scheduled for yesterday, said a settlement "in the making" for 21,000 long lines workers would cost the company about \$5 a week per employee. It was expected to provide for a 3 percent wage increase.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther and Norman R. Matthews, the union's Chrysler director, said that "some progress has been made on certain contract issues."

"However," they said, "a number of important issues are still unresolved. The union is prepared to apply itself in extended negotiating sessions in an effort to resolve all the issues remaining in dispute."

A Chrysler spokesman said only that "some progress has been made. Negotiations will resume at 2 P. M. in an effort to reach a satisfactory settlement."
