The chamber of commerce board of directors last night voted wholehearted support towards organizing a Community Chest here.

Gen. MacArthur Purges Editors Of Newspaper

TOKYO, June 7 (UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur today purged 17 editors of the Communist party newspaper Akahata for publishing a defiant nationwide general strike call in protest against his purge of 24 top Communist party leaders.

The editors were ordered banned from all party agitation and public activities on the same grounds as the 24 Communist leaders—the occupation law barring a revival of Japanese militarism.

MacArthur said he could either order the paper closed or order it censored before publication, but did not wish to do so.

"Both courses are repugnant to me as violative of the broad philosophy which has guided the development of press freedom in Japan, and should be imposed only if other measures prove ineffective," MacArthur said.

The order was contained in a letter to Premier Shigeru Yoshida instructing him to add the names of the 17 editors to those of the 24 members of the Communist party central committee purged yesterday.

MacArthur said the 17 named in his letter shared responsibilities for editorial policies governing the content of the Communist newspaper.

The blast which caused the latest purge was a defiant party statement denouncing MacArthur's action yesterday as "a violation of the Potsdam Declaration."

The statement appealed to the Japanese masses "to protect the Communist party by staging a general strike."

Akamata said 65 labor unions in Tokyo have decided "there is no longer is room for argument" and would go on strike immediately, with the general strike as their ultimate goal.

The new purge followed these developments:

1. Russian delegates boycotted the Allied council meeting again today and observers speculated MacArthur may ask them to withdraw their mission if they do not intend to participate.

2. The Communist party announced appointment of an eight-man provisional central committee to take over the functions of the 24 purged Communist executives.

The Soviet boycott marked the third straight time the Russians have refused to attend the regular bi-weekly meeting of the Allied council for Japan.

Negro Leaders Plan To Break HS Barriers

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., June 7 (UP)—Negro leaders today made plans to use a momentous U. S. Supreme Court decision to break down racial barriers in Oklahoma's white high schools.

Roscoe Dunjee, editor of a Negro newspaper, said state officers of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, would meet tomorrow "to see what the court has done for us and decide what we do next."

The Supreme Court ruled Monday that the University of Oklahoma could not compel G. W. McLaurine, a Negro graduate student, to conform to the school's segregation policies.

Dunjee, Oklahoma's director for the NAACP, announced Monday he expected 75 to 100 Negroes to attend the universities summer session. Six asked for admission yesterday.

37 Survivors Watched In Horror As Sharks Ate Fellow Passenger Alive; 27 of 64 Still Missing

MIAMI, Fla., June 7 (UP)—The U. S. Destroyer Saufley teamed toward the mainland today carrying 37 survivors of a charter plane crash who watched in horror while a fellow passenger was being eaten alive by sharks.

Nine Puerto Ricans were known to have died when the twin-engine C-46 crash-landed in the Atlantic ocean Monday night 270 miles off the Florida coast. Eighteen others were presumed dead.

The tale of one heroic rescue that came too late to be related in a radio message received from the ship by the 6th naval district headquarters at Charleston, S. C.

It told how sharks began attacking Pedro Guggan just before he was fished out of the water and how his mate 2-C J. B. Taylor risked his own life to save him.

Taylor plunged in after Guggan, who was wildly struggling in his life jacket trying to beat off the sharks, when there was no other way to snatch him to safety.

The seaman himself was not bitten but Guggan died soon after he was hauled aboard the Saufley. The Navy report credited Taylor with "heroic" action.

Other details of the destroyer crew's valiant work in the choppy ocean will be learned when the Saufley docks at Charleston about 4 p. m. (EST). The ship had only recently been taken out of "mothballs" for destroyer-escort duty and was returning from a shakedown cruise to Puerto Rico when it was directed to the crash scene.

That Name Still Holds Magic; James Roosevelt Claims California Race

James Roosevelt was catapulted into national political prominence and the veteran Republican Sen. Chan Gurney was shoved out of office as returns rolled in today from the California, South Dakota and New Mexico primaries.

Roosevelt, son of the late president, held a 20,000 vote lead for the California democratic gubernatorial nomination with about 30 per cent of the precincts reporting.

Republican Gov. Earl Warren was far ahead of Roosevelt for the GOP nomination.

Under the state's unique cross-filing system, both were attempting to win the nomination of both parties.

Warren won such double nomination in the 1946 primary and was automatically elected.

In the total vote cast on each ballot, Warren was leading Roosevelt by a 50 per cent margin. But Roosevelt's accumulation of votes was sufficient to indicate that his family name had lost none of the old magic.

Although the Democratic race was going down to a photo-finish, Roosevelt issued a statement claiming victory. Roosevelt's showing in the Democratic column knocked some of the luster off Warren's chances to be the GOP presidential nominee in 1952.

Observers had predicted that Warren, the 1948 vice-presidential nominee, might fall in line to bear the party standard if he won a double nomination again.

Gurney, running for his third senate term in the South Dakota primary, was bounced from office when Rep. Francis Case won the GOP nomination. Case himself had risked his political career by giving up the House seat he held for 14 years to make the race against Gurney.

In the New Mexico primary, Rep. John E. Miles was far ahead in the fight for the Democratic nomination for Governor. He held 50 per cent more votes than former Federal Judge David Chavez. Colorful Ingram B. Pickett, seven-foot tall state corporation commissioner, was running fourth behind candidate Lake Frazier.

In the California senatorial primary, Helen Gahagan Douglas claimed the Democratic nomination and Rep. Richard Nixon claimed the Republican nomination. Both predicted victory in November and promised a clear-cut fight on national and state issues.

WASHINGTON, June 7 (UP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today that Russia's walk out in the United Nations over the China issue is "an unwarranted attempt at coercion."

"We do not like coercion," Acheson said in a cold formal statement. The statement, in effect, told the world that the U. S. sees no easy way out of the present impasse with Russia.

City Council Discuss Buy Of Scraper

Commissioners Handle Routine Complaints In Routine Way; Worry About Bills Coming Up

City commissioners dealt with the usual complaints that a city commission gets; tabled other complaints and threw some in the waste paper basket in Tuesday night's business.

In a meeting marked with little official business and much discussion, the commission raised one city employee's salary by \$10 bucks a month.

The commissioners also heard a representative of an Abilene agency of the Caterpillar Company who wants to sell the city a used scraper.

The commissioners got the price, \$940 and voted to send a commissioner to Abilene to inspect the three-year scraper.

Commissioners pointed out that for the past year that they had been borrowing a scraper for working streets and opening ditches.

The representative of the Abilene agency said that a new scraper would cost \$3,600. Price Crawley, who sells new cars, in addition to mayoring the city, said that both the new price and the used price seemed high. But, he admitted, that he hadn't been pricing scrapers before this time.

The city commissioners also discussed repairs on the fire department station. The repairs have been in progress for about four weeks.

The commissioners also had conversation about requests of individuals who want vacant lots mowed. The commissioners pointed out that the city could not do the work free of cost and that they didn't have the men available to do the work on a free basis.

They decided to investigate the possibility of contracting a private individual to do the work for property owners.

The property owner would pay the mower but contact between the mower and the property owner would be facilitated by the city.

The commissioners also, like a lot of individuals, did some worrying about bills coming payable the tenth of this month. City Secretary Lester Crossley indicated that the city should be able to meet its obligations.

Ingram, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Ingram has completed 2 of 4-H Club work. His demonstrations in Club include dairy, nuts, and he plans to beef steer this year. He received medals for graduation this year and Gold Star award for standing 4-H Club last year.

LET'S GO FISHIN'

By Onous Dick

From what the old timers are
saying the Catfish are moving ar-
ound late this year, but are due
to start biting anytime now. Billy
Walters says they have started,
and this includes Mr. and Mrs.
W.W. Walters. They took a 43 1/2
lb. Yellow Cat over the week end
at Eliasville just below the dam on
the trout line using Drum for bait
up to 1 and one-half lbs.

—A recurrence of that hectic fish-
ing period of June 1947 is antici-
pated at 100-year-old Eliasville's
Donnell Dam anytime within the
next two weeks, Red Brownlow,
one of the old timers, predicts.

The old timers have been antici-
pating a "red" rise on the Clear
Fork of the Brazos River to make
fishing "normal." That rise hit the
old dam May 25 and was contin-
uing Wednesday morning.

Brownlow said the fishing would
hold for at least two weeks. He
quoted several of the old timers
along the river as raving seen the
large yellow catfish coming up-
river from Possum Kingdom Lake
and the Brazos River. None of the
larger fish have been caught yet
because the water has been run-
ning over the dam two swiftly to
allow safe fishing from the ancient
concrete structure.

5,000 FISHERMAN
Recalling June 7, 1947, when
more than 5,000 fisherman ganged
the tiny hamlet in a 19-day period,
the old timers think the owd will
equal that record by June 15. They
hinge their opinion on the fact that
fishing has not been good in three
years. The rises have been either
of too short duration or have come
at the wrong time in the season,
they believe.

However, as far back as the old
timers can remember, summer
days have brought thousands to his-
toric old Eliasville regardless of
whether the fish were biting. Man-
y of the visitors are former resi-
dents of the town who have moved
away. Others are descendants of
the towns pioneers who come to

the town and facilities their fore-
fathers helped to start.

CAMP MEETING
Pack in the "good old days" many
religious groups established sum-
mer camps across the river from
the town. Spreading pecan trees
and live oak and elm provide
nature shade and that was aug-
mented by construction of an old-
fashioned tabernacle. Under the
open-air structure, the programs
were held, water impounded by
the old dam provided adequate
place for sports and at one time a
nine-hole golf course provided a
diversion from the routine back-
to-nature agenda.

Although Nashville sprang into
the national highlight with the com-
ing of oil to the area in the early
20's, the people who know the river
have never been too busy to ob-
serve at least a week each sum-
mer to the natural pastime of
fishing off the dam.

SURE EQUIPMENT USED
Most of that which is done with
surf equipment of the heaviest
variety. And, it is done by those
who go prepared to stay until the
big ones bite. It is unusual to
see a fisherman hold the same
fishing line for 4 hours with
only brief relief for food, coffee
and maybe a little sleep.

When the big ones start biting,
it will be a three-ring circus for
some three days as fish weighing
as much as 65 pounds are landed
onto the sand bars. Although most
of the fishing is done immediately
below the dam, the big fish have
to be "played" down the river to
shallow water before they can be
landed. It often takes as many as
half a dozen co-operating fish-
ermen to land one large yellow
catfish.

It is not at all unusual for
fishermen to hold their own lit-
tle "court" right on the bank of
the river to determine ownership
of one of those big ones. That is
occasioned by the numerous fish-
ermen angling in the same big hole.
In the 1949 fishing season, a 42-
pounder was landed and there were
eight hooks with lines attached to
him. The problem of who should
claim the monster had to be de-
termined right there. That takes
deplomacy that only those bearded
old timers of Eliasville can dis-
pense. Sometimes there are hooks
with broken lines attached to the
big fish when they are landed.
In a case of that kind, sometimes
a fisherman who has had a line
broken will lay claim to the big
one. He has to be at least partially
satisfied.

DISMUTES SETTLED
And, out of all the years of or-
ganized fishing at Eliasville, there
is no record of any serious trou-
ble arising out of one of those situa-
tions. They always settle their dif-

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lege to render a service
to this community as
monument builders.
