Douglas MacArthur today purged so reported that a contract had been let on the Ranger-Morton 17 editors of the Communist party Valley road and that work should newspaper Akahata for publishing start in the near future. He said a defiant nationwide general stri-ke call in protest against his purge that the original apporpriation by the commission was for \$66,800; of 24 top Communist party leaders. but that the contract called for the expenditure of \$75,430.

The editors were ordered banned from all party agitation and public activities on the same grounds as the 24 Communist leaders- the occupation law barring a revival of Japanese militarism.

MacArthur said he could either order the paper closed or order it censored before publication, but did not wish to do so.

. "Both courses are repugnant to me as violative of the broad phil-osophy which has guided the deveolpment of press freedom in Jap-an and should be imposed only if other measures prove ineffective.' MacArthur said.

The order was contained in a letter to Premier Shigeru Yoshida instructing him to add the names of the 17 editors to those of the 24 members of the Communist party central committee purged yes
