Truman, Stalin Playing For Keeps Today

President Truman and Premier Stalin are playing for keeps today on the checker board of diplomacy.

It's Stalin's move. He may ponder for quite a while before he makes it, for the stakes are high—the risk of an atomic war. Any small incident might convert the Korean war into a world

And he may delay his move because he now finds himself in an unfamiliar tactical position. Up until now the Rusian strategy in the Cold War has been to make a bold, sudden move that puts the other fellow on the defensive. That's the technique Moscow used in the Berlin blockade, the seizure of Czechoslovakia and the conquest of China.

But this time Truman made

ordered air and sea support for South Korea, and most of the non-Communist nations rallied to him. And today Stalin has in front of him an American note-calling on him to help halt the Korean war by using his influence with the Korean reds.

That note puts the issue squarely up to the man in the Kremlin, and the world waits breathlessly for him

broad courses of action Stalin can take.

1. He can sit tight and say nothing for a while. If the Korean Communists lose the war, the Kremlin then can say that it had nothing to do with the invasion, and, in fact, didn't know anything about it until it happened. If the Korean reds win, Moscow then can hail the establishment of another "peo-

2. Stalin can tell Truman Russia is not involved in the war, but at the same time send secret aid to the Korean Reds. The way that probably would happen is that some "volunteers" would join the fighting in Korea. They wouldn't be able to speak very good Korean, but they would know how to maneuver a yak fighter plane and be

a tank. The chances are they would speak pretty good Russian.

3, Moscow could take the big gamble and throw the Red Air Force and the Red Army openly into the war. If that happened, World War III probably would be here. Once American and Russian pilots began falling in flames throught the Kowean skies, it would be almost impossible

AUSTIN, June 28 (UP) - Polio struck 107 new victims in Texas last week, hiking the total for 1950 to 824, State Health Officer George W. Cox reported to-

A total of 96 cases were reported for the preceding week. The added toll for the week ending June 24, marked the seventh consecutive week in which the polio rate has climbed.

Dallas led all counties on the last county with 19 new cases. Cox warned that the worst had not been reach-

Polio, he said, would hit its peak "in the next couple of months."

The 824 cases thus far this year compared with 570 during the comparable period last year, a 12-months that shattered all previous polio records for Texas. The latest report brought polio into 116 counties of the state's 254. In the same time last year, the disease had been reported in 89 counties.

Ten new counties joined the ranks last week. They were Cochran, Colorado, Henderson, Kaufman, Knox, Lamb, Leon, Marion, Polk and Van Zandt

counties. Each reporting one case. The latest report marked the first week in 1950 that 100 mark had ben cracked, comparing with 106 cases for the same week in 1949. The same week marked the first over-100 week last year.
