## Boy's Mayor Uses Sports Program To Wipe Out Juvenile Delinquency

COLUMBUS, O., (UP)—Smooth faced Jim Rhodes, the one-time boy mayor of Columbus, now is the boys' mayor and through use of an extensive sports program has virtually wiped out juvenile delinquency in the Ohio capital.

Setting an example which many other cities could copy, the one-time national president of the Amateur Athletic Union has used sports as the medium to prove that "a busy boy is a good boy."

The bland, persuasive Rhodes has, as a matter of fact, converted this one-time numbers center into a regular boys' town. His accomplishments include:

1. Organization of a "knot hole gang" which now numbers 22,000 youngsters.
2. Formation of 500 baseball leagues for the kids.
3. Founding of the National Caddy association with an annual national tournament held here.
4. Revived the Ohio AAU and the Ohio Public Links Golf association.
5. Increased Columbus play-

grounds from 19 to 52 in number.

6. Founded a kids zoo, complete with miniature rides.

7. Formation of a boys' club with a huge clubhouse complete with showers, television, workshop, gymnasium, play yard and plans for a swimming pool.

Rhodes, who has three daughters is particularly fond of boys and recognizes their problems. That may be because he had so many problems of his own after his father, a coal miner in Jackson County died when he was eight. As a youngster he helped contribute to the family ledger and, when he started at Ohio State University, he still was plugging along as a hand booker with stage aspirations.

Then he opened a restaurant called "Jim's Place," just off the campus and he was on his way. Formation of a Young Republican club started him politically and at 32 Rhodes moved in the mayor's office downtown.

One of his first projects was to organize the knot hole gang, with 1,000 members. The kids are passed in to see the Columbus Redbirds of the American Association. Rhodes then started his Boys' club, leasing an old market place for \$1 a year and putting the "bite" on merchants to equip it.

A low 70 shooter in golf, and a former high school basketball and football star, he ran three Columbus teams, started the Golden Gloves and just finished promoting the recent PGA golf championship.

Rhodes has higher political ambitions and only recently was defeated in the Ohio gubernatorial primary. But you'll be hearing more from his sports minded executive. Just wait until his boys start to vote.

## Fort Worth Cats Back Into Host Job

Fort Worth's Cats literally backed into prominence today as the team which will play host to the Texas League All-Stars in the July 21 special game.

The Dallas Eagles whipped the Cats, 7 to 6, in a zany game at Dallas last night, but Tulsa bowed to the Oklahoma City Indians and thus lost all mathematical chance of being atop the league on 41-star deadline time — the fourth of July.

Fort Worth took a whopping 6-4 lead over Dallas in the first three innings as the two teams battled on a wet field. Balls which ordinarily would have been cut went for hits and base runners skidded on the base paths.

The Eagles scored twice in the bottom of the fifth and chased Ray Moore to the clubhouse in the sixth with five runs on five hits, including a well-needed single by relief pitcher Fred Schmidt who blanked the Cats for six innings.

Oklahoma City spoiled Tulsa's hopes by sending four runs across in the bottom of the lucky seventh to beat the Oilers, 8 to 4. Al Aber, who entered the game in the seventh, was the winner.

The Beaumont Roughnecks lived up to their name as they mauled the San Antonio Missions, 14 to 1, in a lopsided game. Keith Thomas climaxed the Beaumont hitfest with a two-run homer in the eighth. One of the seven San Antonio hits off Ernie Nevel was a homer by Rocco Ippolito in the second.

Maurice Garlock of the Houston Buffs turned in the finest pitching performance of the night however, as he blanked the Shreveport Sports, 4 to 0, allowing only three hits.

Dawson is a friend of the old people and will fight any attempt to reduce or discontinue their pensions. He feels that economy in various state departments will provide necessary revenue to meet their obligations.

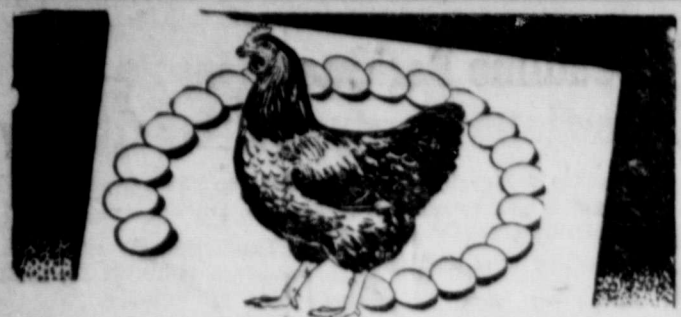

WASHINGTON, June 30 (UP)—This is big bear week in Washington. The zoo is gathering in a grizzly and a cub named "smokey," which got a "hot foot" in a forest fire out West. So here's a good bear story off Capitol Hill.

This one comes from Ivar H. Peterson, secretary to Wayne Morse, R., Ore., who doesn't know much about bears but is an expert on horses.

Last summer Pete and his pretty wife, Elizabeth, went to visit with his sister and brother-in-law at Christina Lake, in British Columbia.

One afternoon, Pete and some others came in from a fishing trip, trailing behind them a 25-inch trout.

2. The ruffie the taxidermist put around the pad is charrouse. It doesn't match anything else in the house.

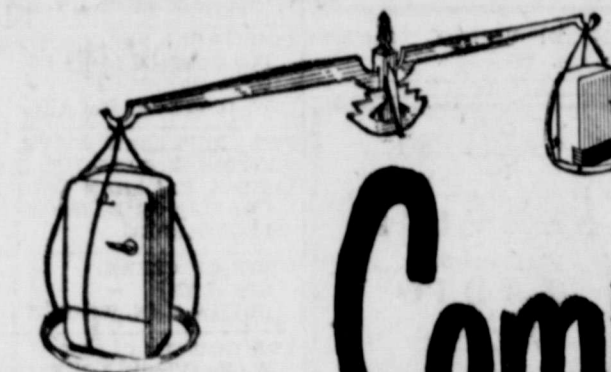

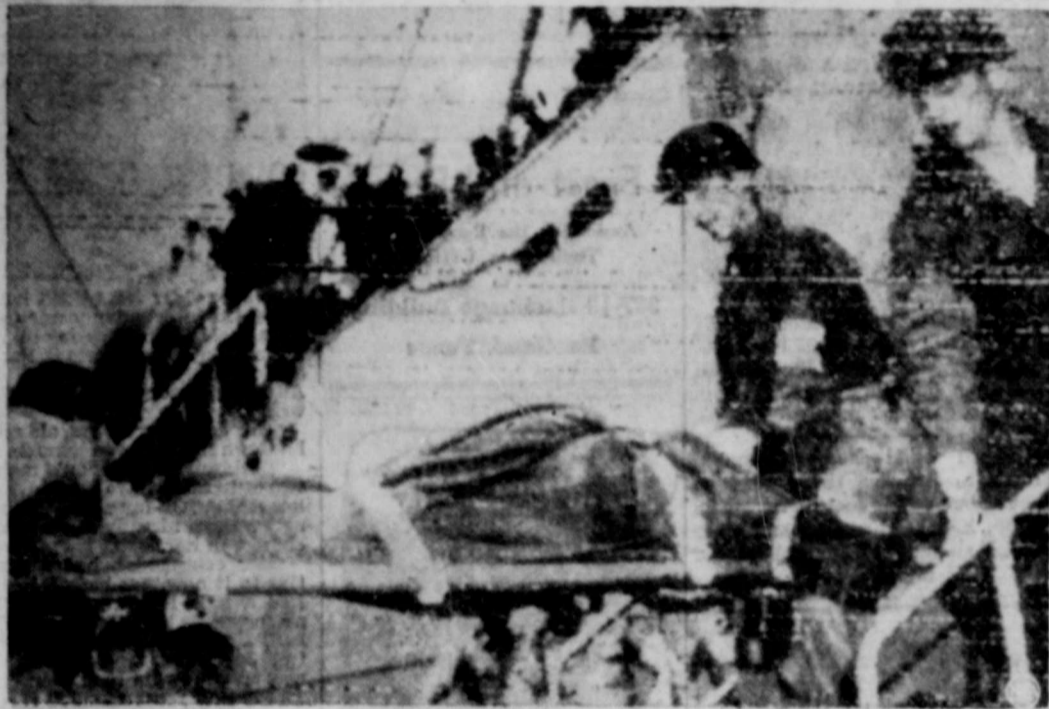

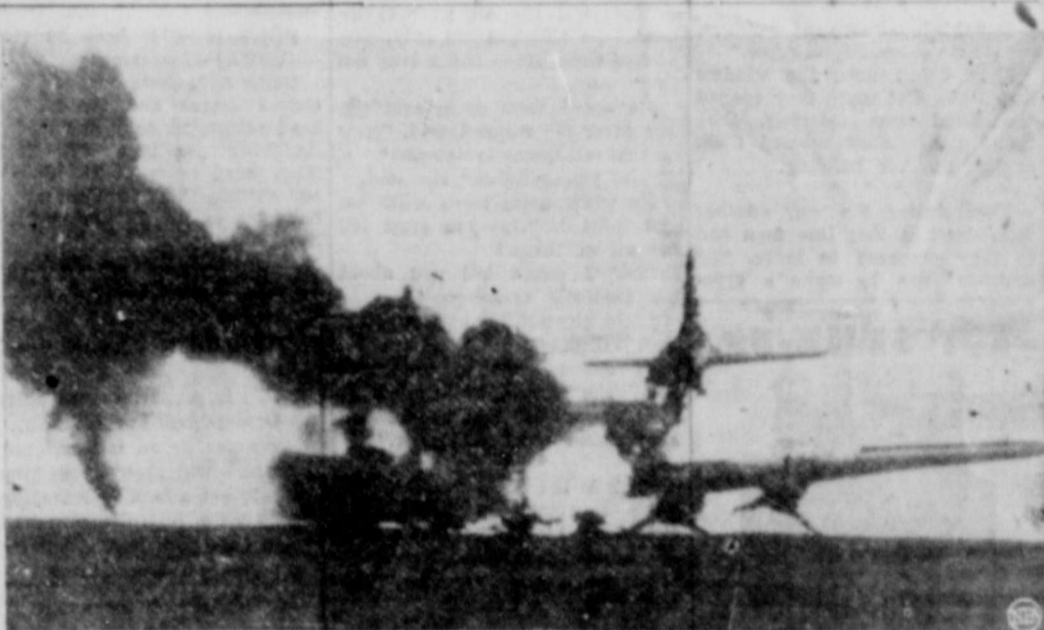

# NORTH KOREANS REDS CROSS HAN

## Secretary Johnson Says Truman Order Already Put Into Effect

## Communist Forces Spearhead New Drive With 50 Armored Vehicles

TOKYO, Saturday, June 30 (UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur is expected to act quickly in throwing American ground forces into the Korean war. An Allied headquarters spokesman today confirmed reports that the Korean Communists had crossed the Han river and broken through the South Korean lines Southeast of Seoul with between 49 and 50 armored vehicles. The general opinion here was that for the moment things looked bad for the South Korean army.

WASHINGTON, June 30 (UP)—President Truman today authorized "certain supporting ground units" to be thrown into the Korean war.

He also announced he has authorized American bombing of military targets in Communist North Korea and has ordered a naval blockade of the entire Korean coast. Defense Secretary Louis Johnson said that Truman's orders already have been put into effect.

The President did not explain in a brief statement what ground units will be used, but they presumably will be fighting troops and American.

The President's authorization to Gen. Douglas MacArthur was a signal to the American commander to step up the fighting against the North Korean Communist invaders who have plunged into the heart of the tiny Republic in the South.

The new instructions probably went out last night or early today. MacArthur already has ordered U. S. bombers to go after military objectives in North Korea.

Truman's new decisions were taken after a top-level conference at the White House late yesterday and after headquarters here received a top secret report from MacArthur on his visit to the fighting front in Korea yesterday.

The White House statement said that Truman's orders are in keeping with the United Nations security council directive to support the Republic of Korea.

In authorizing the bombing of North Korea, Truman said it would be done against "specific military targets." These would include the airfields near the North Korean capital of Pyongyang.

Fighter planes from these airfields have been harassing U. S. fighter and bomber operations. Now the American airman will be able to hit home and destroy the enemy on the ground.

The stringent naval blockade is designed to prevent the North Korean forces from making amphibious landings in the South and to choke off what supplies the Communists may be receiving by sea in the North.

The U. S. Naval forces presumably soon will be aided by British naval forces and a Canadian squadron.

There has been no hope here for a quick and easy end to the Korean fighting. More American casualties are to be expected. And there is nothing to indicate that the United Nations can save South Korea without combat troops slugging it out on land.

## No Short War

### Feeling Grows That US Troops Are Must

WASHINGTON, June 30  
—There was no hope here today for a quick and easy end to the Korean fighting. More American casualties are to be expected. Neither was there any assurance that the United Nations could save the South Korean Republic without combat troops slugging it out on land.

The burden of land fighting—if any—probably would be ours with international operation.

President Truman met late yesterday with his top military and civilian advisers. They separated close mouthed, admitting only that they had been informing each other and Truman of the Korean situation.

There were cautious hints to questioners today to avoid over-optimism. One version of the situation as of about 24 hours ago was that the Korean ground forces were wobbling from fatigue were wobbly as of that time it was stated that military intelligence reports did not in all respects support favorable press dispatches.

Korean casualties in three days of heavy fighting were reported to be 60 per cent, but whether from wounds or merely fatigue was not clear.

Plans had been made, the United Press was told to drop the Korean battle line back at one point as far south as the 36th parallel if the situation got worse. That would be a withdrawal of about 145 miles from the 38th parallel which divided North and South Korea before Saturday's attack from the North.

These reports also said that some North Korean aircraft were "much more advanced in design" than any of the Americans had expected to encounter.

There was no confirmation of suggestions from some American combat pilots that Russians must be manning some of the North Korean airplanes. Our flyers thought that might be so because of the skill of some pilots.

It was learned that Secretary-General trygve Lie's office is ready to convene the assembly at once if the Korean situation deteriorates.

There's always the story of the great newspaper editor on a New York paper—wished I could think of his name—who didn't think that a newspaperman rated space anywhere in the paper—and especially not on the front page.

After sticking to the grind for a long period of time, he decided to get rid of his wife by bashing her head in with an ax. It made good reading. But as he studied the paper from the Tombs, he was very critical with his replacement for all the space the new editor gave him.

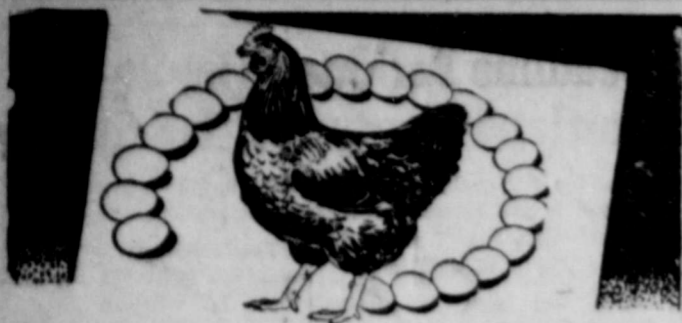

This one comes from Ivar H. Peterson, secretary to Wayne Morse, R., Ore., who doesn't know much about bears but is an expert on horses.

One afternoon, Pete and some others came in from a fishing trip, trailing behind them a 25-inch trout.
