## **UN Flag Going** To New Battle

(UP)-The historic blue and white banner which flew over Unied Nations headquarters in Jerualem during the Holy Land war was enroute today to Tokyo to be unfurled over the headquarters of General Douglas MacArthur .

The United Nations security ouncil late yesterday voted 7-0, with three abstentions, to authorze the United States to designate a supreme commander for the roops of a half-dozen nations committed to action against the communist invaders of South Kor

At the same time, it authorized MacArthur's "unified command" to use the UN flag as a battle banner "at its discretion" in the ourse of operations against the North Korean forces.

MacArthur, in view of objecons of some nations to having heir troops fight under any flag except their naitonal banner, was expected to confer with his submmanders of the various na onal forces and work out regutions on using the UN banner.
